Investigate Plan for Old Cemetery at Providence

SCIO, Ore., June 9.—"Historic Providence church will grow to be considered a shrine for future generations."

The quotation is credited to the late Dr. John B. Horner, for many years historian at Oregon State college, Corvallis. Plans now are being considered by many interested persons to form an organization, probably a state corporation, to supervise and care for the cemetery at that place, according to a report in Scio this week.

It is believed an endowment fund could be readily provided and that it would be enlarged from year to year until revenue derived therefrom would adequately take care of the premises and make possible many improvements.

The site of the church and the cemetery is amid surroundings and scenery that could be made one of the beauty spots of the Willamette valley, it is explained. It is now the meeting place once each year to honor its founder, Elder Job Powell, pioneer circuit rider, and his associates, who established this historic place of

worship in 1853. The annual home-coming takes place on the third Sunday in June each year, and the usual preparations for the event are well under way. A program of speaking, music, reading, etc., is to open about 10 in the forenoon and will be resumed following basket dinner.
