Motor Hearing Set—A hearing involving all anywhere-for-hire motor freight carriers operating in Oregon will be held in Salem July 10, Charles M. Tross, state utility commissioner, announced yesterday. The meeting was called by Thomas to consider revision of rates and charges prescribed previously by the commissioner in connection with the operation of these vehicles. Several hundred operators will attend, he said. The carriers will be requested to give testimony at the hearing bearing on the costs of operation.

Whooping Cough Leads—Whooping cough continued last week to be the most prevalent communicable disease in Marion county according to the state department of health bulletin. Nine new cases of this disease were reported, two each of pneumonia and chickenpox, three of scarlet fever and one of tuberculosis. In Polk county only one new case of scarlet fever and one of chickenpox were listed.

These will include Nos. 20 and Nos. 1 to 120. They are part of a six per cent issue of January 15, 1927, which matures January 15, 1937. Already the city has called and paid off Nos. 51 to 120.

Brown, who died at The Dalles Sunday. Mr. Brown served as justice of the supreme court from the year 1920 until January 1, 1933, and previously was attorney general of Oregon for a number of years.

Exemption Denied—A person who operated a vehicle in the distribution of milk from Portland as a starting point to a place which exceeds "three miles beyond the corporate limits of that city," is not exempt from the statutory tax, Attorney General Van Winkle held in an opinion handed down yesterday. Van Winkle held that the tax must be paid even though a portion of the miles measured are within an adjoining state.

State Sues—The State Veterans' Aid commission filed suit here yesterday to foreclose a mortgage against Thomas W. Holman and others. The state alleges that principal and interest on the loan is past due. The original loan was for \$2700; it was made in 1927.

Postmasters Invited—Henry R. Crawford, who becomes Salem's postmaster July 1, officially invited the National League of District Posters to hold their annual meeting in Salem. The chamber of commerce here asked him to issue the invitation.

Ownership League Meets—Although it held a special session Monday night, the Salem Public Ownership league will meet in its regular session at the city hall at 8 o'clock tonight, according to Secretary Fred J. Toole Jr. Current developments in the water situation will be discussed.

Peeping Tom, Alleged—W. B. Shaw of Porterville, Calif., was arrested by city police here early Tuesday and booked as a "peeping tom," according to police records. He was released later in the day without penalty.

Albright Estate In—The estate of the late Blanche E. Albright was admitted to probate here yesterday. C. H. Albright was named administrator of personal property which has an estimated value of \$3500.

Wallowa Pays—Wallowa county yesterday sent to the state treasurer here a check for \$6703.46, covering its second quarter taxes for the year 1934.

T. B. Homecoming—The annual homecoming event at the western Oregon state tuberculosis hospital here will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week. Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent, announced yesterday. The homecoming event was launched several years ago to provide former patients an opportunity to visit the institution, check on their physical condition, if desirous, and to renew acquaintance with the staff. More than 80 former patients attended the homecoming event at the institution last year.

Given 30 Days to Pay—Clarance Dunkin, defendant in a suit to enforce a contract, brought by Bertha and A. G. Lindfoot, was given 30 days yesterday by Judge L. G. Lewelling in which to bring the contract into good standing. He must pay \$400 principal and interest since 1927 together with \$36 taxes and \$48 court costs. If defendant does not perform, the plaintiffs are to be given a deed to the property.

Granted Time—Judge L. G. Lewelling, in a memorandum opinion handed down here yesterday, granted D. J. Richards, defendant in a contract suit brought by the Artisans Life Assurance company, 90 days in which to rehabilitate the contract. In the event he does this, the 1933 crop of prunes he has, is to be released to him. Otherwise plaintiff is granted the right of strict foreclosure of the contract.

Trust Settled—Final report of E. W. Smith as trustee of the E. W. Smith trust in the suit of B. F. Giesy against the Willamette Valley Mortgage Loan company was filed here yesterday in circuit court. Disbursement of \$8742 to creditors of the trust was reported. The claims of creditors were fully paid when hop ranch property taken by the trust was sold for the creditors.

Jurisdiction Queried—Judge McMahon of the Marion county circuit court was asked to determine whether he has jurisdiction over a violation of the prohibition law back in 1931, with the repeal of that act on the statute books. The question was raised in a case involving Alvin E. Smith. The motion alleged that repeal of the prohibition amendment had deprived the court of jurisdiction.

She alleges that recently he has not supported her adequately and that he used \$1000 she inherited in 1931 for personal purposes. She asks for \$20 a month for her support, paid by her husband, and the restoration of her maiden name of Bertha Wilson.

Pardon to Straight—Governor Meier yesterday issued a conditional pardon to Charles Straight of Clackamas county who was serving a five-year term in the Oregon state penitentiary for assault, armed with a dangerous weapon. He was received at the prison July 29, 1933. The pardon provides that Straight shall report monthly to Sheriff Mass of Clackamas county.

Sustains Demurrer—A demurrer filed by the city of Salem to a recent complaint of Winnie D. Kenney, claiming damages, was sustained yesterday in circuit court here. The court sided with the city's defense which held that the municipality was not civilly liable for the acts of its officers performed while on duty.

Opinions Delayed—No supreme court opinions were handed down yesterday due to the absence of Chief Justice Rand who is spending a few days at Walla Walla. Chief Justice Rand is a member of the board of trustees of Whitman college. The opinions will be handed down Thursday.

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WATERFRONT STRIKE SLOWS UP BUSINESS

Agricultural Prospect Said Bright Spot in Oregon by Business Survey

The waterfront strike, which has plagued Portland and other Pacific coast seaports since May 9, had a marked influence on volume of business activity last month, according to the June issue of Business Survey, published and distributed by Commonwealth, Inc., of Portland. The Commonwealth index of Portland business was at 60 of a computed normal, against 80 in April and 61 in May 1933.

Industrial activity was somewhat curtailed due to inability of manufacturers, particularly lumber mills, to make shipments. Lumber stocks at tidewater mills grew rapidly during the month until lack of piling space dictated curtailed production. The market for Oregon lumber continued to be quiet, and there is little in the outlook suggestive of awakened lumber demand.

The bright side of the picture, says Business Survey, is the excellent prospect for Oregon agriculture. Both fruit and grains are doing well in most sections of the state and the possibility of satisfactory prices this fall are enhanced by shortage in other parts of the country. David Eccles, editor of Business Survey, thinks the business outlook for this fall is considerably more optimistic than a year ago, provided labor difficulties do not result in further restriction in buying power and uncertainty. So long as the future is cloudy, business will hesitate to make future commitments, so vital to progress against depression.

MOTOR FUEL SALES GAINING THIS YEAR

Gasoline sales in Oregon from January 1 to May 31, 1934, aggregated 63,176,808 gallons as compared with 59,948,174.75 gallons during the corresponding period in 1933. P. J. Stadelman, secretary of state, reported yesterday. The increase for this year was 3,228,633 gallons.

The gasoline fuels tax during the period January 1 to May 31, 1934, was \$3,158,840.47, as against \$2,397,404.11 during the same period a year ago. Part of the tax increase of \$761,436.36 was due to the additional one-cent levy on gasoline imposed by the 1933 legislature.

Gasoline sales in May of this year totaled 14,191,372.5 gallons as compared with 12,230,072 during the corresponding period in 1933. The tax in May, 1934, was \$709,568.63 as against \$489,078.63 in May 1933.

Non-High School Vote is Delayed

Mrs. Mary L. Fulkerson, county school superintendent, informed the public yesterday that it must be patient in learning the news of the vote for non-high school district directors in the county. More than 100 scattered rural districts participated in the

vote. Before the returns can be announced, the votes must be canvassed, a task which will probably not take place until next week. The count of each district board is brought in a sealed envelope to the courthouse and is enclosed with the ballots. The seal cannot be broken until the canvassing board assembles.

RED TAPE IN WHEAT CONTROL SETUP HIT

Double Inspection Decried by Zorn; Seven Cents More Due Farmers

The federal government is unduly painstaking and technical in its administration of "the wheat sections of its AAA setup," Henry Zorn, county chairman of the wheat control group, averred here yesterday. Zorn said originally the Marion county group had budgeted 75 cents an acre to measure and check the number of fallow acres left by wheat farmers under AAA. Now the government is demanding that this acreage be checked by surveying instruments which adds to the cost, Zorn said. In addition, a government inspector checks the inspection made by the county group.

Zorn said inspectors for the valley would meet Friday at Rickreall for a "school" for the way they have ahead of them. The county committee here has tentatively blocked off the one cent additional on wheat received from AAA to pay for expenses which exceed the initial budget.

Wheat farmers already have received 20 cents a bushel on 54 per cent of their average annual yield for the last three years. Zorn expects that seven cents more will be paid each wheat grower. Each grower has contracted to reduce his wheat acreage 15 per cent and not to place the fields in a crop competitive with wheat. Zorn complained some yesterday about changes in the government's position on the crops which can be sowed in the fallow fields.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT CHECKING ON POOL

Through the present week, at least, the Marion county health department will keep one of its nurses on duty at the Olinger swimming pool to make sure that sanitation is satisfactory, to examine children desiring to enter the pool and to take samples of the swimming water, Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, health officer, announced yesterday. Miss Dorothy Holmes, newest member of the health staff, has received this assignment.

Dr. Douglas yesterday advised a change in the solutions being used in the foot baths through which all swimmers are required to wade before entering the pool. The chemicals being used was not the most effective one, he said. Within a few days first reports on analysis of the water will be received and the amount of chlorination required then determined. The health department will make regular tests of the water.

Dr. Douglas stated.

11 DIVORCES GIVEN TUESDAY, DEFAULT

9 of 11 Complainants are Women; Defendants All Fail to Appear

Activities of the June marriage mill were overbalanced yesterday by a rush of divorces at the courthouse. 11 couples being granted divorces by decree of Judge L. G. Lewelling. In each instance, the complaining party made no appearance and the plaintiff was awarded the decree by default. Nine out of the 11 complainants were women.

Lila Hill won a decree from William Henry Hill and a court order requiring the defendant to pay her \$20 each half-month. Edna Blare was awarded a decree from E. R. Blare on the provision that their child be given to her custody and that the defendant provide \$7.50 a month support funds.

Ella Polk won a decree from Orvin Polk and the restoration of her maiden name of Ella Parent.

The court awarded Gertrude Hunsaker a decree from Robert C. Hunsaker. Gladys Edwards won a decree from Walter Edwards and \$25 a month support money from the defendant for the minor child whose custody was awarded the plaintiff.

Guy W. Ray was awarded a divorce from Geneva Ray, each litigant receiving the custody of one of their two children. Plaintiff is to provide his ex-wife with \$25 a month support funds for the child she is to take.

The court granted a divorce to Margaret Davenport and granted her the right to resume her maiden name of Margaret Tweede. W. J. Davenport was the defendant.
