

MAG DIPLOMAS PRESENTED 17

Largest Class Since Fire of 1926 is Graduated From Mt. Angel

MT. ANGEL, June 5. — Mt. Angel conferred degrees and diplomas on a class of 17 at its 47th annual commencement exercises held in the Mt. Angel auditorium Sunday afternoon at 2:30 p. m.

Frater Method Korn received the bachelor of arts degree with highest honors, while Frater Matthew Hughlett and Edmund Vander Zanden received their degrees with distinction. Willis L. Whalen of Portland and Peter A. Nohl of Mt. Angel were given honorable mention of scholarship. The very Rev. Prior Jerome awarded the degrees. Rev. Fr. Alcun, O.S.B., rector of Mt. Angel college, presided.

Rev. Francis Leipzig, pastor of St. Mary's church, Eugene, and an alumnus of Mt. A. C., gave an eloquent address to the graduating class. In his speech he told of the coming of the benedictine fathers to Oregon in 1882 and of their contribution to the cause of education in the northwest. The benedictine order has an educational experience of 1400 years. Fr. Leipzig said. He emphasized how the benedictine of Mt. Angel has been given the benefit of this treasury of tradition unto the youth of the western states.
