Period Held Here

named congressional committee-man. For a committee of five to serve as a district nominating committee, A. A. Geer, Henry C. Porter, Hal D. Patton, Ed Rogers and E. C. Denny were unanimously selected. Fred Rooney of Jefferson was named precinct committeeman. It was decided that the party would be reorganized into districts. Roy R. Hewitt, manager of the Brown-for-governor movement, challenged the party to become one "of the people, by the people and for the people." If it is such a party, I will support it, he declared. He said political parties too often rallied around aphorisms which mean nothing.

I. V. McAdoo, another ardent Brown man, following Hewitt, said he thought the party must progress. That indicated he would support the ticket.

A succession of speakers briefly addressed the meeting. Mayor Douglas McKay, nominee for senator, pledged himself to support the ticket. State Senator Spaulding said the party should be the best of the liberal policies being formulated by the "independents" and should offer a program to the people which would be attractive.

Other speakers included Charles Gram, state labor commissioner; Mrs. Hannah Martin, member of the 1933 legislature; County Judge John Slegmund; Roy Hewitt, republican candidate for county commissioner; Carle Abrams, Otto K. Paulus, Ralph Emmons, chairman of the Young Men's Republican club; E. A. Miller, chairman of the Marion County Republican club; Frank Dary, former speaker of the house; Mrs. Hal D. Patton, member of the executive committee of the Marion County Republican club.

An executive committee meeting for the Marion County Republican club followed the precinct committeemen's meeting. Formal resolutions adopted yesterday were:

funds could be made available for a short-term loan to the general fund if one is needed.

Due to the steady decrease in the deficit in state finances it is quite possible that the general fund no longer will need warrant financing at any time. In addition to being expensive as far as interest is concerned—the warrants bore five per cent annual interest—at least two extra clerks were needed at the state treasurer's office to handle stamping and bookkeeping the warrants.

Treasury department officials said they also were highly pleased with the drastic bond reductions being made by the various counties and municipalities.

"Some counties have reduced their bonded indebtedness as much as 25 per cent during the past four years," Paulus said, "while others have cut their obligations from five to 25 per cent. This has been accomplished by the practice of strict economy and improved business methods."

Paulus also pointed out that the 1933 legislative act, making it possible for property owners to pay their taxes in installments had proved successful. He said the operation of this law should increase tax collections in Oregon this year approximately 20 per cent.

Oregon's financial condition compares favorably with that of other states," Paulus concluded.

Added Study of The Dalles Dam Plan Is Favored

PORTLAND, Ore., June 16.—(AP)—An added examination by United States engineers to determine feasibility of a proposed 550-foot high dam at The Dalles, Ore., will be recommended to President Roosevelt by the Columbia river compact and treaty interim committee of the Oregon legislature.

The envisioned dam would cost hundred of millions of dollars. It would create a lake 300 miles long and flood out the towns of Arlington and Umatilla, Ore., and Pasco and Hanford, Wash., along with 667,000 acres of land. Resulting railroad relocations alone would cost an estimated \$200,000,000.

The request to the president states such a dam would develop 6,000,000 horsepower, for which market would have to be developed.

longshoremen would ratify the agreement. Wheat resting on railroad sidings is ready for shipment on some of the 33 idle vessels here. Pears and apples soon will be ready for export. Lumber for all parts of the world is awaiting shipment while hundreds of lumberjacks and mill workers are awaiting the go sign to return to work.

Many men promised a job "when the strike ends" will rejoice. Portland employers and workers were brought together by a citizens' committee of three headed by Governor Julius L. Meier, Franklin T. Griffith, president of the Portland Electric Power company, and H. V. Alward, manager of the Bank of California in Portland, were the other members.

A settlement plan was tentatively reached here several days ago, but not announced until yesterday when favorable reaction to it and general progress had been reported to the committee from other ports.

HURRICANE STRIKES SOUTH; ONE KILLED

BATON ROUGE, La., June 16.—(AP)—A 70-mile an hour hurricane from the Gulf of Mexico today swept inland just south of Morgan City, La., and cut a wide path of destruction to property and countryside through east Louisiana.

Practically every building in Morgan City was damaged and Baton Rouge was strewn with debris and was cut off from all communication for more than two hours. No fatalities had been reported.

The force of the wind smashed many windows in the new 33 story capitol.

The wind velocity was 69 to 70 miles an hour as the disturbance whirled in a northerly direction up through Louisiana strewn the countryside with fallen trees, blocking highways, damaging or demolishing frame buildings and severing communications with the affected district.

BATON ROUGE, La., June 16.—(AP)—An unidentified man was reported killed, at least ten persons were injured, dozens of small crafts were sunk and several millions of dollars in crop and property damage resulted today from the tropical hurricane that swept up through eastern Louisiana and dissipated late tonight in squalls around Vicksburg and Jackson area in Mississippi.

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RECOGNITION IS GRANTED UNION

throwing thousands of persons out of work. Affiliated unions also joined the walkout of about 15,000 longshoremen, bringing the number of men on strike to more than 25,000 maritime workers. The status of the affiliated unions which went on strike had not been determined but it was assumed that further negotiations would be held.

Chambers of commerce in various Pacific coast ports estimated the losses caused by the strike at millions of dollars. Waterborne traffic was greatly hindered and goods piled up in the harbors. Two men were killed and numerous others were wounded in waterfront riots during the strike. In a violent battle between strikers and non-union men at San Pedro, Richard Parker, 20, who had just joined the longshoremen's union, and other longshoremen were shot to death and 65 others were injured. Another longshoreman was shot at San Pedro in a brawl not connected with the strike.

Carrot Marmalade
3 lbs. raw carrots
3 lbs. sugar
6 lemons
1 lb. ground almonds

Scrape and put through food chopper the raw carrots. Then run the almonds through chopper. Extract juice of the lemons. Place carrots in kettle, cover with water and cook until tender. Mash or put through potato ricer and beat until creamy. Return to kettle and add sugar, grated rinds of lemons to taste and lemon juice. Cook gently about 1/2 hour or until thick and clear. When nearly done, add almonds. Put in glasses and when cool cover with paraffin.

Spiced Carrot Conserve
4 lbs. young carrots
2 lbs. sugar
1 pint water
1 cup vinegar
Either 1 oz. green ginger root tied in bag or 1 oz. whole mixed spices tied in bag
1 lemon
2 oranges
1/2 cup raisins

Scrape the carrots and steam until tender. Press through a puree sieve. Make a syrup of sugar, water and vinegar and boil 5 minutes with bag of spices. Add carrot pulp, grated rind of oranges and lemon, and let come to boil. Remove spice bag, add lemon and oranges cut in thin slices and simmer. Let simmer until consistency of marmalade. Pour in hot sterilized jars and seal.

SCANDAL FORECAST IN MILITARY PROBE

WASHINGTON, June 16.—(AP)—A "scandal" that "in all probability will open the doors of penitentiaries to government officials" was predicted in the house today as it voted \$20,000 more for a way department investigation.

The \$20,000 was granted the military affairs committee after Rep. Cochran (D-Mo) said its investigation, for which \$10,000 already had been appropriated, "undoubtedly" will result in "scandal" that will arouse the people of the country.

A few minutes later, a bill by Rep. Vinson (D-Ga) was called up. It would have let the secretary of the military affairs committee jump it. Chairman McSwain (D-SC) asked postponement of the Vinson bill, remarking that when the military committee headed by Rep. Rogers (D-NH) submits its forthcoming report "your eyes will be opened to conditions that have been permitted in one of the departments of the government."

6 DALLAS AUTOISTS UNHURT IN CRASH

Six Dallas residents escaped injury other than minor bruises when their sedan collided with a light coupe driven by Howard Rosenbalm, 111th street, on the Salem-Rickreall road near the Oak Knoll golf course early today. Rosenbalm and another of his five companions suffered painful bruises.

The Dallas residents in the sedan, driven by Earl Duane Effenberger, 712 Shelton street, Dallas, included Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Efferberger, Mr. and Mrs. Donald Robinson and Rene Fritz. The coupe landed in a ditch, its frame badly wrecked. A door was knocked off the sedan.

NRA Compliance Boards Released Since Job Ended

PORTLAND, Ore., June 16.—(AP)—Release of volunteer NRA compliance boards, established in every county in Oregon when the NRA program first was instituted, was announced today by Edgar Freed, state compliance director.

The volunteers were concerned only with violations of the president's re-employment agreement, the so-called blanket code. Compliance administration has been transferred to established government offices with codification of the bulk of businesses, Freed said.

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SUSPECT FORGERY OF BOND COUPONS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 16.—(AP)—City Treasurer William Adams today ordered an investigation to determine if certain bond coupons being presented the city of Portland for payment are misprints or forgeries.

A novel financial racket was suspected by Treasurer Adams when he found duplicate coupons on a \$500,000 Portland water bond issue floated in 1910 had been redeemed.

He notified the Chase National bank of New York, the city's fiscal agent in Gotham, not to honor any more clipped coupons of that issue. Before paying out city cash for any more of the coupons, which bear the serial designation "A", the city treasurer will require simultaneous presentation of the bonds with the coupons.

If a clique of racketeers is forging interest bearing coupons of city bonds many thousands of dollars already may have been garnered, Adams surmised.

Pedestrian Dies When Struck by Truck, Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., June 16.—(AP)—A pedestrian identified by a letter in his pocket as Marion Robar of Sacramento, Calif., was fatally injured by a delivery truck on the Burnside bridge here today.

First aid was rendered by Dr. F. D. Kilgore of Philadelphia, Pa., who was riding with J. Lee McCuddy in the truck. The pedestrian, about 45, died shortly at a hospital.

Accident Investigator Beaubelle said eye witnesses told him the man ran crosswise of the bridge, smashing against the side of the vehicle. McCuddy was held for failure to have an operator's license.

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SENTENCE REVISED FOR TWO PLAYBOYS

Withdrawal of the six months' sentence in the penitentiary without parole and imposition of a two years' sentence with parole privileges followed the receipt of new information by Judge L. H. McMahan yesterday in the case of Arthur Staples and Robert Wallace. Families of both young men need their services: the wife of one is about to become a mother and in the other family the recent loss of a child is blamed largely to lack of funds to provide sufficiently for it.

Both men, who Friday pleaded guilty to drunken driving charges after they had crashed in a stolen car, were paroled to Gurnee Fleisher, physical education instructor at Leslie junior high school, who said he was willing to undertake the parole and who knows both of the youths. Friends have provided bonds to take care of the guarantee of repairs on the stolen car and the other auto damaged in the crash.

McMahan said he had no sympathy with drunken drivers, but that in this case their families and the owners of the cars were benefitting by the parole from the more severe sentence.

Coast Defenses Will Be Studied

WASHINGTON, June 16.—(AP)—Chairman McSwain (D-SC) of the house military committee, in a letter to Rep. Dockweiler (D-Cal) today promised to make an investigation, this summer of Pacific coast defenses.

Dockweiler had introduced a resolution calling for a formal inquiry into the defense of California, Oregon, Washington and Alaska.

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
