Other adopted resolutions called for:

Action by the federal government to settle the longshoremen's strike.

Endorsement of permanent bank deposit guarantee, including sums in excess of \$2500.

Opposition to the federal McLeod bill and establishment of a branch of the Agriculture Credit bank in Portland.

Commendation of the bulk of the State Dairy association program.

Removal of all butter substitutes from the market and slaughter of all cows affected with tuberculosis or abortion.

Endorsement of the state milk control law.

Endorsement of the Oregon ice cream code and control of the present price to producers.

Immediate federal drought relief for stricken areas in eastern Oregon.

Urging congress and the president to make no reduction in tariffs on agricultural seeds, and other seeds and products now grown in the United States and urging use of American grown seeds and products to build up a domestic seed industry.

Requesting congress to set minimum prices on all farm products commensurate with the cost of production, plus a fair profit to the producer.

Installation of seals on all Bonnevilles dams.

Support of candidates who opposed the sales tax, those who favor state transmission of power from Bonneville dam and those who favor state owned and operated banks.

A complete new financing setup to aid property owners, which involves the issuance of "guaranteed currency" brought forth considerable discussion, but was finally passed with an amendment that the grange urge the passage of the Frazier bill.

The measure, intended to equip the administration with power to deal with the threatened steel strike, would authorize the president to establish boards to deal with labor disputes and to conduct workers' elections in cases where the jurisdiction of a labor organization is disputed.

Flagmen Warned To Be Courteous Handling Public

Flagmen who stop, control and have personal contact with the public in connection with state highway construction operations, must be courteous and avoid controversies. R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, declared today in a letter sent to all resident construction engineers in the state.

Baldock said he had received complaints against these flagmen which reflected upon the state highway department.

"A proper and pleasing attitude to the public on the part of flagmen and traffic control guards will appease and ameliorate a disgruntled public who are being inconvenienced due to delays, dust and rough sections of construction work," Baldock's letter read.

"Flagmen should have sufficient personality to handle a job of this kind, and should be instructed to be courteous, polite and gracious at all times."

The mayor's statement was interpreted to mean that concessions were to be granted by both sides concerning operation of the disputed hiring halls or employment agencies.

The I. L. A. heretofore has stood firm in its demand that it be permitted to operate the halls, while the employers contended that to grant the longshoremen that right would be to recognize the closed shop.

SEATTLE, June 15.—(AP)—Police controlled the Seattle waterfront tonight, and the mayors of Seattle, Portland, Tacoma, Bellingham and Everett laid plans for simultaneous opening of Pacific northwest ports, despite the longshoremen's strike.

With the promise of Mayor Charles L. Smith that police protection would be given non-union workers, waterfront employers prepared to load ships, and said they could obtain all the men needed, despite the fact that the Masters, Mates and Pilots association decided not to aid any vessel which has been loaded by non-union stevedores or does not have full crew of union men aboard.

State police today confiscated more than 100 baseball bats from strikers and removed barricades at the Todd dry docks. Then officers broadcast an appeal to stores not to sell baseball bats or firearms during the period of the strike.

Riot clubs were issued to police, and arrangements were made to discharge tear gas through the exhaust manifolds of police cars should trouble develop on the docks.

University Head To Pay Damages

ALBANY, Ore., June 15.—(AP)—C. W. Benge was awarded \$2000 damages by circuit court jury here in a verdict against Dr. C. V. Boyer, president of the University of Oregon.

Benge had claimed damages of \$15,125 as the result of an automobile collision on the Pacific highway near Halsey last February.

subjects with which your letter deals there are certain matters which I should like to make entirely clear. Our company acquired the Salem water properties in good faith, and, as owner, has been operating those properties for a good many years. We have, nevertheless, in deference to the wishes of the city, offered to sell the company properties on the terms already indicated to you, or to arbitrate the value of such properties and sell at the figure returned by the arbitrators.

In addition, it is open to you to proceed with the condemnation suits now pending in the federal courts. We recognize that you are free to go forward in any one of these three ways. This will, I trust, make our position clear.

"If the city desires to proceed in good faith with arbitration, and will accept the value found by the arbitrators as the fair value of the properties in event of city acquisition and will so notify us, we with our counsel will meet with the city's representatives and its counsel and attempt to work out a satisfactory agreement with the least possible delay, and we on our part will likewise agree to accept the arbitrators' decision."

Bakers of State Will Meet Here To Discuss Code

A hearing in connection with the proposed marketing agreement affecting the Oregon baking industry, will be held in Salem June 27, Max Gehlhar, state director of agriculture, announced Friday. Gehlhar declared that bakery operators from all sections of the state would attend.

Outstanding provisions of the proposed code include the creation of a state control board of 22 members, establishment of minimum retail prices for bakery products, and fixing the annual license fee at \$5.

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LIGHTING PROBLEMS DISCUSSED BY BOYD

Sight Deficiencies Become More General, Speaker Tells Group Here

Vision being the most important thing in modern civilization because it is the basis of virtually all endeavor, the electric light, which should be man's greatest blessing, has become his worst curse, George M. Boyd of Seattle, lighting engineer for Westinghouse electrical company, told a small group gathered at the chamber of commerce last night.

Boyd gave a series of demonstrations to show how the electric light may be most efficiently and advantageously used. Conclusions were that indirect lighting is the easiest on the eye and at the same time the most efficient.

Boyd asserted that there is today a growing amount of deficiency in sight. Surveys in 1932 covering 354,000 high school children showed 22 per cent with deficient sight; and of 50,000 college students, 40 per cent deficient in sight. Schoolrooms generally have poor lighting facilities, he finds in his travels over the country.

Among principles of seeing he suggested be followed were: the lighting source should never be within the field of vision; light must first hit the object which one wants to see; sufficient intensity to see type of thing one wishes to see and according to the speed with which one is dealing; a shadowless light and also glintless.

King-Chambers Clan to Gather At Kings Valley

DALLAS, June 15.—Members of the King-Chambers clan will hold their annual reunion on the old Chambers donation land claim at King's Valley on Sunday, June 17. A picnic dinner will be served and a large crowd is expected.

Nathan King, after whom King's Valley is named, came to Oregon in 1845 and to King's Valley in 1846 and is believed to have been the first settler there. His son-in-law, Roland Chambers, settled there about the same time.

MAY PLANT FORAGE CROP ON AAA LAND

Word has been received this week at AAA headquarters here that farmers having wheat contracts may plant forage crops, except corn and grain sorghums, on any land covered by such contracts including rented or contracted acres. This permission applies only to the year of 1934. This means that if a farmer desires to do so he may plant a crop that is going to be used for hay on his contracted acreage.

This word comes rather late to be of any benefit to Marion county farmers but it does mean that if they care to do so they might need it to sudan grass, millet set it out to kale, or plant it to turnips. Also, where a contract signer has seeded wheat to exceed his minimum acreage and such wheat crop has failed, he might use part of his wheat acreage for his contracted acreage and cut the same for hay. This would apply only in case he had seeded more than his required acreage. The regulation that a particular acreage of crop cannot be both contracted acreage and wheat acreage is still effective.

An additional ruling of interest to Marion county farmers is that the wheat administration just announced that the amount of the benefit payment to be received will be one cent larger than was originally announced.

INJURY AND DEATH ON HIGHWAYS GAIN

There were 23 persons killed and 405 injured in a total of 1695 traffic accidents in Oregon during May, 1934, according to a report issued at the state department Friday.

In May of last year there were 1568 traffic accidents, with 19 persons killed and 346 injured.

Traffic accidents during the first five months of 1934 totaled 2523, as compared with 7512 during the corresponding period a year ago. Persons killed during the first five months of 1934 aggregated 113 as against 90 in 1933. The number of persons injured increased from 1398 during the first five months of 1933 to 1878 during the corresponding period in 1934.

Nine of the persons killed in traffic accidents during the first five months of 1934 were pedestrians.
