The Ochocho district is located in Crook county and has a bonded indebtedness of \$1,388,500. Warrants of the district total \$22,000. The district has 8500 acres of irrigable land.

TUBERCULOSIS GAIN NOTED FOR COUNTY

Deaths However Are Fewer; Health Department's Report is Made

Tuberculosis cases reported in Marion county for the first five months of 1934 are seven ahead of 1933, but the number of deaths is lower by one, according to the monthly report of activities for the Marion county department of health. In May, three cases of tuberculosis were reported, and two deaths from this disease, which bring the totals so far for 1934 to 18 cases and six deaths. To the end of May, a year ago, there were 11 cases and seven deaths.

Last month, 869 tuberculosis tests were made by the health department workers, and 79 of these showed positive reaction; 49 fluoroscopes were given. The department members paid 141 visits to communicable disease patients or suspects, of which total 115 were on scarlet fever. On immunization, 46 completed the diphtheria treatments and 55 were given smallpox vaccinations.

Communicable diseases reported in the county for the month were: Measles, two cases; scarlet fever, three; whooping cough, seven; diphtheria, one; tuberculosis, three; venereal, 13; malaria, one; German measles, one; chickenpox, seven; pneumonia, one; Vincent's Angina, two.

May clinics saw examination of 33 infants; 41 pre-school children and 43 school children. Inspections of children for readmission to school totaled 1,109 and visits to school children for health service numbered 104. Visits to the office or home numbered 162 were paid 66 persons on the county relief rolls.

Voluntary help during the month gave an additional 167 hours of service from lay assistants, and from professionals, 18 hours of health service. For the first five months of the year, 583 hours of lay service have been volunteered, and 433 hours of professional service, which includes nurses as well as doctors.

Laboratory services in May were 26 throat cultures, 26 blood tests and 25 miscellaneous tests. Under sanitation, work done in May included 106 visits to water supplies; 105 visits for inspection and control of county milk supply; and 154 milk samples taken.

Surviving are her husband, C. R. Berry, and her sons, Cecil, Everett, Lynn and Dale; three brothers, all of this community, Max, Roy and Ralph Frame, and six sisters, Mrs. Opal Kirkpatrick, St. Joseph, Mo.; Mrs. Mahle Mack, Monroe; Mrs. Esthel Hill, Mill City; Mrs. Artie Mack and Mrs. Gladys Kimer, Stayton, and Mrs. Audrey Sergey, Bandon.

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CHECKS, STOCK, CASH Stolen Though Owners Are Unaware of it FIGURE IN THEFT CASE

L. A. Felton, visitor at the N. C. Hubbs farm on the Silverton road, lost \$170 in traveler's checks.

But he didn't know it. Howard Nelson, Woodburn resident, had 15 shares of Standard Oil stock stolen. A Newberg hotel roomer had several pieces of money stolen. And he didn't know it.

Thursday, five days after the thefts, the story came out. One William J. Carter, 43, a painter by trade, tried to force Felton's name to one of the checks. Unsuccessful, he approached a barber friend and offered to split the cash 50-50 if the barber would do the signature. Instead, friend barber reported Carter and Portland police got busy.

Through letters found on Carter's person, Felton, who is visiting at the Hubbs farm from Anaheim, Calif., was located by the sheriff's office here. Asked if he had lost \$170 in traveler's checks he investigated and sure enough: they were missing from his bureau drawer. Three gold watches in the room where Felton slept and a gun were undisturbed. Felton, busy, had not noticed the loss. Nor had Nelson noticed the loss of his stock.

The job of housebreaking at the Hubbs' home had been well done; only a small slit had been cut in the window screen and the intruder had hooked the screen behind him. Carter was waived preliminary hearing, was arraigned before Judge L. H. McMahan yesterday, pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to serve one year in the state penitentiary. He began to serve his sentence yesterday afternoon.

SWIM WEEK PLAN BACKED BY MAYOR

Mayor Douglas McKay yesterday placed his stamp of hearty approval on the Red Cross learn-to-swim campaign to be conducted at the Olinger pool here next week by Jean Eberhart assisted by Vernon Gilmore and Esther Arnold. He expressed his endorsement in the following proclamation:

"The loss of life through accidental drowning does more to break down the morale of a community than almost any other type of accident. It is, nine cases out of ten, an evidence of that community's failure to protect its swimming places and to teach its citizens the fundamentals of water safety."

"If the swimming and life saving campaign that our Red Cross chapter is conducting should be instrumental in preventing the loss of a single life, it would more than justify its existence. But such a campaign has other values. It affords opportunities second to none for the development of the type of citizens every community needs most. Swimming promotes health, cleanliness, self-reliance, and quick thinking. It furnishes a sane and wholesome use of leisure time. Through life saving instruction fine character traits of unselfish service to our fellowmen are encouraged."

"Finally, but by no means least, swimming is fun; healthy exhilarating fun that old and young can enjoy."

"I should like to see this campaign so successful that it may continue as an annual event. Those who take part can be assured not only of a great deal of personal pleasure but the further satisfaction of knowing that through their enjoyment they are benefiting both themselves and society."

"I hereby officially proclaim the week of June 18 to 27 as official 'Learn to Swim Week' in Salem."

ROAD FUND SHARE NEAR 5 MILLIONS

Oregon's share in highway funds provided by the federal government will total \$4,896,500 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935, according to word received yesterday at the state highway department. Of this amount, \$3,221,500 will be a direct grant to the state highway department, under the Cartwright-Hayden bill, in contrast to the \$6,442,037 received in 1933.

The federal aid to come in this year will be:

Direct aid \$3,221,500
Forest highways 780,000
Forest trails 520,000
National park roads 250,000
Indian reservation rds. 125,000

The following year \$2,027,300 of federal funds will be directly available to Oregon for general highway work, provided the state can match this money. R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, says he does not believe the state highway department will have more than \$500,000 available to match this money.

FORECLOSURE ASKED
DALLAS, June 14.—The Travelers' Insurance company filed a foreclosure complaint here today against Frank Zumwalt et al, in which the plaintiff seeks a judgment for \$4500 with \$229.85 interest, plus small sums of interest, and \$200 attorney fees. The plaintiff asks that their mortgage be declared a first lien and that this mortgage be foreclosed and the property sold to satisfy their claim.

LAX SUPPORT GIVEN FAIR IS CRITICIZED

Business Men Should Enter Exhibits, Max Gehlhar Says in Address

Charging that Salem business men have been apathetic to the state fair, particularly in that they have not supported the commercial division of the exhibits, Max Gehlhar, fair director, yesterday noon devoted considerable part of an address at the Retail Credit association to urging every business man to patronize the fair this year.

This commercial exhibit of the fair has a genuine appeal to the general public, Gehlhar declared, and added that at the ridiculously low rental of \$2 per foot, no merchant could afford to be without representation.

More than 150,000 people are expected at the fair this fall. Last year attendance was doubled, and this year a 50 per cent gain is expected.

Attractions of unusual interest will include an Indian family, including an old chief from a race of totem pole carvers, that will present genuine Indian lore. This exhibit will be set up as an attraction to the commercial exhibit hall.

The rodeo and the finest circus acts obtainable will provide a double night show, which again this year will be free to the public. Admission is to be 25 cents at the gate, with part of the proceeds from this admission to go to pay the \$25,000 cost for the nightly entertainments.

Gehlhar told of the many changes made in fairland since last fall, including seven acres of new lawn; a half mile of flower beds for which 100 loads of fertilizer were hauled; and the unique interior promenade extending from building to building in the circle.

Most conspicuous of the changes, possibly, is the new poultry building, occupying the old auto pavilion. The new building is one of the most beautiful of its kind in the country, Gehlhar declared. It presents a mile of coop fronts, all shining like silver; 15 plate glass aquariums; and a large indoor pool for water fowl.

TRUCK MEN GIVEN ADDITIONAL TIME

An extension of time to June 20 for registration under the state truck code has been granted to operators in Oregon by the national code upon petition of the state tentative code committee. A. C. Anderson, a member of the temporary committee, announced yesterday.

The previous deadline of June 14 was extended, indirectly, at request of operators who asked for a little longer time, inasmuch as wool movements in eastern Oregon and fruit hauling in western Oregon have kept operators busy in the field. In Salem, registration of all anywhere for hire trucks is done by Tom Wood at the Wood-Wheaton garage.

Though no compilation has been made, Anderson states operators over the state have easily completed 50 per cent on registrations, which have been coming in heavy the past few days. Operators who register under the code before June 20 will have a vote on the permanent code committee.

Anderson reports that some of the larger shippers who are code members in their groups have indicated a desire to work with operators who are also code signers. The local man feels the code will bring real stability to the trucking industry.

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BOARD ASSOCIATES FAVOR FRANK NEER

Experience and Training of Incumbent Are Cited in Statements

The candidacy of F. E. Neer for reelection as Salem school director has the unqualified support of Directors E. A. Bradford and Mrs. David Wright, these two declared yesterday. The other two directors, Walter B. Minier and Dr. B. F. Pound are out of the city.

"Mr. Neer, I have found, sincerely has the interest of our schools at heart," stated Mrs. Wright, who has been a member of the board for two years. "Because of this and of his long experience, both on the Salem board and as a university instructor, I think the citizens would do well to reelect him."

Mr. Bradford, who has been a director here the past year and, before coming to Salem to engage in the lumber business in the Hollywood district, served on an Idaho school board, said he had found Mr. Neer "very satisfactory to work with on the local board."

"I believe that Mr. Neer would help continue to run our school system economically, with due attention to the interests of the taxpayers, the pupils and the teachers," Bradford added.

Mr. Neer was first elected to the board in 1925 to succeed Curtis B. Cross, who declined to seek reelection. He has served continuously since that time.
