Carrot Loaf
2 cups carrots cooked and mashed
1 egg well beaten
1/2 cup walnuts chopped
1 medium size onion chopped fine
1 tablespoon melted butter
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash of pepper
1 cup (or more) dry bread crumbs
Mold into a loaf and bake in a quick oven. Serves six and makes a splendid substitute for a meat dish.

Carrot Pie
1 cup mashed carrots
1 1/2 cups rich milk
2 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup molasses
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon ginger
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
Cut the carrots into thin slices and boil until very soft, then mash until absolutely free from lumps. Beat eggs and add carrots, milk, molasses, sugar and spices. Stir all ingredients together well and pour into an ungreased pie shell. Bake in very hot oven at first to avoid a soggy under-crust. Decrease the heat for the last half of the baking time and bake until filling is firm. Serve with whipped cream. This makes one large or

ADULTS SHOULD USE PLAYGROUNDS, SAYS

Turf Field Hoped for, Neer Tells Lions; Credit is Given Dr. Pound

The joint city-school playground projects and program here has been mapped out not only for children but also for men and women. F. E. Neer, school board chairman and candidate for reelection, told members of Salem Lions club at their noon luncheon at the Gray Belle yesterday.

"You men should plan to make use of these playgrounds," Neer said. "We hope to have some horseshoe courts, there will be tennis and other sports that you will enjoy."

In sketching the history of the playground development Neer declared that "if anyone deserves credit for bringing these plans to their present stage, it is Dr. B. F. Pound."

Among future developments at Leslie and Olinger fields, Neer stated, will be completion of running tracks. At Olinger it is hoped, he added, eventually to have a turf baseball field.

While the two swimming pools will be Class B, or second grade, they will be entirely safe and satisfactory, Neer asserted. They will not have the filters required for Class A pools but the water will be chlorinated and treated with a solids precipitant material that will make them safe from a health standpoint, Neer explained.

The water will be changed every Monday. Each pool holds 190,000 gallons and will have a continuous flow of 5000 gallons of fresh water an hour.

Surety Company Wants Chance to Appeal its Case

Suit to establish a claim of the commissioner of Indian affairs as a preferred lien on assets of the Bank of Woodburn, in liquidation, was filed yesterday by the American Surety company. The latter guaranteed the deposit of the Indian school. When the bank failed, the government tried to get its deposit called a preferred claim. The state banking department refused.

The federal government then looked to the surety company to pay the deposit claim of \$4750 against the bank. The surety company performed its obligation took the claim of the Indian school by assignment and now asks the state banking department to grant its claim of preference or if not, to allow it the right of appeal to the state supreme court. The surety company declares the federal government does not press its right of appeal but contends the courts should allow an appeal on the assign claim.
