TO HOLLYWOOD
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QUICK RESULTS

PORTLAND, June 5. — (AP) — Although an attempt, based on reputed supply and demand, was made here at the late session of the produce exchange to bolster the price of butter, no further change in quotations was posted. Speculative interests were said to be in control of the price-making. An enormous output is being absorbed, with California speculators taking the bulk of outside shipments. There are reports these stocks are being kept in storage and that ultimately they will find an outlet in the eastern states.

Trading in the egg market was showing a generally steady tone although a fractional advance was quoted for specific lots on the exchange. This was not generally reflected on the open market.

Keen demand was showing for live chickens with some betterment in the price situation for Leghorn hens which are extremely scarce and in keener call.

Wholesalers report a complete lack of demand for live ducks and for dressed rabbits.

Red currants are now being offered here, the initial supply for the wholesale trade being priced nominally around \$2 rate.

Country killed meats were unchanged.

Cherry market was slow and prices lower.

Tomato market was steady, from 65c to \$1.20 for hothouse.

New potatoes continue to weaken.

Berry markets were steady to a trifle lower, especially for raspberries.
