Beer Dealers Warned — City police and City Treasurer C. O. Rice yesterday joined in warning all beer dealers in the city who have not yet applied for second half 1934 licenses that they must do so before Monday night's council meeting. This will be the last regular meeting at which applications can be granted before the second half starts, July 1. Police declared they would clamp down on unlicensed beer dealers after that date.
