

AIRPORT PROJECT TO BE COMPLETED

Council Votes Money and Gravel Will be Hauled From Swim Pool

SILVERTON, June 5 — The city council voted, at its June meeting held Monday night, to pay for the use of the machinery and the trucks to haul the gravel to the airport so that the SERA program now underway at the port may be continued.

Gordon Johnson of the SERA division was at the council and explained what part of the expenses the city would have to furnish in the improvement program and after some discussion members of the council felt that while money is at a premium right now, still the city could not afford to turn down the improvement program.

It was learned that there would be sufficient gravel in the swimming pool, washed down during the winter, for present needs. This has to be removed anyway, it was said. The city is to furnish money for the machinery which removes the gravel and also pay for the use of trucks to haul the gravel from the pool to the airport, a distance of a mile and a half. It was estimated that the hauling will cost approximately \$400. It was also estimated that there would be approximately 1800 yards of gravel in the pool and that three trucks could haul it all away in eight days.

To Open Bids Monday
The department of commerce will pay for the draining and tiling of the field. Two runways will be arranged for, one 3200 feet going north and south and the other going east and west.

It was voted that the bids for clearing a swimming pool of gravel should be opened Monday night of next week. The bids will be advertised for at once, in charge of this is the park committee composed of Dr. C. R. Wilson, C. Anderson and Hugh Range.

An application from J. W. Frank of Mt. Angel to haul rubble from Silverton in the place of the late Oscar Cavender was read and tabled. It was explained that Theodore Grace had purchased Mr. Cavender's equipment and in as much as Mr. Grace is a local resident the matter was left with the understanding that he do the hauling.

Parasites to Come
A letter was read explaining that the order for infected earwig parasites had been received and would be filled as soon as possible. Sufficient money had been raised at Silverton by subscription to pay for the earwigs it was said Monday night.

The council voted to close the block on Jersey street for two weeks a short time each day as requested by the Calvary congregation. A two weeks' summer school will be conducted at Calvary church and Rev. Ernest Larson asked that the block in front of the church be closed during the morning recess period.

RUSH CONTINUES AT LOCAL JOB OFFICES

Many Cherry Pickers Given Employment; SERA Funds Cut, Will Carry Load

Though slowing up from Monday's rush, job finding activities of the national re-employment agency, 250 Court street, continued lively yesterday. By the end of office hours, Manager D. D. Dotson had sent 67 men and women to work.

Cherry picking led in giving employment. Forty-seven persons were placed at this work, five at wood cutting, four each at loganberry picking and labor on the Sarama Butte creek bridge contract, highway construction and common labor.

Monday the agency did the biggest business in sending men and women to work it had experienced since Dotson took over its management, or since May 2, 1932. Altogether 195 jobs were filled, including 128 at cherry picking.

Not yet noting any decrease in the number of relief laborers available, D. G. Metcalfe, SERA placement officer, this week sent 280 men and women back to work on SERA projects at Leslie and Olinger playgrounds, Highland and Englewood schools, the statehouse employment survey, the state fairgrounds, the sewing project and the Silverton airport.

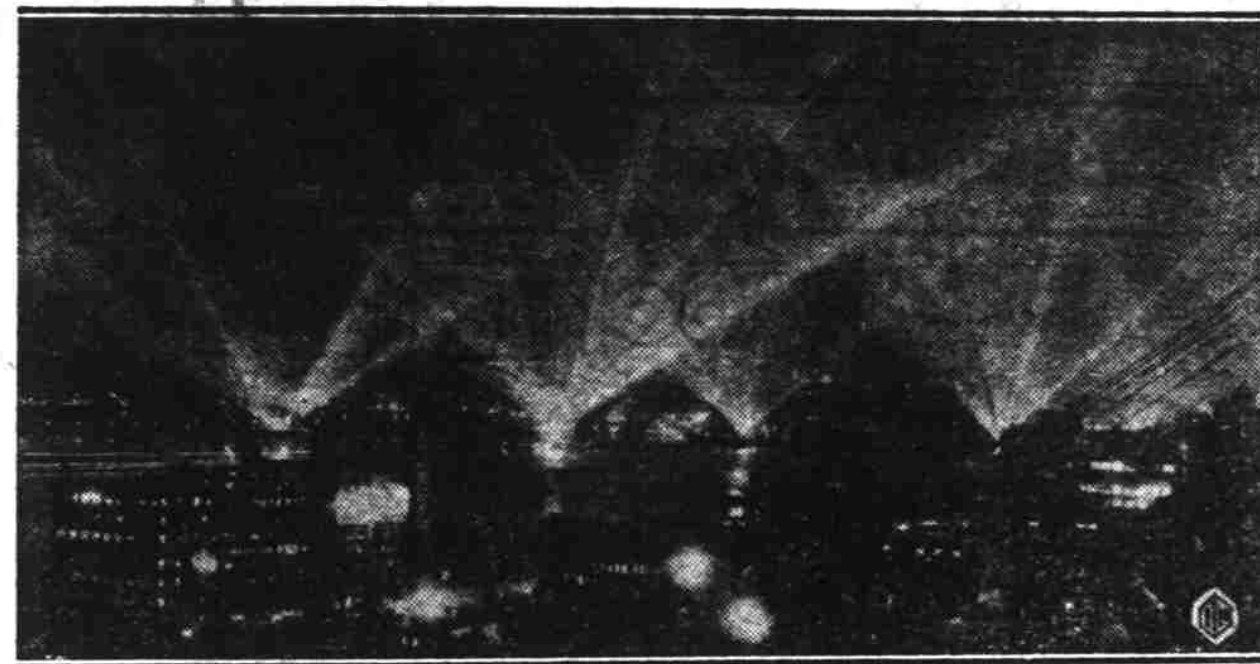
