

HUGE PROGRAM GIVEN BACKING

525 Million Appropriation Favored by President At Conference

On the basis of a survey made by officials closely in touch with the drought, however, provisional allotments for the \$525,000,000 include:

One hundred million dollars for work and direct relief.
One hundred million dollars for a cattle and livestock purchase program.
One hundred million dollars for the processing and distribution of cattle and other animals bought.

One hundred million dollars for a feed loan.
Fifty million dollars for the purchase and elimination from cultivation of sub-marginal lands in North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana and Wyoming.

Fifty million dollars for the establishment of work camps, similar to the civilian conservation corps, in the parched sections.
Twenty-five million dollars for seed purchases.

Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic leader, said after the conference that a separate bill probably was the best way to handle the drought but that the fund might be added to the pending deficiency appropriation bill.

The following julep pie recipe has a cool, tangy flavor that is irresistible:

Strawberry Julep Pie
3 cups strawberries
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 1/2 cups water
1/2 teaspoon mint flavor
1/2 tablespoon unflavored gelatin dissolved in 1/4 cup cold water and 1/4 teaspoon salt
Wash and hull berries. Drain. Mix sugar, flavor and water. Bring to a boil, simmer slowly for ten minutes and pour over soaked gelatin. Stir until dissolved. While syrup is hot pour over strawberries and stir. Let stand until gelatin is ready to set. Pour into baked pastry shells. Chill in refrigerator and serve with whipped cream. Six portions.

Permission for New Railroad is Asked of Board

SAN FRANCISCO, June 5.—(P)—Approval of a railroad building project for a line to run from Arcata, California, to Crescent City, and then inland to Grants Pass, Oregon, will be sought from the Pacific coast transportation advisory board when it meets here Friday.

G. L. Hird, secretary of the Santa Rosa chamber of commerce, will outline the project to the board's executive committee. The project would form a connecting link by rail with the coastal line of the Northwestern Pacific at Arcata and the Southern Pacific at Grants Pass.

France Relieved at Debt Status, Talks Armament

PARIS, June 5.—(P)—France pushed aside the question of war debts with a feeling of relief today after learning Great Britain would make no payment on June 15 and parliament turned to consideration of the government's plan to borrow money to pay for reinforcing armaments.

Great Britain's attitude of coming finally to the French position of making no payments was attributed in some quarters to "America's haughty attitude."

Nerves 10 to 12 cars, of 10 tons each, will be shipped. The association, which last year constructed a large new warehouse along the Oregon Electric tracks in the northern end of town, will employ 70 women on each crew, and at the peak of the season will run day and night shifts. Many more than enough women are already registered for the work.

One other fresh cherry shipper, Roy Hurst, has already announced plans to handle black cherries for eastern trade. Presumably he will pack from the Gile and Jenks warehouse.

Black cherries which this year are being used in the barrelling plants, will cut somewhat into the fresh cherry deal. Heretofore only Royal Annes have gone into the brine, but this season several of the barrellers are preparing some of the black varieties for the maraschino trade.

Royal Annes, of excellent quality, are rolling into the canneries and packing plants in great volume this week, and will continue for another two weeks.

CHERRIANS DECIDE UPON NEW ATTIRE

Tuxedos to Blossom Forth In Festival Parade is Vote at Meeting

Cherrians will march in the grand floral parade of the Rose Festival Thursday afternoon June 14 with a majority of the Cherrians marching in white trousers, tuxedos, straw hats, white shoes and black ties. Escorts for the float and Cherrian banners will appear in the traditional white Cherrian suits.

All this was decided upon last night at a called meeting of the Cherrians, George L. Arbuckle, King Bing, presiding.

It was definitely decided to enter a float in the floral parade and to decorate the float, the following committee was appointed: Oscar D. Olson, chairman; Walter T. Molloy, Donald E. Pritchett, Milo Rasmussen and Harry R. Hutton. As usual, Rose Festival authorities have assigned Rose Festival buttons which may be sold by the Cherrians to help in defraying expenses of the float, each button giving the wearer entrance to all festival events during the week with the exception of the symphony concert.

To sell these buttons, King Bing Arbuckle appointed the following committee: Reance W. Niles, chairman; A. A. Guefroy, Dr. Kenneth H. Waters, Donald C. Deckerbach, Harold Busiek, Dr. A. A. Keene, Chas. S. McElhinny, Van Wiedner, Oliver G. Myers, Carl Gabrielson and James M. Clark.

Chairman Niles will call this committee together and arrange details for the selling of these Rose Festival buttons.

As a committee on publicity and attendance, the following were appointed: J. T. Delaney, chairman; W. M. Hamilton and A. A. Guefroy.

A special committee will also be appointed to determine whether the Cherrians will go to Portland by special, as they did last year, whether to go on a regular Southern Pacific train, leaving Salem shortly after 10 o'clock on the morning of June 14.

In order to get together once more before going to Portland, Cherrians will meet at the chamber of commerce next Tuesday evening for a short drill parade and to discuss final arrangements.

AIRPLANE PLUNGES INTO OCEAN, CLAIM

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., June 5.—(P)—Constable Floyd McCabe of Lompoc reported tonight that two section hands working on the Southern Pacific railroad told him they saw a small, single-motored airplane plunge into the Pacific ocean off Point Conception at 4 p. m. today.

The plane, a two-seater, was northbound, McCabe said he was informed.

The constable said considerable blue and yellow wreckage was washed ashore several hours later, but no bodies had been found.

McCabe reported the section hands were unable to say how many persons were in the ship.

TURNER, COLFLESH WIN IOWA PRIMARY

DES MOINES, June 5.—(P)—A progressive republican and a Roosevelt democrat will battle for the Iowa governorship next fall, returns from yesterday's primary election showed today.

Dan Turner, a self styled progressive republican who held the office until the democratic landslide of 1932, won the republican nomination in a close contest with Ralph W. Colflesh, a former U. S. district attorney, on the basis of unofficial returns from all but 150 of Iowa's 2452 precincts.

His task will be to attempt to turn tables on the incumbent, Clyde L. Herring, who rode in with President Franklin D. Roosevelt two years ago and gave the state a democratic administration for the first time in 40 years.

ELECTION PLANNED FOR BERRY GROUPS

Four elections, each involving the selection of one member of the control committee of the Oregon and Washington black raspberry industry, have been set by Max Gehlhar, state agricultural director, for Thursday, June 7.

The persons chosen to serve on the control board shall be growers of black raspberries for processing and shall be residents of the district in which they are elected.

The places of the elections follow:

Sherwood district, comprising that part of Washington, Clackamas and Multnomah counties, south and east of the West Side Pacific highway running between Newberg and Portland, at the offices of the Sherwood Producers Cooperative at Sherwood.

Schools district, comprising that part of Washington county lying north and west of the West Side Pacific highway running between Newberg and Portland, at the office of the chamber of commerce at Hillsboro.

Salem district, comprising Marion, Polk and Linn, and all other counties south in the Willamette valley, at the office of the state department of agriculture.

Yamhill district, including Yamhill county, at the office of the Springbrook Packing company at Springbrook.

Park Trammell, Pepper Lead in Florida Voting

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., June 5.—(P)—Leading by wide margins over the three other candidates in the United States senatorial race, Senator Park Trammell and Claude Pepper of Tallahassee, virtually were assured late tonight of meeting in the second primary June 26.

Pepper was maintaining a margin of less than 200 votes over Trammell. With 524 of the state's 1233 precincts reported, the vote was: Charles A. Mitchell 11,041; Pepper 23,144; James P. Sikes 5131; Trammell 22,982 and Mrs. Hortense K. Wells 2206.

INSURED FIRE LOSS FOR YEAR REDUCED

Insured fire losses in Oregon during the year 1933 aggregated \$2,713,360.85, as against \$4,182,683.67 in 1932, according to the annual report of A. H. Averill, state fire marshal, filed in the executive department yesterday.

The sound value of this property for 1933 totaled \$83,377,640.53, as compared to \$81,902,477.41 in 1932. The actual insurance carried on the 1933 losses aggregated \$79,059,177.58, with insurance paid totaling \$2,266,375.46. The insured fire loss experience for the state in 1933 showed a reduction of 35 per cent when compared with that of 1932.

The report showed that 23 persons met death while 173 others were injured in fires during 1933. During the previous year there were 39 deaths and 213 persons injured. A total of 189 fires were reported for investigation. There were 11 convictions on charges of arson, exclusive of five confessions.
