S. J. Mayhew, veteran railroad telegrapher, who has been retired and lives on route 2, Salem, will preside at the birthday festivities as guest of honor. Mayhew served for many years as interstate commerce commission inspector for the Pacific northwest and has a national acquaintance among railroad employees and officials.

The birthday party will be held in Union hall, 457 Court street, at 8 o'clock, Saturday night, and is in charge of a committee consisting of Jim Preble, chairman of the Salem club, C. A. Phillips, agent at Brooks and representative of telegraphers on the Southern Pacific, and C. Bickie, agent at Quincy and representative of telegraphers on the Oregon Electric.

Silverton Hills Growers To Make Strawberry Week For Public Annual Event

SILVERTON HILLS, June 7. — Strawberry week, which was opened for the first time Wednesday morning, proved such a success that growers immediately took steps to form a permanent organization to endorse an annual Strawberry week in this district. The purpose of the affair is to provide an outlet for surplus berries in the hills. It was pointed out that in years when markets were good the surplus was apt to be small but a Strawberry festival week will still be held nevertheless. It was decided. Hans Christensen was made president of the festival organization and George Janic was made its secretary.

Since the opening of Strawberry week Wednesday morning, a steady stream of visitors with various sorts of containers have invaded the strawberry district to pick their own berries at the growers' offer at two cents a pound. Over 75 tons of berries were left in the fields Tuesday at midnight when the canneries closed down on the growers. The Strawberry week will last over Sunday, and as the best berry districts lie close in around Silver Falls park and its approaching roads, it is expected flocks of visitors will continue throughout the week end. Growers insist that pickers must bring their own containers.

The organization plans to have a big celebration at the close of Strawberry week in future years, but as the idea just had its birth this year, nothing of this sort had been arranged for.

Growers here give Alf O. Nelson, Silverton attorney, much credit in helping arrange and broadcast the Strawberry week.
