HOP SALES STAND STILL PAST WEEK

Only 11 Bales Change Han Coast Carryover Makes Hop Men Anxious

Hop sales have been at a standstill this week, with only 11 bales exchanging hands, as compared to heavy sales last week of about 1600 bales. Unless the weekend shows some spurt, this will be the lowest ebb in hop sales in Oregon in some weeks. The 11 bales were sold by Merten of St. Paul to Wolf for 20 cents per pound.

In spite of the fact that the 1934 crop now looks like a short one, veteran hop men are not at all optimistic on the hop deal for the oncoming crop. This is largely because an excessive amount of 1933 coast hops, mostly clusters, is still in the hands of growers.

Oregon alone has 20,000 bales of 1933 hops in growers' hands, which with 6,000 in Washington and 16,000 in California brings the total 1933 hold-over to 42,000 bales—an excessive number this late in the season. While three months remain until the new crop comes out of the driers, this time is usually a period of inactivity so far as sales go. This 42,000 bales does not include other carry-over stock from years prior to 1933.

The new crop has shown slight improvement the past week, with dormant hills coming on. But rainy weather such as prevailed yesterday may easily set the crop back more than the past week has gained.

While several thousand acres of new hops have been planted in Oregon within the past two seasons, there have as yet been no definite figures on either the new acreage or the number of new growers. In spite of these new plantings, the 1934 crop will fall considerably below the normal yield for Oregon, hop men say, and it now looks as though superior quality will be the only redeeming feature for the crops.

SANDYS RESIGNS AS BUCKEROO DIRECTOR

MONTE MONTANA, May 31.—A shake-up in buckaroo association membership at the regular meeting Tuesday night resulted in the resignation of one member, Harry L. Sandys, and the election of a new director, Harvey Everhart, former Molalla mayor. Taking the place of Sandys, Henry Case will be chairman of the concessions committee, and George Case will be chairman of the finance committee.
