cases of demonstrable emergency, threatening destruction of business firms, employment or wage levels. Then only NRA shall have the right to determine what is the minimum price to be fixed and it shall be "the lowest reasonable cost"—not a profit-covering figure for the majority of enterprises.

3. Open price posting—which means letting all competitors know every other competitor's price—will be allowed only on these terms: that the prices be reported to a neutral, confidential agency; they shall become effective immediately without a waiting period for powerful competitors to argue the original filler into time with their own figures; prices may not be revised upward for 48 hours, but they may be cut right away and so reported.

John" himself arose. As officers spotted Carroll's car here, reports were current that another couple in a second automobile fled the Waterloo vicinity and police mobilized for a dragnet in efforts to apprehend the car. Whether it contained Dillinger could not be learned.

Carroll, a newer recruit to Dillinger's mob, had been accused of several midwestern bank robberies and two slayings. He was wanted for questioning in the killing of Federal Agent W. Carter Baum, slain near the Little Bohemia resort in Wisconsin as Dillinger and his cohorts blasted their way to freedom.

The second killing laid to Carroll was that of H. C. Perron, San Antonio city detective slain last December 11.

THOMAS ORDER IS FOUGHT IN COURTS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 7.—(AP)—The Northwestern Electric company today attacked in circuit court a recent order of State Utilities Commissioner C. M. Thomas fixing the value of the company's properties for rate making purposes.

The company asked for a decree setting aside the commissioner's order fixing the value of the property at \$9,412,827.52 as the basis for determining electric service rates for Multnomah county. The company alleged a fair value would be \$12,800,000.

The court also was asked to permanently enjoin Thomas or his successors from enforcing the order of making use of its figures in regulating the rates and charges of the company.

The commissioner will have 10 days in which to file his answer.

committee finds

WASHINGTON, June 7.—(AP)—Testimony that papers had been destroyed and that rifles and uniforms were smuggled into the United States was received today by a special house committee along with statements that President Roosevelt's forebears were Dutch Jews.

Phil A. Von Lilienfeld Toal, of Philadelphia, once employed by the "Silver Shirts," an American organization, was the witness who admitted destroying papers after he knew he was to appear before the committee that is investigating "un-American activities" in the United States.

Toal said, too, that when he worked for the Silver Shirts he sent out a letter saying, in part: "Reputable investigators seeking to establish correctly the Roosevelt family genealogy are forced to the conclusion that the president's forebears were Dutch Jews by the original name of Roosevelt inasmuch as they can find no trace of the Roosevelts in the vital statistics of Holland."

AIR LINER FORCED
DOWN, 2 ARE HURT

SEATTLE, June 7.—(AP)—Losing its way in a fog, a United Air lines passenger plane with five men and four women aboard crashed in the forest wilderness of the western Cascades late today but Dwight Hansen, the pilot, who made his way through the woods to search for aid, reported only two aboard had been injured.

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A woman believed to be Mrs. O. G. Johanneson, who boarded the plane at Spokane, received a possible broken leg and Ben Redfield, the pilot, had a broken arm and nose, Hansen said.

BIG ROAD PROGRAM
EYED BY CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, June 7.—(AP)—Authorization for a three year road construction program costing a billion dollars was agreed upon today by congressional conferees.

Managers for the house and the senate reached a complete agreement on a bill to authorize appropriations of more than \$500,000,000 during the next three years to be added to \$230,000,000 left over from last year's fund and \$250,000,000 to be contributed by the states.

Under the proposed program the federal government will add

\$100,000,000 to the \$230,000,000 carry-over for construction work during the next fiscal year.

For the fiscal year 1935, the federal aid highway program will be resumed, with the government putting up \$125,000,000 to be matched by the states. In addition a final grant of \$100,000,000 will be made under the emergency unemployment relief program.

central Montana, and northwestern Iowa. Scattered light rains were reported elsewhere.

Extent and importance of rain relief given blighted regions since Sunday had not been determined but crop experts generally were more convinced conditions, although acute, could get no worse. Wheat, they said, benefited little as destructive damage already had been done. Private estimates predicted a huge decrease in the 1934 wheat crop, some asserting the loss would be enough to almost wipe out the carryover surplus.

Corn, small grain crops that mature later than wheat, forage plants and pastures, were virtually saved from total destruction by timely rains. Harvest, however, would be cut materially, experts said. Loss of livestock, much of which was butchered hurriedly because of food shortage while market demands slumped, was great.

MITCHELL CHOSEN, RASPBERRY BOARD

C. H. Mitchell will represent the Salem district on the control board of the Oregon and Washington cold pack red raspberry industry, it was announced by Max Gehlhar, state director of agriculture, following an election Thursday.

The control board for this industry will be composed of eight members, of which number four will be selected in Oregon and four in Washington. Elections to select other members of the control board were being held in various raspberry producing sections of the state today.

The Salem district member of the control board for the black raspberry industry will be appointed by Gehlhar. This was necessary because of the inability of the black raspberry growers to hold an election Thursday.

The black raspberry control board will be comprised of 16

members, eight to be selected in Oregon and eight in Washington. Four of the Oregon members shall be processors and four growers.

Both of these boards are being selected under marketing agreements approved by Gehlhar.
