Flowers are Placed on Soldiers' Graves

Flowers for the graves of Salem's war dead and flowers for those of the nation at large were placed by the Woman's Relief corps assisted by a group of young women at the veterans' circle in City View cemetery yesterday morning. The G.A.R. ritual was read there by Commander Gideon Stolz of Sedgewick Post, one of five Grand Army men present. Commander Stolz introduced Rev. P. W. Erikson, speaker for the occasion.

"We are honored today by the presence of these Grand Army men rather than honoring them," Rev. Erikson said. The Civil war was fought to perpetuate the ideals conceived by our forefathers in forming the United States, or American government. By reason of this war these ideals were saved to us. We meet here in commemoration of those soldiers' ideals. We appreciate the work these veterans and their auxiliaries have done everywhere."

Rev. Erikson declared, "Patriotism has been nourished and developed and brought to succeeding generations by reason of Memorial day exercises from year to year." These exercises, he said, "have tended to educate our people and increase in them the love of country and perpetuation of its ideals."

From the Marion-Polk county bridge, from boat and from airplane, flowers to the nation's sailor dead were spread on the Willamette river during the Women's Relief corps water memorial exercises that followed. Here as at the cemetery a three-volley salute was fired honoring these dead.

Preceding the armory exercises, members of veterans' organizations, their auxiliaries, other patriotic organizations, the national guard and Boy Scouts marched through downtown streets in the Memorial parade headed by Colonel Carl Abrams, grand marshal; Major E. V. Wootton, chief of staff, and Lieutenant Kenneth Dalton, adjutant.

"I was of the opinion that it was a good thing when I left San Francisco," he said. "After finding out how the non-union halls are operated up here, however, I have come to the conclusion that it is not."

gram of buying contemplates purchasing on a 90-day dating, and it is most likely that the liquor merchandise will be sold on a rapid turnover and the receipts placed on deposit with the state in ample time to meet maturing payments for liquor purchases on a 90-day dating.

Sales for April ran heavily above the preceding month. In the stores \$121,238 worth of liquor was sold while the agencies sold \$42,202, or 60 per cent above the amount sold by the agencies in the 45-day prior period. Total sales for the agencies and the stores in April exceeding the sales for the period beginning in February and ending March 31, 1934.

The report shows that the fixed equipment of the stores, offices and warehouse totals \$28,649. George McMorran, chairman of the commission, said yesterday that the report was gratifying to all members of the commission. He said all but one store had shown in the black in April.

ROOSEVELT MAKES GETTYSBURG TALK

GETTYSBURG, Pa., May 30. — (P)—In the bright sunshine of this battlefield of the "brothers' war," President Roosevelt today hailed a "new understanding" in the United States.

"We know that we all have a stake—a partnership in the government of our country," he told the vast throng of faces covering the decorated fields. "All of us share in whatever good comes to the average man. We are all brothers now in a new understanding."

Three elements were listed by the president as hindering progress: "These groups are those who seek to stir up political animosity or to build political advantage by the distortion of facts; those who, by declining to follow the rules of the game, seek to gain an unfair advantage over those who live up to the rules; and those few who still, because they have never been willing to take an interest in their fellow Americans, dwell inside of their own narrow spheres and still represent the selfishness of sectionalism which has no place in our national life."

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Hall Trial for Burglary Starts Today, 9:30 A. M.

Robert Hall of San Francisco will go on trial in circuit court here today on a charge of burglary not in a dwelling that grew out of the unsuccessful second attempt to burglarize the George E. Waters wholesale tobacco warehouse here May 10. Selection of the jury is scheduled to get under way at 9:30 a.m.

Hall was apprehended by police while he was walking in front of the warehouse, standing guard, they charged, while Albert Pullman, 29, of San Francisco, was removing cases of cigarettes through the roof of the building. Pullman was shot and fatally wounded by Officer Frank Winslow. Hall was indicted the same day on the burglary charge.

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FLEET UNITED AT NEW YORK TODAY

NEW YORK, May 30. (P)—The most majestic peace-time pageant of the grand fleet of the United States will be marshaled tomorrow as 70,000 tons of the nation's naval strength pass in review before President Roosevelt.

From every part of the globe where American warships are stationed—from Maine to Manila, bay and China—the gray vessels of this mighty armada will return to their Atlantic base together for the first time in three years.

Fourteen miles from shore, off the entrance to America's greatest seaport, the president will receive 21-gun salutes from each of the battleships and cruisers in the stately procession.

By Mr. Roosevelt's side on the deck of the heavy cruiser Indianapolis will stand his old chief, Josephus Daniels, former secretary of the navy, and half of the present cabinet.
