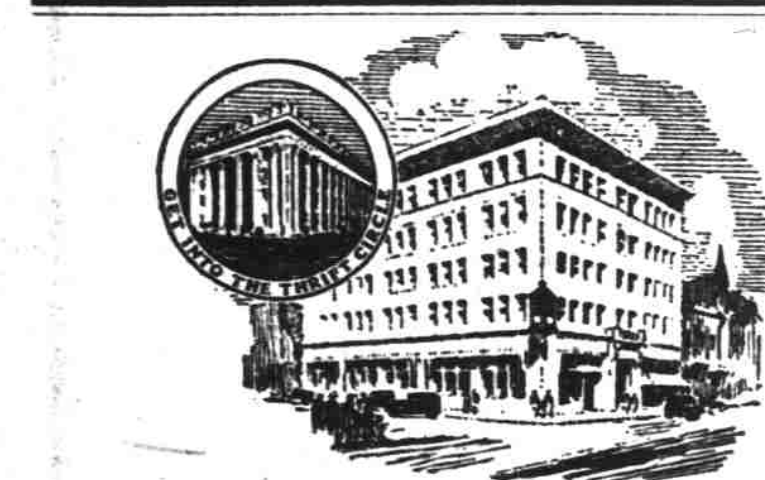

Cardenas Seen as Next President of Mexico



Although it is generally conceded that General Lazaro Cardenas, standard-bearer of the National Revolutionary Party (Administration), cannot be beaten in the race for President of Mexico which will be decided on July 1, the other four candidates are making a determined campaign. Cardenas' chief opponent is Roman Badillo, of the Anti-Continuist Party, who advocates religious liberty and friendship with the United States. General Antonio Villareal, candidate of the "Revolutionary Confederation of Independent Parties," relies on his political and military record, and Hernan Laborde, backed by workers and peasant group, offers a Communist program, including Federal aid to unemployed and redistribution of all lands. Only slightly milder is program of Colonel Adalberto Tejeda, Left Socialist Party, bitter enemy of the clergy.

vador, was at least 2000, and a report from the village of Ocopec, Honduras, said the storm killed 500 inhabitants.

The hurricane reached its highest intensity last Thursday, completely wiping out all the ordinary means of communication in El Salvador and damaging the international railroad of Central America to an extent which will require three months or more for repairs.

The heavy rainstorm which accompanied the hurricane washed down the sides of the volcanic mountains, causing lakes and rivers to leave their banks, imperiling with floods those who managed to flee from the landslides.

Relief Canning Starts at 7 a. m. Wednesday, Word

The county's portable cannery will be set in operation for the first time this season at Woodburn at 7 o'clock Wednesday morning. Relief Administrator Glenn C. Niles announced yesterday. The relief committee's case workers will notify those families who will be eligible to pack their fruit and vegetables on that day. This year's plan will be to begin canning operations at 7 a. m. daily and run until all of the produce to be packed has been used up, Niles said. On boom days last year 3200 cans were processed.

Telephone Rate Hearing Slated to Start Today

The final hearing in the investigation involving the rates, charges and practices of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company, will open in Portland today, with Charles M. Thomas, state utility commissioner, presiding. Thomas said the hearing probably would continue for four weeks.

Officials said this probe had been in progress for more than two years, and a number of hearings previously were held in Portland and in other parts of the state. Thomas will be assisted by Claude Lester, chief engineer for the utility commission.

Witnesses at the closing hearing will include high officials of the telephone company from the east.

Thomas said he expected to write a final order in the case not later than December 1.

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Youths Charged With Auto Theft After Crash; Rounds Of Beer Gardens Are Made

Traveling the rounds of beer joints near here in stolen cars Saturday night landed Arthur Staples and Robert Wallace, local youths, in troubles aplenty.

They were haled before Justice of the Peace Hayden Monday morning for larceny of an automobile belonging to Chester Barnes. Both youths took 24 hours to enter plea and are in the county jail in lieu of \$500 bail each. They will come before Hayden again at 10 a. m. today.

Staples appeared in court with spots of blood on his shirt, and Wallace had a wound, closed by several stitches, on his head—both witnesses of a collision in which they figured just after they had left a beer parlor near Brooks. The collision was with a car driven by Gladys Cooper, 2445 Hazel avenue, and came when Staples failed to make a turn and crashed into the Cooper car, said to have been traveling about 15 miles an hour. Staples was taken to the hospital here for treatment and later released. The youth was arrested Sunday night by state police.

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RETIREMENT PLAN TALKED BY FACULTY

Dean Frank M. Erickson of Willamette university was appointed by the Willamette university faculty at a meeting here Monday afternoon to be chairman of a committee which will consider a faculty retirement pension plan presented for approval by the board of trustees Saturday. Named with Erickson on the committee are Dean Roy M. Lockenour, Dr. S. B. Laughlin and Dr. Helen Pierce.

At the meeting, presided over by A. A. Schramm, chairman of the trustee committee on retirement, the faculty was given an opportunity to express their views on the plan. The retirement scheme as suggested by the board, pensions professors after they have reached the age of 65. To establish the perpetual retirement fund of \$7000 the faculty would contribute 5 per cent and the institution 2 per cent. The faculty voted approval of the general plan. The special committee will iron out specific details.

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
