Silverton "Regulars" Get
Vote; Turner Cuts
Debt One Half

SILVERTON, June 18. — (Special) — Results of the school election here today placed O. E. Lee and Lee Alfred in the three-year directorships. Votes cast numbered 233. Three names were written in for scattering votes: H. B. Jorgensen, 3 votes; Martin Hattberg, 3; F. Boesch, 1. Lee got 235 votes; Alfred 230.

Extra Special Tax
STAYTON, June 18. — The annual school election was held today with a smaller attendance than usual. Andrew Perry, director, and Paul Stayton, clerk, were nominated without opposition and re-elected.

The budget, which had been prepared by the members of the board, Mr. Murphy, Dr. Beauchamp and Andrew Perry and the budget committee Jack Richards, George Knoch and George Dunne was adopted with yes 32, no 15.

The additional levy, which will be about \$1600 more than last year, was approved with 25 voting yes and 17 no.

Several residents from the west part of the district were present and expressed themselves as in favor of the district running a bus into their section. Since the district has had three busses standing idle this past year there was much favorable discussion as to something being done with them. A motion passed "to authorize school district to enter into transportation if they find a plan that is in their judgment feasible."

Harry Porter, W. H. Pason and J. Alexander were appointed to see what could be done about transportation into that section.

Meanwhile Portland officers of the International Longshoremen's association said a northwest committee of strike representatives would meet either here or in Seattle to draw up a settlement proposal to offer.

By secret ballot longshoremen here yesterday rejected the latest settlement proposal by a 97 per cent majority.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 18. — Caught in the backwash of a reflected peace pact, the Pacific coast's strike-crippled shipping came to a near standstill today as union longshoremen stood firm in their refusal to resume cargo handling.

Threats of a general cargo strike, declarations of a "fight to the finish" and demands of authorities for "open ports" were heard as Mayor Angelo J. Rossi of San Francisco attempted further settlement negotiations. Representatives of employers and longshoremen meet with Mayor Rossi in what he said was a conference intended to pave the way for consideration of a settlement with all maritime unions involved in the strike.

A joint committee representing the 12,000 longshoremen and 15,000 other maritime workers who have joined in the walkout will meet with Mayor Rossi tomorrow.

of funds used from the state's original \$400,000 appropriation. The Pasquill audit calls for an attorney-general's opinion on the propriety of such a charge, holding the Knox law somewhat unclear on this item.

The audit by S. W. Starr, made for the state, showed that all but five of the 23 liquor stores operated at a profit in the period ending April 30, 1934. Of the 149 agencies to sell liquor, 100 were profitable.

The audits revealed that a total net profit and gain in the period ending April 30, 1934, was \$176,170. Of this \$58,593 came from the stores and agencies, \$40,439 came from the gallonage tax on beer and \$77,138 came from the license taxes.

Commenting on the stores and agencies the audit read: "An analysis of the factors relating to the operating profit from merchandising transactions readily shows that the statement of operations presented at this time is of doubtful value in determining the efficiency or inefficiency of the operations or the management. For example, the audit shows that the organization had been engaged in merchandising a relatively short period during which it has continually expanded."

"Also, during the period of development an excessive number of employees were used, probably due to over-estimating the volume of business to be transacted. Another factor of importance is the consideration of the primary purpose for which the liquor commission was created, namely, the control of liquor, which fact obviously subject the making of profits a secondary consideration."

During 1933-34, the district's total outstanding debt was reduced from \$308,174.96 to \$186,432.66, or by \$121,742.30. At the same time, the clerk reported, there is \$78,290.49 less taxes standing uncollected this year than last.

Salient figures from the clerk's report:

Receipts, including funds from warrants, notes and bonds, \$877,373.57; disbursements, including redemption of and interest on warrants, notes and bonds, \$843,650.35; cash on hand, \$68.65; bonds outstanding, \$65,500; warrants marked "unpaid for lack of funds," \$25,932.66; one-year notes, \$95,500; assessed valuation, \$18,127,521; tax under six per cent limitation, 13.8 mills;

total uncollected taxes, \$315,440.63; balance on hand from \$15,000 bond issue for additions to Englewood and Highland schools, \$3,352.90.

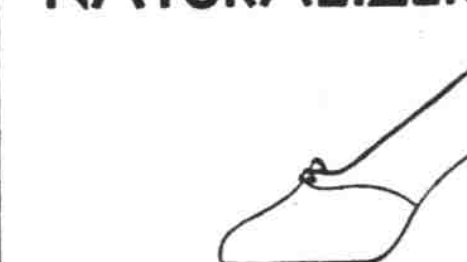

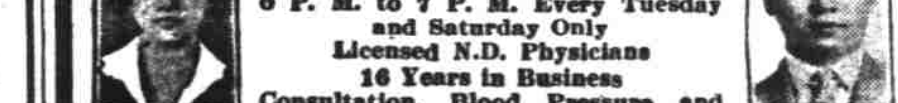
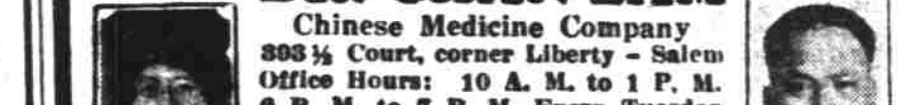
