SCIO, June 7. — A deal was consummated a few days ago whereby T. M. Thomas of Scio, purchased an 83-acre tract of timber land from C. H. Fulz of Michigan. The land adjoins tracts owned by Thomas for many years and is situated a few miles east of Scio.

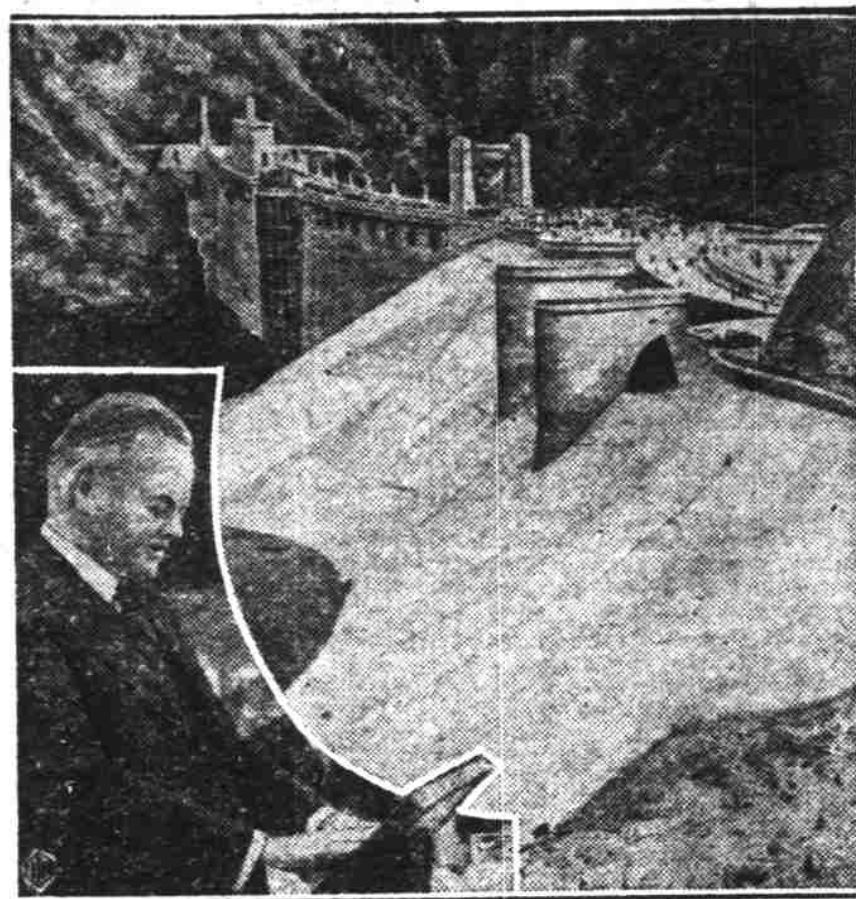

Berry Deal Closed
Approximately 75 tons of berries had been received at the Scio station at closing time Saturday, according to Jesse Wells, who was in charge of the work here for R. I. McLaughlin. Strawberries brought three cents per pound, loganberries two and one-half, and red raspberries about four cents. Most of the strawberries purchased here were barreled at the McLaughlin plant in Albany. About \$5000 was paid to growers in the Scio area for berries this year.
