

Woodburn Juniors Invade Salem for Decisive Game Today

LOCAL BOYS TO SEEK REVENGE

Game at 3:30, Olinger Field; if Champs Win County Race is Settled

The big game of the season for the Salem American Legion junior baseball team is scheduled for 3:30 o'clock this afternoon on Olinger field. At that time the strong Woodburn team, so far undefeated in the county league, will make its only appearance here.

Winning from Stayton with considerable ease Sunday, Woodburn got along for the most part without the services of Kendall, its ace pitcher, and he will be fresh for today's game. By contrast, Curry who has been doing most of Salem's chugging had a rough day at Silvertown, collapsing from his exertions in the boiling heat after the game. He is reported to be feeling better and will be recovered and ready to go again.

Woodburn defeated Salem by one run on the Woodburn diamond recently but Curry at that time out-pitched Kendall and the defeat was caused by poor support. Salem's fielding Sunday was all but perfect and if it can hold up today the outcome may be different.

Although Woodburn has won three games and no other team more than one, the race isn't over; if both Salem and Silvertown should turn the tables and Salem also defeat Stayton a second time, it would tie up the race; furthermore in that case Silvertown would participate in the tie if it defeats Stayton today. On the other hand, a Woodburn victory today would settle the championship.

Coach Frank Brown of the Salem team announced Tuesday that his lineup today would be the same as in the last several games.

CURT COMMENTS

CURTIS

Tentative plans in connection with the formal opening of the Neskowin golf course Sunday call for exhibition matches in which such luminaries as Dr. O. F. Willing, Dr. Cliff Baker, Johnny Robbins who recently won the state championship, Edwin Neustadter, Ross McIntyre, Harvey Lounsbury and several other leading golfers will participate. This feature is in addition to the opportunity afforded members of all clubs in the Salem vicinity to do some playing themselves—and we have heard hints that still more is to be offered. Of course there is also the opportunity to visit the Neskowin resort, which is attraction enough in itself.

Last summer we made a formal inspection of the Neskowin course and can recommend it as a highly diverting layout because of several unusual features; the springy footing, the elevated teeing ground affording a novel shot on one of the short holes, and the ingenious design of the course which makes it appear much easier to play than it really is.

The problem of irrigation is no problem at all at Neskowin; not so many years ago the entire layout was a swamp and that of course explains that strange springiness of the turf although the place is now thoroughly drained. It is crossed by several streams and doesn't need any artificial watering.

A good many golfers around here are surprised when we tell them about the Bend course that we visited a week ago, with its smooth, firm turf, so firm that with the stroke one habitually uses in this vicinity, divots refuse to be cut; the club will bounce off or dig in, depending on the angle. We presume that on getting used to that turf, a golfer will take a firmer grip and manage to cut a divot if the shot calls for it. But we didn't notice many divot holes; the grass is thick and the ball rests high.

Knowing that the country around Bend is supposed to be quite arid, valley golfers are surprised that such turf could have been developed. The answer is that the Bend club has plenty of water and what's still more significant, no pumping bill. They have a regular allotment of water from an irrigation ditch, run into a reservoir from which it is piped, with large mains, to the course; the supply is so generous that there will be three or four sprinklers operating on each fairway, and that isn't just occasionally but every day, about nine months out of the year.

Just off the fairways, you'll encounter the native sagebrush and bunchgrass; no rank growth in which to lose a ball, but loose sandy soil and some lava rock; we've met many sand traps easier to negotiate. Add to that the pine trees, pleasant to the eye but hazardous to the shot, which were left on the fairways, and you'll understand why a dozen professionals played there a few weeks ago and only one of them cracked par. Most of them were up in the 80s.

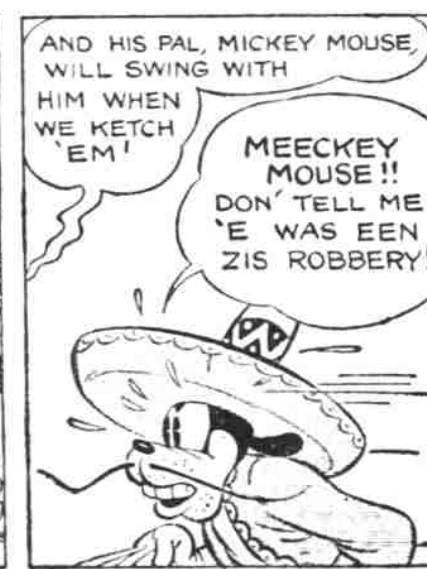
