SHUT-INS TO GET GIFT OF FLOWERS

Flowers for shut-ins living in Salem and vicinity will be distributed next Sunday, June 10, by local florists, cooperating in a National Flower Shut-in movement which was inaugurated last year. Outstanding stars in the movie and radio world are participating in the event.

Among the notables are Mary Pickford, Walter Winchell, and Julia Anderson and Frank Crumit of radio note.

According to C. F. Breithaupt, chairman of the local committee, these stars are doing all in their power to obtain for the florist telegraph association, sponsors of the national movement, names and addresses of shut-ins who otherwise would be overlooked when the deliveries of flowers are made. Mr. Breithaupt already has a list of several scores of names received by Winchell in reply to his national appeal for addresses of shut-ins.

"The florists of America are ready for a big job," Breithaupt said. "Last year we took care of 150,000 shut-ins with free flowers; this year we expect to reach 250,000."

Gas Tax Brings 51 Millions to Fund, 15 Years

Oregon's tax on gasoline has yielded the state highway fund a total of \$51,667,000 since the first tax was imposed 15 years ago, figures released yesterday by the secretary of state's office show. These totals come after deduction of refunds totalling \$4,817,746 and of administrative expense of \$146,074.

The year 1931 showed the largest net income to the highway fund from the tax, \$6,204,612 be-

lieved. Last year with a total net receipt of \$6,187,937 came near the banner mark although the gallonage sold was not nearly as large. An additional one cent of tax imposed by the last legislature accounted for the increase over the 1932 figure.

Power of Milk Board to Face Test in Court

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—A test of the Oregon milk control board's authority to set milk prices is expected in the trial of L. A. Brandes who was arrested today and pleaded not guilty to selling milk below the specified schedule.

Brandes asked for a jury trial which was set for June 13. J. G. Smith of the milk control board's enforcement department, charged that Brandes sold a gallon of four per cent milk for 30 cents whereas the price fixed by the board is 37 cents.

Undue Pressure for Bundy Will Charged, Heirs

Heirs at law of the late Clark Bundy, who died recently at the age of 91, have filed a petition in probate court to set aside his will on the ground that it is an illegally issued document and that it was executed under undue pressure. The petitioners ask that the will, admitted to probate here several months ago, be declared void.

Objectors include Lucy M. Rowland, Carl A. Bundy, Clyde Bundy, Dale Bundy, Paul Bundy and Louise Price Bundy.

They assert that Rosy B. Coulson, executrix and largest heir under the will, exerted undue influence on the late Mr. Bundy.

County Eyes Oil Program; Start Likely Near Fall

Marion county is approaching the problem of oiling roads cautiously but it is likely some oiling will be done late this summer and early this fall. Roy Meison, commissioner, said yesterday. Meison said members of the county court were acquiring data on the cost of road oiling including the cost of acquiring the necessary machinery.

In general, the road program for the county is light this year. A two to three-mile stretch of new road is being built in the Brooks district and some short stretches are being constructed in other sections of the county but the program in the main is much smaller than normal.

2 MORE BRIDGES TO BE BID UPON TODAY

Bids for bridge and road construction aggregating a cost estimated at approximately \$1,200,000 will be opened at a meeting of the state highway commission to be held in Portland tomorrow.

The two largest projects include the Umpqua and Siuslaw bridges, two of the five spans to be constructed on the Oregon coast highway with funds borrowed from the federal public works administration. The cost of the Umpqua bridge was estimated at \$570,000 and the Siuslaw bridge \$460,000. Contracts for these bridges will be awarded subject to approval by the public works administration officials.

Another important contract involves the proposed undercrossing on the Pacific highway a short distance north of Ashland. This improvement will cost approximately \$70,000 and will be paid for out of federal funds.

Contract for the south approach of the Coos Bay bridge also will be awarded at this meeting of the commission.

Other projects include 1.4 miles of grading and paving on the Swift section of Swift secondary highway No. 120 in Multnomah county, and the Marion-Linn county bridge over the North Santiam river near Mill City.

Lewis at End of First 2 Years in West Point

Cadet Paul Arthur Lewis, son of Mrs. C. I. Lewis of 324 North Capitol street, has completed his second year of academic work at the United States military academy at West Point. After the June week ceremonies have closed Lewis will be granted a furlough of 11 weeks.

Lewis is a graduate of Salem high school and attended the University of Hawaii before being appointed to West Point from the first district by Ex-congressman Hawley. He is a qualified rifle sharpshooter and pistol expert. He has assisted each year in the production of the annual play, "Hundredth Night." During the absence of the furlough class last summer he was appointed acting corporal.

Cadet Lewis will report at West Point August 28 to resume his studies. Upon graduation in June, 1936, he will be commissioned a second lieutenant.

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
