Jones Going East—Professor W. C. Jones of Willamette university leaves next Tuesday for New York city where for the summer he will attend Teachers' college, Columbia university. Disease Increased—The number of new communicable disease cases reported in Marion county rose to 23 last week, including two cases at the state tuberculosis hospital. Other cases were ten of chickenpox, six of scarlet fever, two of measles and one each of influenza, whooping cough and pneumonia. In Polk county two cases of chickenpox and one each of scarlet fever, influenza and whooping cough were reported.

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Attack No-Ad Bill—Arguments were heard in the state supreme court Wednesday in two cases attacking the constitutionality of the 1933 legislative act, authorizing the state board of dental examiners to revoke the licenses of advertising dentists. The suits were filed by Harry Semler of Portland and S. T. Donahue of Eugene. The lower courts in the Semler and Donahue cases had held against the plaintiffs.

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Must Have License—It is unlawful for a person to whom a boat puller's license has been issued to operate a gillnet without having procured a license to do so. Attorney General Van Winkle held in an opinion handed down Wednesday. Van Winkle also held that the person to whom a gillnet license has been issued must be actually present to supervise such gillnet operations.

Mrs. Tracy Sues—Mrs. Leonard Tracy filed suit here yesterday asking a divorce from Albert Tracy to whom she was married in Vancouver, Wash. in 1918. She asks the custody of their five children and \$40 a month for their support. Mrs. Tracy says her husband has been cruel to her, on one occasion striking her severely in the head.

McRae Trial Today—David McRae, arrested yesterday on an assault charge in which his wife, Cleo, is the complaining witness, will have a trial in justice court at 9:30 o'clock this morning. McRae is out on \$500 bond. McRae pleaded guilty last fall to a similar charge, also preferred by the wife. On that count he was fined \$15.

Sues for Divorce—Edna Blaco filed suit for divorce here yesterday from E. R. Blaco whom she married in 1927 at Vancouver, Wash. She claims he had a bad disposition. She asks the custody of their one son and \$15 a month for his support.

Jobs Numerous—Ninety men and women went to work yesterday on jobs secured through the national re-employment agency. Forty-eight of these were cherry, 18 loganberry, 14 blackcap and two blackberry pickers. For the first time in over a week no vacant jobs at fruit harvesting were chalked up on the board.

Sues for \$1000—Rudolf Schmidt yesterday filed suit against Rich L. Reimann, B. W. Battleson and others, seeking to collect a \$1000 real estate mortgage. The original loan was for \$1200 and was made in 1926. Reimann subsequently sold the property and the buyers in turn resold it. All parties to the transaction are named in the suit.

\$538,000 PAYROLL ISSUED FOR STATE

Highway Department Gets \$175,000; State Schools Require \$140,000

The total state payroll for May was approximately \$538,000, according to figures released yesterday by the secretary of state's offices. This sum included all institutional payrolls where the money is received, directly or indirectly, from state income. It also included payments made for circuit judges and for district attorneys who are all paid by the state.

Of the aggregate payroll, approximately \$175,000 went for the state highway department while \$140,000 went for the University of Oregon, Oregon State college and the three normal schools. The payroll for the several state institutions was \$52,507.

Various departments and commissions had a total payroll of \$171,077 and represented salaries paid 1434 employees. Included in these bureaus was the state police, the state liquor commission, the industrial accident commission, the department of agriculture, the state tax commission, the secretary of state's office including the motor vehicle division and other state administrative departments.

The compilation was made in response to numerous public statements by State Treasurer Holman who said he had been unable since coming to Salem to ascertain how much was paid to state employees and which departments received the moneys.

Hoyers to Attend Erickson Burial

Mr. and Mrs. George M. Hoyer and Mr. and Mrs. Milton Hoyer and family will go to Estacada today where tomorrow they will attend the final rites for Izer A. Erickson, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. George Hoyer who died in Spokane Monday afternoon. Funeral services were held in Spokane Wednesday; burial will be in Estacada tomorrow at 2 p. m. Erickson is survived by his widow, Lillian Hoyer Erickson.

Registrants Reported—Non-resident motor vehicle registrations in Oregon for the first five months of this year, aggregated 15,648, as against \$2,526 for the entire year 1933, according to a tabulation prepared yesterday by P. J. Stadelman, secretary of state. Registrations in May of this year totaled 7493 as compared with 6451 in May of last year.

\$14,788 in Estate—The estate of the late Harry C. O'Neill has assets of \$14,788, according to an appraisal filed yesterday in probate court here. The largest asset is a tract of land appraised at \$9000. One bank account totals \$1808. Francis O'Neill is executor of the will.

To Sell Bond—Permission to Carrie A. Hurst, administratrix of the estate of the late Emma Hurst, to sell a \$500 bond, was granted yesterday in probate court. The bond, a \$500 Lincoln county road bond due in September, 1935, has a value of \$400. It will be sold to the highest bidder at private sale.

Hardy Gets License—Herbert C. Hardy, senior at Willamette university, yesterday obtained a license to marry Edith Eloise White, county relief worker. The ceremony will be performed June 11 here by Rev. David Hardy.

Marion and Polk Dunne Committee Spends \$100, Say

David F. Graham, republican, for representative in congress from the second congressional district, expended \$392.50 in conducting his primary election campaign, according to an expense account filed in the state department here.

The time for filing expense accounts in connection with the primary election expired Tuesday. The Marion and Polk counties Joe E. Dunne for governor committee, by W. A. Johnson, spent \$100.

Another expense account, filed by Ralph M. Erwin, for representative in congress from the third district, Multnomah county, expended \$351.89.

Oregon to Run on Cash Basis Until July 15 or Later

The state of Oregon, on the basis of present funds and expected revenues, will be able to operate on a cash basis until July 15 or August 1, Fred Paulus, deputy state treasurer, announced yesterday.

Paulus said a tabulation prepared June 1 showed a balance in the general fund of \$32,884.52. In addition to these funds there will be received by July 1, state corporation department fees totaling \$350,000 and second quarter state taxes amounting to \$260,000.

Cash in the state treasury on June 1 aggregated \$4,932,277.48, with investments in custody of the treasurer totaling \$7,837,114.02. Paulus declared that all state funds were in a satisfactory condition.

Hal Patton Will Back Joe Dunne

Hal D. Patton, chairman of the Holman-for-Governor club in this county, said yesterday that he would support Joe E. Dunne heartily for governor. "After Mr. Dunne's nomination I wrote to the senator to ascertain if he would make his home in Salem if elected," Patton said. "The senator replied that he would. I am satisfied that he will make a good governor and that he should receive the full support of the republican organization."

Gallage Income on Liquor Grows

Gallage tax receipts by the state liquor commission are increasing steadily, it was reported yesterday at the capitol. Estimates of May gross income from the tax are placed at \$33,000, the largest month since the tax became operative. The monthly report on the operations of the state liquor stores is being prepared and will be ready about June 15. May operations are expected to show the largest volume for any month to date.

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WHY DELAY? DEVERS TELEGRAPHS TO PWA

Information Asked on Bridge Funds; Decision Urged for Today's Meet

J. M. Devers, attorney for the state highway commission, yesterday sent a telegram to Colonel Henry M. Waite, deputy public works administrator, requesting information as to when federal funds for construction of the five Oregon coast highway bridges would be available.

"More than a year ago the state of Oregon applied to the federal government for funds with which to construct the five bridges and by so doing contribute to the relief of unemployment in this state," Devers' telegram read.

"The application was allowed, as you know, and the loan agreement executed by the federal government and the state of Oregon, but no funds have yet been made available. The delays imposed by the administration are provoking serious criticism of the public works administration in this state."

"The state has proceeded as rapidly and expeditiously as the government would permit, but the progress has been disastrously slow, and the results thus far have contributed nothing by way of relief."

"The highway commission has been urged to withdraw its application for loan and grant but does not wish to do so because of the great need for the bridges and the relief their construction will afford. The responsibility for delays cannot be ascribed to the Oregon highway department."

"The Oregon highway commission will be in regular session this week and will appreciate advice as to when definite and final action will be taken which will make funds available."

Devers' telegram to the public works administration followed repeated delays, which resulted in disappointments both within and without the highway department.

Balanced Budget for W. U. Likely

Willamette university will probably end the fiscal year, June 30, with a balanced budget, Business Manager Savage said yesterday. Whether income will balance out depends upon the returns from endowment received this month. Approximate expenditures of the university this year have been \$150,000.

N. Christenson Back; Business Growing, States

N. Christenson, who about four years ago started the West Coast soap manufacturing plant here, is in town from Seattle for about two weeks to attend to business matters here. Christenson went to Seattle two years ago, and now has interests in two soap making plants.

At the port of Seattle, he is associated with George B. Lamping, president of the port, in making bar, paste and liquid soaps with a bar, base. He has also organized the Pacific Chemical company, which makes and sells Double Crown brand liquid soaps, disinfectants, cable soap and boiler soap. Both enterprises are making splendid progress, and wide markets not only in Washington but other states have been found.

SALVATION ARMY'S WORK IS SKETCHED

Colonel Arthur Hopkins, one of the supervising officers of the Salvation Army, addressed the Salem Rotary club Wednesday sketching briefly the work of the Army among the "submerged tenth."

It is, he said, a patriotic and Christian organization. It maintains a network of institutions for the neglected and unfortunate. Its chief objective is to reach the heart of the individual. Hopkins referred to the Army's work on Leper island and on Devil's island where the French confine convicts.

"There are thousands of men incarcerated with the spirit of anarchy and communism, who have no regard for religion and would destroy the fundamentals which have been established. We try to put new heart in men, and to build on the fact that there is no person so low in the social scale but who has a divine spark within him."

ROADS DEPARTMENT READY, NEW FUNDS

All state highway department projects, under the original \$5,500,000 federal appropriation, will be under contract early in July, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, announced this week. Only three jobs will remain to be let following Thursday's meeting of the highway commission in Portland.

"This cleanup will leave us in excellent shape to start immediately upon road projects under the so-called Cartwright bill," Baldock continued, "if and when we obtain additional funds." Baldock said the various projects to be launched under the Cartwright bill already had been listed.

The three jobs to be awarded following Thursday's meeting of the highway commission include the Milwaukee under crossing, North Bend over crossing and construction of the highway through Toledo. These will cost approximately \$125,000.

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
