

MONEY FROM GAME BOARD DEMANDED

first five months of 1932, but slightly less than those in 1931.

"Expenditures of approximately \$60,000 by the state game commission, in order to obtain federal aid, probably was largely responsible for the present unsatisfactory condition of its finances," George Flagg, deputy secretary of state declared. Most of this money was spent in the erection of new buildings and other improvements.

Flagg said he discounted the statement that the profitable months of the commission for 1934 had passed.

October receipts to Be Larger Says Flagg

"The reports show," Flagg continued, "that the October receipts of the commission are the largest of the year."

Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police, declared that there would be no let up in the enforcement of the state game laws. "We now have 30 men in the game division of the state police department," Pray said, "or four less than the number a year ago. This number of officers are required to enforce the game statutes efficiently."

Under the existing laws Pray draws his allotment from the game commission through the general fund, and this is subsequently collected from the commission by the secretary of state.

Teachers Out of Election Contest

Officers of the Salem Teachers' association yesterday declared their organization was taking no part in the sponsorship of any candidate for school director, to be voted on Monday, and further that it was in no way connected with the local teachers' union which is a unit of the American Federation of Teachers. The association membership includes virtually all of the 134 instructors in the public school system here.

SCHOOL MARMS NOT ON HAND FOR EXAMS

For the first time since Mrs. Mary L. Fulkerson was county school superintendent, teachers' examinations in four subjects were offered here yesterday afternoon—and not a candidate showed up. Only two prospective teachers took exams yesterday morning and these in only two of the four subjects offered.

Mrs. Fulkerson was not displeased. "All teachers who have never taught before, under present laws, must be normal school graduates," she said yesterday. "The teacher, by examination, is waning. Since the rule became effective that teachers out of the service longer than three years, could not take examinations to get a certificate, but had to finish normal school, the list of applicants has grown still smaller."

In former days, prospective teachers who had graduated only from the eighth grade could obtain teaching certificates when they passed 11 out of 24 required subjects. Once they had obtained the mark of 90 in an examination they were exempt from further tests in that field. Often times a teacher was qualified for an elementary school diploma without advanced normal school or college work.

The state of Washington recently passed a law making three years normal school work a condition precedent for an elementary teacher's certificate.

RECEIVER IS ASKED FOR SOAP COMPANY

N. Christensen, who for several years was in the soap manufacturing business and more recently has followed that work in Seattle, filed suit here yesterday against the West Coast Manufacturing company and four individuals, asking that a receiver be appointed for the company, primarily to conserve the assets of the corporation so Christensen's share will have some value.

Plaintiff alleges that M. Mulkey, E. M. Hammer, L. L. Mulkey and Addie P. Hammer, jointly named as defendants, changed the corporate stock setup in 1932 without giving him notice. As a result, Christensen says, they obtained four of six voting shares and agreed that thereafter no preferred stock should have voting rights.

Christensen alleges that in 1930, when the company was incorporated for \$5000 to go into the soap-making business, he was named president, that he bought \$950 in stock for cash, and that he was the active head of the concern.

Subsequently, he says, he was excluded from the company's plant, was not allowed to see the books and subsequently was not informed of the legal changes made in the corporate setup.

away as ever." On the other hand a spokesman for the strikers declared, developments "prove negotiations are coming to a head."

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13.—(P)—Another proposal for ending the Pacific coast maritime workers' strike, calling for "co-operative" control of hiring halls of longshoremen, was submitted to Mayor Angelo J. Rossi of San Francisco tonight.

The conference with Mayor Rossi followed an announcement by the San Francisco Industrial association, whose members include business leaders, that it will assume responsibility for solving the situation and "restore to the people of San Francisco that security to which they are entitled."

The announcement was in response to a demand from J. W. Maillard, Jr., president of the San Francisco chamber of commerce, who repeated previous charges that "agitators" among longshoremen were responsible for failures to settle the strike.

French note at the state department late yesterday. It was made public tonight, along with the Belgian note announcing the intention of those nations to default on their Friday payment.

Paul May, the Belgian ambassador delivered the Belgian note to the state department late Saturday. It said Belgium would be unable at this time to make payment on the \$18,468,907 due on June 15. Of that amount \$11,309,453 is past due on previous installments and \$7,159,454 becomes due on Friday. Belgium has defaulted on its last three installments due.

Ferdinand Verwerke, the Czechoslovakian minister, presented on June 11 his government's note announcing that it would be unable to pay at this time.

Emery Stewart Hobson, 20-year-old Salem pianist presented in concert last night at Waller hall, deserves superlatives. From beginning to end the program was the work of an artist, creditable to any performer and remarkable for a youth.

The program ranged from Chopin's highly technical Sonata in B Flat Minor to the dreamy Island Spell by Ireland, and young Hobson was master at all times of his instrument. The Sonata, part of which is the celebrated funeral march, was the climax of the evening, and the large audience expressed profound appreciation.

Especially liked was the familiar Gavotte by Gluck-Brahms, opening number of the concert. Hobson played twelve selections in all, including Chopin's Etude in F minor.

Last night's program was Hobson's first public solo presentation since he appeared with the Salem symphony in March. It is likely to be his last public appearance here for some time, since he goes east this fall for further study. He is the son of Professor and Mrs. E. W. Hobson of Salem.

Winifred Byrd, Salem pianist who has enjoyed world-wide renown, was an interested listener. She paid tribute to Hobson after the concert with the comment that he is capable of reaching the greatest heights.

100,000 ESTIMATED ON OREGON RELIEF

Oregon at the present time has 30,000 heads of families on its relief rolls and approximately 100,000 persons in the state are directly or indirectly receiving relief, Ivan White, field worker for the state relief administration, said while here yesterday on relief business.

Federal government plans now in process call for the expenditure of one billion dollars on relief by next March. White commented. He said 4,000,000 persons were estimated to be receiving relief at the present time in the United States.

White said the federal government's policy hereafter would be to have cities and counties assume the care of all persons who need relief and are unable to work. This class, considered permanently an indigent one, is not now within the scope of federal help. Grover Rebenstich.
