VEGETABLES BASIC IN SUMMER MENUS

Round Table Editor Offers Recipes Received in Recent Contest

Vegetables play an important part in every family food budget and novel ways to serve them are always welcome. These two recipes for salad and the one for creamed carrots were submitted in last week's Recipe Round Table contest:

Quick Vegetable Salad
1 cup cooked peas, cooled
1 cup cooked diced carrots, cooled
1 cup cooked diced potatoes
1 cup diced celery
1 small cooked cauliflower
2 tbsps. minced parsley
Mix with French dressing and serve with mayonnaise and green peppers on crisp lettuce.

Potato-Olive-Carrot Salad
1 qt. cold boiled potatoes
1 cup finely cut celery
1/2 cup chopped green olives
1 tsp. salt
Salad dressing of choice
2 cups shredded lettuce
1 tbsps. finely chopped parsley
Dice the potatoes small, add the celery, olives, salt, pepper and half the salad dressing. Mix well. Line shallow bowl or deep plate with the shredded lettuce. Pile the potato mixture in center, cover top with the rest of dressing and sprinkle with grated carrots and chopped parsley.

Creamed Carrots and Onions
1 large bunch carrots
2 medium onions
2 tbsps. butter or shortening
2 tbsps. flour
1 tsp. salt
1 dash pepper
1 cup milk
Wash, scrape and cut the carrots in small pieces. Slice the onions and cook together until tender. Make a white sauce by cooking together the butter, flour and seasonings, and adding milk. Drain the carrots and onions and stir in the white sauce. Serve hot.

RIVER NAVIGATION MAY NOT RESUME

Even though ocean-going commerce may be resumed soon out of Portland, it appears unlikely that the Salem Navigation company will be able to place either of its steamers back in the Salem-Portland freight service because of low water, it was reported at the firm's local office yesterday. Captain Fritz Cruise, company pilot, was expected yesterday to undertake with a government engineer a survey of the river from Oregon City to Salem to determine definitely whether or not the boats could be used before the fall rains. If it is found the steamers can't operate, the company will have to move the 600 or 700 tons of accumulated freight in its warehouse by truck, it was said. The present river level is -2.2 feet. Lack of water rather than poor channel conditions will be to blame for the summer discontinuance of river service. The company is not inclined to "snake" the boats over the gravel bars as done in the past because of extensive repairs made to the craft last year.

Dalrymple Held Ineligible for Committee Post

Opposition is developing to the seating of A. M. Dalrymple as Marion county state committeeman for the democratic organization. Party leaders said here yesterday. Dalrymple won in a close contest for the post when the democratic precinct committeemen organized ten days ago. The next test will be when Dalrymple attempts to present his credentials to the state organization. His opponents will then insist that he is not an appointive official, working for the sheriff's office here.

RUN OVER BY TRUCK
PERRYDALE, June 18. — Willard Mitchell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Mitchell, received a painful injury Friday while at work on the Goose Neck road. He was standing in front of his truck waiting for other trucks to drive ahead and unload when the truck immediately ahead of him suddenly backed up instead of going ahead, knocking him down against his truck and striking his head. The wheel of the other truck passed over his foot.

Sunday Meal Service

"The better the day, the better the deed" is a saying which may cause considerable thought must go into the planning of menus on that day if mother may expect to have any leisure time. Breakfast will probably be late to accommodate both the early golfers and the late risers. A late breakfast means that the time for the following meals will also be moved ahead several hours. The Sunday "three-square" will probably be breakfast, dinner and "snack" or supper instead of breakfast, luncheon and dinner.

Sunday dinner is usually a meal with "all the trimmings," and here careful planning is necessary because "trimmings" call for extra work. Appetizers, salads and desserts may be partially prepared the day before and then will require only assembling just before dinner time. Try this menu for a Sunday time-saver:

Sunday Dinner
Fruit Juice Cocktail or Melon
Prime Rib Roast of Beef
Browned Potatoes
Buttered Asparagus
Tomato Jelly Salad
Peach Macaroon Pudding
Iced Decaffeinated Coffee

The fruit juice or melon appetizer may be placed in the refrigerator to chill on Saturday night. The tomato jelly salad and peach macaroon pudding are best prepared on Saturday because they require plenty of time in the refrigerator to chill thoroughly, and to allow the peach flavor to blend well with the pudding. The decaffeinated coffee may be made ahead of time on Sunday so that it will cool before being iced.

Tomato Jelly Salad
2 tbsps. gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
1/2 cup boiling water
1 No. 2 can tomatoes (strain if desired)
1 tsp. sugar
1 tsp. salt
1 tbsps. lemon juice
1 pkg. cream cheese
1/2 cup chopped olives
Soak gelatin in cold water. Add boiling water and all ingredients except cheese and olives. Fill a mold with half the mixture. Allow to stiffen thoroughly. Spread with cream cheese which has been softened and mixed with olives. Cover with remaining tomato jelly mixture. When set, cut in serving pieces and serve on bed of lettuce or endive.

Cornflake Macaroons
2 egg whites
1 cup sugar
2 cups cornflakes
1/2 cup nutmeats
1 cup coconut
1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
Beat egg whites until they are stiff enough to hold their shape. Fold in sugar, cornflakes, nutmeats and coconut. Add vanilla. Drop on a well-greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 15 to 20 minutes. Remove macaroons from pan immediately when they are baked, using a spatula or sharp knife.

Peach Macaroon Pudding
1 cup milk
1 tbsps. cornstarch
1/2 cup sugar
3 eggs (separated)
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1/2 tsp. almond extract
1 cup canned sliced peaches
3 cups cornflake macaroon crumbs
Scald the milk. Mix cornstarch with sugar and moisten with a little cold water. Add the beaten egg yolks and stir into milk. Cook, stirring continually, until custard is smooth and thick. Remove from fire, add flavorings and peaches. Fold in beaten egg whites. Place macaroon crumbs in a bowl or pudding dish and pour custard mixture over them. Allow to set in refrigerator overnight. May be served garnished with fresh berries.

Iced Decaffeinated Coffee
Make the coffee double strength (use 2 rounding tablespoons of coffee for each cup desired) and percolate or drip as usual. Pour into a china or glass pitcher and add cream. Cover and cool. Chill thoroughly by adding ice cubes just before serving.

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ANNUAL METHODIST MEETING LOOMS UP

No Change Contemplated in Salem Pulpits Although No One Ever Knows

Attention of Salem Methodists will focus this week on the annual church conference, which opens in Portland First church today and continues through Sunday night. So far as can be learned, no changes are contemplated for the Salem pastors, for all Salem ministers are with recommendations from their congregations that they be returned here. However, pastoral changes often come as surprises at the close of the conference, when appointments are read.

Dr. Louis Magin, ending his first year as superintendent for the Salem district, is also expected to be returned, as he has done a fine piece of work in this district and virtually every church has asked for his return. Salem pastors who will be in attendance from today on are: Dr. B. Earle Parker of the First church; Rev. S. Darlow Johnson, ending his seventh year at Leslie Memorial; Rev. H. G. Humphrey of Jason Lee; and Rev. K. K. Clark of West Salem Ford Memorial.

Members of the local churches who are delegates to the laymen's conference which opens Thursday and continues through Saturday are: Willis P. Hawley and Roy M. Lockenout of First church; Herman Clarke, with Mrs. D. O. Lear as alternate, Jason Lee; Mrs. Mason Bishop with Mrs. C. W. Stacey, alternate, Leslie Memorial; Mrs. Al Henningsen, alternate will attend from West Salem. Many members of the congregations will attend some of the sessions.

The conference this year will be presided over by Bishop Ernest Lynn Waldorf of the Chicago area. The outstanding event from both ministerial and lay standpoints will be the joint session of the Pacific Northwest and Oregon conferences beginning Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, when the Jason Lee centennial will be celebrated. Bishop Titus Lowe of the Portland area will be the speaker for this event. In the evening, the joint conferences will hear an address by Bishop J. Ralph Magee of the historical pageant, "Jason Lee," to be presented by a cast of 300 and written and directed by Miss Sybil Tucker. This also will be given at Grant high school auditorium.

Rev. S. Darlow Johnson will preside over the Wednesday morning session and Dr. B. Earle Parker will preside at the evening session that day. Visiting speakers will include Bishop Waldorf; Bishop J. Ralph Magee of St. Paul, Minn.; Dr. Lucius H. Bugbee, editor of Church School Publications; Dr. Clarence True Wilson, secretary of the board of home missions and church extension; Dr. R. D. Bisbee, representing the board of foreign mission; and Dr. Newton E. Davis, corresponding secretary of the board of hospitals, homes and deaconess work.

Bugbee will speak Wednesday at 11:30 a.m., Thursday night at 7:30, Friday at 11:30 a.m., Saturday at 11:30 a.m., and Sunday at 7:30 p.m.; Davis, Wednesday at 2:30 p.m.; Wilson, Saturday at 7:30 p.m.; Magee, Wednesday at 7:30 p.m.; Bisbee Saturday at 2 p.m.

DEVERS LEAVES FOR WASHINGTON AGAIN
J. M. Devers, attorney for the state highway commission, left last night for Washington where he will seek final signature of the so-called amendatory agreement and issuance of an item certificate advancing approximately \$1,000,000 of federal funds for construction of the five Oregon Coast highway bridges. The amendatory agreement has been approved by the public works administration and includes a loan of \$500,000 in addition to the original loan and grant of \$5,200,000. The agreement was

signed by the state highway commission at a meeting held in Portland Friday. Devers said he expected to return to Salem within two weeks, and that actual work on the four larger bridges would then get under way. Construction operations on the Alsea bridge have been in progress for the past month.

COUNTY'S SHARE OF JOB COSTS IS LOW

Marion county's re-employment office has handled registrations for nearly one-half of the persons registered in the five-county area comprising this district, D. D. Dotson, office manager here, said yesterday. In the five-county group comprising Linn, Benton, Lincoln, Polk and Marion counties, 14,482 persons have been registered when the last compilation was made. Of these, 6363 come from Marion county. This county, however, has been asked to contribute only \$134 a month out of the \$404 locally-raised budget for the district. The sum of \$104 is matched by the federal government. Marion county's large registration compared to its contribution to the offices, makes this county's per capita share of costs, the lowest of any of the five counties in the area.

Fruit Harvester Call Slackening; Foresters Sent

Placement activities of the national re-employment agency, 350 Court street, are again at slow speed because of the end of the recent heavy call for fruit pickers. Manager D. D. Dotson said yesterday. While 20 black raspberry and four cherry pickers were placed Monday, these were clean-up jobs, he stated. Nine Marion county men yesterday were sent to Ranger Roy Elliott in the Cascade forest above Detroit to cut snags and build trails.

FRIENDS WANT ADS FOR BOOZE BANNED

NEWBERG, June 18. — The annual reports of the education department, including the reports of Greenleaf academy and Pacific college, were received at last week's 42d session of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends. Charles C. Haworth of Salem gave the educational address on "Worthwhile Education."

The reports of both these educational institutions showed a successful year. Greenleaf academy graduated the largest class in its history, Dorothy Martin winning the Pacific college scholarship. Numerous elements of the educational report were found to be of material interest. Of special interest were the facts concerning the teaching profession and college attendance. The Yearly Meeting has 67 students in college, which in proportion to the membership of the Yearly Meeting is more than three times the average for the United States and more than 12 times the average for England, which is nearest to the United States in the proportion of its people receiving a college education. There are 66 members of the Yearly Meeting who are in the teaching profession.

The following letter was directed to the state liquor control board by a unanimous vote of the Yearly Meeting: "The Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends in its 42d annual session at Newberg, Ore., June 16, 1934, protests against the extensive liquor advertising being carried on throughout the state. This through the medium of newspapers, magazines, radio, billboard signs and other means. We request that you use the legislative and administrative authority vested in you, to eliminate all liquor advertising. We believe this can be done in the interest of temperance and control in keeping with the Knox law."

MONMOUTH ELECTS WOMAN DIRECTOR

MONMOUTH, June 18. — For the first time in history voters of Monmouth today placed a woman on the local school board. Mrs. Velma Smith was elected to the three-year term. E. M. Ebbert was

voted in for the one-year term as directed, and F. E. Chambers was re-elected school clerk. The double vacancy in directorships
