89 Loans Given
HOLC Approval
and Completed

Eighty-nine Home Owners' Loan corporation loans have been lost through the Salem office since it was opened last summer. It was announced yesterday. Nearly 500 loan applications have been appraised while 130 applications are now in process of closing. Officials in charge of HOLC here said the department was speeding up its work with the result that an increasing number of creditors were being paid off and debtors relieved of pressing charges.

Refinancing of a large number of loans to banks now in liquidation is being accomplished through a special division of HOLC at Portland.
