

TRAIN WRECKED BY CLOUDBURST

Damage Extensive; Heppner Dwellings and Bridges are Washed Away

Vanished with an ominous roar when a cloudburst struck this area late today, leaving in its wake a trail of mud and debris. Three feet of water entered the Union Oil company office and a number of cabins.

Persons standing on bridges barely escaped when the floor waters gushed down upon the structures. Concrete bridges withstood the force of the water, but wooden structures went out immediately. The grange hall was washed from its location. The toll of livestock could not be determined tonight.

SEATTLE, May 29.—(P)—The first forest fire threat of the season, in the inland empire region, and a cloudburst in central Oregon stood out on the Pacific northwest weather map today.

Over northern Idaho, eastern Washington and western Montana, smoke from several small fires spread across the region, the aftermath of thunder and lightning storms yesterday. The storms cooled off the area after the hottest day of the year. Forty-eight small blazes were set by lightning in three north Idaho forests, the Coeur d'Alene, St. Joe and Pend Oreille areas. C. C. C. workers were soon able to quench most of them.

"I don't believe the situation is at all serious," regional forester Howard Flint said at Spokane. In a freak accident near Kellogg, Ida., which Stewart Ryckman, 17, the driver, blamed on the glare of a lightning bolt, their car overturned and his mother, Mrs. Ernest Ryckman, 50, was fatally injured. He said he mistook the lightning for the headlights of another car while rounding a curve.

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
3 cups green peas
3 cups water
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons flour
Cook the peas and water together for 20 minutes. Mash, add salt. Melt butter and add to the flour and stir until smooth. Add to mashed peas and cook slowly for ten minutes. One cup of milk may be used if desired. Add the Worcestershire sauce and serve hot in bouillon cups. Four servings.

DEADLY SPIDER IS PERIL IN KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 29.—(P)—Klamath Falls tonight was in the grip of a spider scare and residents were cooperating willingly in a campaign against the lethal "Black Widow" spider, the most poisonous in North America.

The city council endorsed a public education and general cleanup campaign and Dr. A. A. Soule, city health officer, was instructed to learn the most effective methods of controlling the danger.

No persons here have been reported bitten yet, but the deadly spider has been found here in rock gardens, drains, sewers, tin cans and even in garages.

Entomologists here declare the mild winter was responsible for the quick growth.

Alarmed by the menace, many persons have started tearing out rocky rock gardens and walls. Citizens were urged to spray their yards with heavy solutions. Crude oil and chloride of lime were recommended.

Classifications of entries will be as follows:

SECTION A
Class I—Cut Roses:
a. Best one rose in single container.
b. Best collection of roses.
c. Best display of climbing or rambling roses.
d. Best display of single, semi-double, or polyantha roses.
e. Best display of 12 or more roses, single variety and color, or mixed, in one container.
Class II—Cut Dahlias:
a. Best single stalk in one container.
b. Best general collection.
Class III—Aquatic Hybrids (Long-Spurred Columbinas):
a. Best display of six or more stalks.
b. Best display of bowl arrangement, columbinas only.
Class IV—Cut Peonies:
a. Best specimen bloom in one container.
b. Best collection of peonies from one garden.
Class V—Bearded Iris:
a. Best display of five different varieties, each in separate container.
b. Best display of iris from one garden (not less than 12 stalks, several varieties of one family, such as Campanulas, Hemerocallis, Dianthus, etc.).
c. Best display of peonies.
Class VI—Cut Perennials:
a. Best display of perennials from one garden, in one container or several.
b. Best display of a collection of hybrid varieties of one family, such as Campanulas, Hemerocallis, Dianthus, etc.
c. Best display of peonies.
Class VII—Cut Sweet Peas:
a. Best collection of sweet peas.
Class IX—Snapdragons:
a. Best display of six or more stalks.
Class X—Lilies:
a. Best display of lilies in season.
Class XI—Wildflowers:
a. Best collection of native Oregon wildflowers in bloom, as many varieties as possible, in one container or several.
Class XII—Rock Plants:
a. Most effective display of rock plants, in flats or pots, varieties labeled with names.
Class XIII—Flowering Shrubs:
a. Best display of shrubs in bloom.
b. Best display of new or rare shrubs in bloom.
Class XIV—Lilies:
a. Best single bloom.
b. Best collection water lilies.
Class XV—Children's Class:
a. Best collection wildflowers.
b. Best collection garden flowers.
Class XVI—Decorative:
a. Best arrangement of low flowers, containers and flowers together to be 12 inches high or over, in baskets or bowls.
b. Best flower decorated luncheon table for two people.
c. Best flower decorated breakfast table for two people.
d. Best flower decorated tea table.
Class XVII—Miniature Gardens (Model):
a. Miniature garden, to be shown in a box or flat, outside dimensions not more than 24x36 inches.

CLATSOP, Wash., May 29.—(P)—Three members of a Seattle party, Mrs. Georgia McDaniel, 29, and the two young daughters of Martin C. Langreth, of Seattle, aged four and two years, were killed tonight near Easton in an automobile-truck collision. The father sustained a fractured arm and the wife a fractured leg. Mr. and Mrs. Langreth were rushed here to the hospital. The bodies were also brought here. Their car hit the rear end of a truck which was also proceeding east over the Sunset highway, highway patrolmen reported. The crash occurred about three miles east of Easton, at about 9 p.m. They were driving over to spend the holidays.

INJURIES MINOR IN AIR LINER'S CRASH

BETHLE, Conn., May 30.—(P)—Twelve persons narrowly escaped death when a United Airway passenger plane, en route from Cleveland, O., to Newark, N. J., lost its way in the heavy fog early today and crashed when making a forced landing.

The nine passengers in addition to the pilot, co-pilot and stewardess, were treated for their injuries at the Danbury hospital. Lorenz Letson of Chicago, co-pilot, was the only one whose condition was described as critical. Hospital doctors found him suffering from a fractured left leg, severe head lacerations, and possibly internal injuries.

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\$3,600,000 OREGON SHARE, ROAD MONEY

Measure Reported by Senate Body Gives Match Fund For 1936 and 1937

Passage by congress of the Cartwright bill, as reported on Monday by the senate committee on postoffices and post roads, will mean that Oregon will receive approximately \$3,600,000 of federal aid highway funds in 1935.

For 1936 and 1937 the state would receive \$1,600,000 annually, provided that these funds are matched. R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, said it would not be possible to match these funds unless there was a material improvement in economic conditions.

Highway department officials were advised that the proposed \$400,000,000 grant was changed to a \$200,000,000 authorization which must be allocated the same as regular federal aid and is not subject to appropriations as obtained in the house grant.

The other \$200,000,000 of the house grant is transferred into regular federal aid to be matched by the states of \$100,000,000 for 1936 and \$100,000,000 for 1937. Funds for forest, parks and public domain for 1936 and 1937 are changed to \$10,000,000 for forests, \$10,000,000 for parks, \$4,000,000 for Indian reservations and \$2,500,000 for public lands.

The house provision that 25 per cent must be expended on "feeder roads" is amended so that up to a showing from the highway department a less percentage may be required.

Provision is made that unless states use at least 60 per cent of revenues derived from motor fees and gas tax on highways, they shall be deprived of that part of the federal authorization to the state up to one-third of the amount apportioned for any fiscal year.

SILVERTON'S BANK GIVEN MORE TIME

The state banking department Tuesday issued an order extending until June 16, inclusive, the restrictions under which the Coolidge & McClaine bank of Silverton is operating, provided that by June 5 there will have been additional written unconditional waivers in the commercial department in the amount of \$17,152.22.

Other demands are: That all subscriptions for stock (\$30,000) must be paid in cash with checks cashed and funds transferred to one account to be held in trust, except those funds coming from deposits to be released through reorganization as heretofore indicated.

That all stock certificates of the present bank be surrendered or properly accounted for. An extension until June 15, inclusive, also was granted to Bank of Sellwood, Portland, upon condition that the necessary amount of waivers be obtained in writing by June 5.

The Bank of Beaverton received an extension until June 5.

Foreclosure Fee Schedule is Cut by Land Board

A uniform schedule of fees for attorneys who represent the state land board in mortgage foreclosure was adopted at a meeting of the board yesterday. Members of the board alleged that the present attorney's fees were excessive and unreasonable. Under the new schedule attorneys who appear for the state land board in mortgage foreclosure proceed-

ings involving up to \$500 will receive \$30. The fees for foreclosures in excess of \$500 and up to \$2000 was fixed at \$40 and foreclosures in excess of \$2000 at \$50.

OFFICIALS BELIEVE DILLINGER IS DEAD

CHICAGO, May 29.—(P)—Now comes Melvin H. Purvis, head of the local bureau of the federal department of investigation, to add his name to the list of those expressing the opinion that John Dillinger is dead.

A day or so ago Attorney General Homer S. Cummings murmured "I wonder if Dillinger isn't dead."

Tonight—only a few hours after four girl companions of Dillinger gangsters reportedly were questioned about the mob's activities—Purvis said he was "convinced" that the No. 1 bad man of America was dead.

In fact, he added, some of his agents were looking for Dillinger's supposed "grave" in a lonely field "somewhere in southern Indiana."

Investigators disclosed they had "talked" to an Indiana doctor, name and home unrevealed, who told them Dillinger, a week after the time he shot his way out of a federal trap in Wisconsin, appeared at his office in company of three men and forced him to dress three wounds any "one of which might have proved fatal."

COOS BRIDGE BIDS TIME IS EXTENDED

Low bidders for the construction of the Coos Bay bridge Monday authorized an extension of time for receipt of the awards from the state highway department. The 30 day limit for holding up these contracts expired last Saturday.

These awards were made at a meeting of the state highway commission several weeks ago, but actual construction operations were delayed pending approval of the contract by the federal public works administration.

The Northwest Roads company of Portland received the major construction award, while the Virginia Bridge and Iron works of Roanoke, Va., submitted the low bid for the steel work. The span will cost in excess of \$2,000,000, and is to be the largest and most expensive bridge proposed to be constructed on the Oregon Coast highway under a federal loan.

Highway officials said that recent information received from Washington indicated that the formal award could not be made until after May 31. Federal funds were expected to be released at that time. The loan covering the five bridges totals \$5,600,000.

INSTITUTION FUNDS TO EARN INTEREST

The state board of control yesterday authorized William Elzner, secretary, to make an arrangement with the banks whereby interest will be received on all state institution deposits in excess of \$1000.

Authority was given the state highway department to purchase \$2500 worth of metal road markers on a bid of 62 cents each. A claim of the state highway department for \$24,29 against the state restoration fund also was approved. This claim resulted from a recent fire which damaged a maintenance shop at Elkton.

The board also approved a request of the state school for the deaf to hold a reunion of its graduates and former students on June 16.

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MAY GIVE UP RIGHT TO MEDDLE IN CUBA

WASHINGTON, May 29.—(P)—Abandonment of the right to intervene in the domestic affairs of Cuba was proposed to the senate tonight by President Roosevelt.

He transmitted for ratification, which senate leaders promised would be promptly given, a new treaty with the island republic which would do away with the 30-year old one in which was incorporated the Platt amendment. This amendment gave the United States the right to intervene for the maintenance of Cuban independence and the protection of American lives and property.

In sending the treaty to the senate, the president said made it clear that the United States not only opposed the policy of armed intervention but that it renounces "those rights of intervention and interference in Cuba which have been bestowed upon it by treaty."
