

COUNCIL ASKED TO OK H BONDS

Mayor to Call Special Meeting; Elliott Offers to Arbitrate on Price

McKay and City Attorney Chris J. Kowitz for consideration. Elliott stated this proposition as follows:

"The Oregon-Washington Water Service company will take for its property in Salem in cash, the amount determined to be the fair value, such determination to be made by three qualified, expert, experienced, disinterested appraisers, one to be appointed by the city, one by the company and the third by the other two."

If the city decides to accept this plan, Elliott wrote, "we will proceed at once to meet with the city's representatives for the purpose of working out and perfecting a proper contract . . . for the purpose of carrying forward the arbitration suggestion."

No comments on Elliott's suggestion were passed at last night's meeting.

Senator Charles L. McNary, the council was informed has telegraphed the following to Mayor McKay:

"I am satisfied with your progress for mountain water and suggestion about river water has been eliminated. Allotment of \$2,500,000 still stands with officials anxious for an amicable arrangement between city and water company rather than delays involved in condemnation, Cunningham en route to Oregon and will explain all angles."

This message, received May 31 but kept secret until yesterday, was interpreted by City Attorney Kowitz as meaning definitely that PWA officials now approved of the Little North Fork of the Santiam as a water supply source in opposition to the Willamette river because of the people's vote favoring the former.

Kowitz also had a letter from Cunningham but declined to divulge its contents.

The council took another step desired by the public ownership league when it authorized the cancellation of two warrants for \$1000 and \$2000, respectively, held by Bear and Cunningham for services rendered, and rescission of these warrants in \$500 denotations. This action will facilitate the league's plan of creating a trust fund by popular subscription to obtain cash for the engineers so that they may proceed with their surveys. When the city redeems these warrants, the subscribers to the trust fund will be paid back with 6 per cent interest.

Neighbor Quarrel Gets Into Council

What became of the records of the disorderly conduct complaint against Leon W. DuBois, 460 University street, filed against his neighbor, N. J. McSwain, 448 University, several weeks ago and what disposition of the case, if any, was made by Municipal Judge Poulson?

These questions, brought up at last night's city council session by DuBois personally, were referred to City Attorney Chris J. Kowitz. DuBois told the aldermen he had a disagreement with McSwain over a property boundary and after he had had his lot surveyed and found himself in the right, he had been assaulted by McSwain.

Before McSwain was arrested on the complaint DuBois filed against him, Judge Poulson accepted \$5 bail from McSwain, DuBois said. But DuBois was later unable to find a record of McSwain's arrest. Judge Poulson says McSwain forfeited the bail, DuBois and Kowitz stated.

Whether or not the city will contribute \$300 more than the \$395 it budgeted for playground supervision this summer will be decided by the park committee, headed by Walter Fuhrer. The request for extra funds, filed with the council by Roy S. Keene, chairman of the city playground board, was referred to Fuhrer's committee last night.

CAPLANS PURCHASE OLD BUSINESS BACK

Off-again, on-again Finnegan of railway fame had nothing on David Caplan, Salem grocer who disposed of his business at 137 North Commercial street here on March 1 of this year only to repurchase it during the first week of June. However, he and Mrs. Caplan had a vacation devoid of thoughts of business in the interval.

A little investigation proved to the Caplans that it would be difficult to find a business as good as they had built up here so they returned to Salem. Yesterday they announced that they had bought again the grocery store operated for the past three months by C. E. McCoy and Mrs. Vastilla Eddy under the name of Eddy & McCoy.

Governor Moves to Lift Burden in Crime Cases

Governor Meier yesterday issued a conditional pardon to Earl Melvin Smith who is serving a term of two years in the state penitentiary here for forgery. Smith was received at the prison from Wasco county on June 22, 1933.

The pardon provides that Smith shall be employed regularly and report to the state parole office monthly.

Another conditional pardon was issued to Kenneth Ambler who is serving a term of one year in the Multnomah county jail for forgery. He was committed to jail on January 18, 1934. This pardon was recommended by Judge Hewitt and other Multnomah county officials.

The governor remitted part of a fine of \$100 imposed upon Andrew C. Eakin of Columbia county, who was convicted on a charge of driving a motor vehicle while intoxicated. The records show that Eakin already has served a jail term of 30 days. Eakin's family was said to be in destitute circumstances.

No Improvement in Bitten Doctor

BOISE, Idaho, June 4.—(AP)—Dr. William Erkenbeck "about held his own" today in his illness from the bite of a black widow spider.

Dr. Harold W. Stone, his physician said he had "held his own" the day but reported no definite improvement such as had been noted late last week. The Grandview, Idaho, physician has been in a semi-conscious condition since May 24 from the effects of the venom, received in a bite May 28.

Portland Police Busy With Chalk

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4.—(AP)—Alert automobile owners who have taken advantage of the concentration of the strike-besieged waterfront were surprised today when a bevy of police returned to the business section and commenced tagging cars which parked overtime.

Colonel B. Lawson, chief of police, said the officers would continue their chalk marking as long as the waterfront remained as quiet as today.

Mourner Dies at Ralph Home

SAN FRANCISCO, June 4.—(AP)—One woman died and another's leg was broken as they fell together in a crowd of mourners outside the home of Governor James Ralph, Jr., into which his body was being carried, here today.

Mrs. Theresa McGready, 39, standing bareheaded in rain, suddenly collapsed. Her mother, Mrs. Nellie Campbell, flung her arms about her and they fell together. Physicians said Mrs. McGready died from a heart ailment.

were in a large measure responsible for it.

"Such a procedure would throw a bombshell into the European area and economic repercussions over all five continents and would postpone indefinitely the chances of world recovery."

The note said that while the British deferred payment until "it becomes possible to discuss an ultimate settlement of inter-governmental war debts with a reasonable prospect of agreement," the British government has no intention of repudiating its obligations and is prepared to enter into a discussion of the war debts question whenever President Roosevelt feels such a conference would produce results of value.

Debt payment totaling nearly one-half billion dollars from ten other nations are also due on June 15, and the state department has received no information concerning the attitude any of the other governments will take.

In official quarters here, the opinion was expressed that this was the first time in the history of the British empire when that government had defaulted on obligations owed to another nation.

Scout field day will be held at the Woodburn pool, through which growers in the hills south-east of Silvertown have been disposing of their crops, will accept no more berries after Tuesday, June 5. Robert Victor Wilson, late pastor of the Englewood United Brethren church here whose body was not recovered after his drowning at Nelscott Memorial day, will be held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Clough-Barrick chapel. Bishop Ira Warner, under whom the 28-year-old minister had held his first and only non-student charge, will officiate.

RECONSIDER CLAIM
On the plea of Alderman Walter Fuhrer the city council last night voted to reconsider the claim of Shannon Hogue, Salem high school teacher, for damages done to his automobile when it was struck by a speeding police car last winter. Fuhrer held that the city was morally liable, if not legally, in the case. The claim was referred back to the police committee with instructions to seek a compromise with Hogue, who asked for \$295 damages.

HONOR FATHER BUCK ON ANNIVERSARY

Beloved Priest Celebrates Silver Jubilee; Reception Tonight, Parish Hall

Honoring Rev. Father J. R. Buck of St. Joseph's Catholic church here as he celebrates his silver jubilee, 25 years in the service of his people as a priest, his parishioners are tonight holding a public reception for him in the parish hall on Chemeketa street. His friends within and outside his church are invited to call and greet him at 8 o'clock.

Born in Minnesota, Father Buck received his education at St. John's university and Mt. Angel seminary. He was ordained at Mt. Angel June 5, 1909.

His first pastorate was at Forest Grove where, during his seven years as minister, he built up the nearby parishes of Cornelius and Gaston. Eighteen years ago he was appointed parish priest of Salem and from that date has been an untiring and zealous worker for his people and the community. For eight years he was state chaplain of all the state institutions here.

Ten years ago he went to Rome, and for four years he visited many famous churches and shrines. Since his return he has devoted much of his time to writing religious books, particularly those of an instructive nature of interest to protestants as well as Catholics. Although he is known not only in this country but abroad as well for his writings, he is best known here for his charities.

Among the persons who have come to Salem to join in the festivities of his silver jubilee are two of his sisters, Mrs. E. A. Sharp of Cornelius and Mrs. Stella Dinmore of Montevideo, Minn. Personal and lifelong friends, Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Riel are here from Vancouver, B. C. Father Buck and Mr. Riel enjoy a rare friendship begun more than 40 years ago on a lonely prairie in Minnesota where Father Buck was a school teacher. They have traveled much together and Riel was at the ordination ceremonies 25 years ago.

Mass will be celebrated this morning by Father Buck assisted by many of the priests of Mt. Angel.

Robbery Try Nets Five Years

Robert Hall, found guilty of conspiracy in a robbery attempt on the George E. Waters' warehouse three weeks ago, was given five years in the state penitentiary yesterday by Judge L. G. Lewelling. The sentence is the maximum prescribed by law for burglary not in a dwelling.

Hall was found guilty by a circuit court jury last week. He pleaded that he did not know that Albert Pullman, who was shot in the attempted burglary and died, was a thief. Hall also contended he was drunk the morning of the burglary attempt and did not know where he was until he felt the cold steel of police officers' handcuffs on his wrists.

Carry Question to State Court

ROSEBURG, June 4.—(AP)—The state supreme court will be asked to decide whether a police officer has authority under the laws of Oregon to force a prisoner to go before a physician to determine if the prisoner is intoxicated.

The question was raised in an appeal filed by R. S. Clemmons, a beer salesman convicted in circuit court of drunken driving and sentenced to 30 days in jail and fined \$150.

Clemmons claimed that a state policeman who arrested him forced him to go before a physician for examination. His attorneys claim this action violated the clause of the state constitution which provides that a man charged with a crime cannot be forced to give testimony against himself or damaging to his case.

BEND, Ore., June 4.—(AP)—Larry Shattuck, 13, was confident he had lost all his baby teeth many years ago, but a Bend doctor convinced him he hadn't, producing a baby tooth from the boy's ear for proof.

For some time Larry had not been feeling well. So his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Obil Shattuck of the state agricultural experiment station at Burns, brought him to Bend for medical attention. An x-ray examination revealed a tiny tooth embedded near the ear drum.

PARTY HEADS SEEK COMMITTEE HEAD

Republican National Committee to Select Chairman in Chicago

CHICAGO, June 4.—(AP)—Emerging from a day of conferences and caucuses, republican national committee men said tonight they were still shopping for the "model leader" to guide the party's comeback fight.

Their formal meeting to elect a new national chairman and chief fence builder comes tomorrow morning, but may not, they said, result in an immediate selection. They were preparing to issue the first statement of the party's fall platform, and said policies might have to be determined before an executive is chosen.

At the last comparable meeting, committee men recalled, selection of a chairman took three days. That was in 1919, when as now, there was no incumbent president to direct matters.

The choice over which the committee men were frowning was between an "old" republican and a new one, the members said privately. They said dispute will be whether to select a member of the old Hoover cabinet — with three possible candidates — or a younger man, preferably out of the west.

Former President Hoover, titular head of the party, was not on hand, and the committee men declared he was not wielding long-distance influence.

Of the westerners, a dark horse candidate, figured prominently in the hotel corridor gossip tonight. He was John D. H. Hamilton, Topeka, Kas., former state republican chairman and active in the American Legion.

Sharing the shifting limelight with him was Walter S. Hallman of West Virginia, said to have the support of Charles D. Hilles, New York committee man, and those insistent upon having "new blood" in the party.

Backed by the older republicans, again according to rumor, were three former Hoover cabinet members. They were Ogden F. Mills, New York, former secretary of the treasury; former Postmaster General Walter F. Brown of Ohio, and former Secretary of War Patrick Hurley of Oklahoma.

Candidates who could be classed as loose political boundaries as from the middle west had an edge, the dopesters said, because of a feeling that the chief job of the new chairman will be the winning of the west.

Harrison E. Spangler, Iowa's national committeeman, had considerable support in tonight's discussions, as did a candidate not a member of the committee—Hanford McNider, President Hoover's minister to Canada.

He is survived by two sons, Tom of Lebanon, and Gilbert of Minnesota, Minn.

DUNNE ADDRESSES VFW CONVENTION

MEDFORD, June 4.—(AP)—Joe E. Dunne of Portland, republican nominee for governor, addressed the Veterans of Foreign Wars at their state convention here tonight.

Plans for rehabilitation and unemployment relief were described this afternoon by James E. Van Zandt, national commander-in-chief.

C. E. Wemberly, representing the American Legion, addressed the convention and thanked the organization for "cooperation with the American Legion."

Reports of veterans' relief membership gains also were read. The encampment closes Wednesday with election of state officers and selection of the 1935 convention city.

The ladies' auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars opened their sessions this afternoon with Cecile Hardie of Portland, presiding. The regular business session will be tomorrow.

The visiting auxiliary officers were greeted by the southern Oregon organization auxiliaries at a luncheon. Delegates attending were from Salem, Roseburg, Portland, Hillsboro and Forest Grove.

Arrest P. Cleary on Local Charge

Pat Cleary of Tacoma, Wash., a man whom city police say has a long record for minor arrests, is expected to be taken into justice court here today to face a charge of breaking into the J. P. Conger printing shop, 370 1/2 State street, early Sunday night. He is charged with burglary not in a dwelling.

Police said Cleary was discovered in the shop by M. J. Aschm, Conger's salesman. Aschm, spying Cleary in the office when he opened the front door, slammed the door shut and ran outside and down the nearby alley just in time to see Cleary jumping over the room. Aschm called city police and with an officer found Cleary entering the Woolpert and Legg drug store, where he was arrested.

Nothing was stolen from either the Conger shop or the Foster Realty office next door which Cleary is alleged to have first entered by way of a transom.
