LAUNCH ATTACK ON RESTAURANT CODE

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other than to assert they would be given careful consideration.

Today is the last day under the code for restaurant operators to get their licenses. Gehlhar said yesterday only 25 per cent of the state's restaurant men had been licensed. The fee is \$5 a year.

Earlier yesterday Gehlhar had said he had been told some restaurant operators were opposed to the annual license charge and his power to levy assessments to defray costs of administering the code.
"Enforcement of the restaurant code is just another duty imposed upon the state agricultural director," Gehlhar said. "The code is provided by law and its creation was not requested by my department or any other state agency. As long as the code remains effective, it is my duty to aid in its enforcement."

Most of the price fixing provisions in the original restaurant code were stricken out by Gehlhar. He did allow a provision to stand which forbids restaurants to sell foods for less than twice their cost.

BISHOPS TO BACK MOVIE CENSORSHIP

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watching with interest the efforts of the Catholic League of Decency in behalf of cleaner motion pictures in the United States.

While expressing full sympathy with the plan of the league and its supporters to fight pictures considered objectionable at the box office, the Europeans believe they have a distinct advantage in pre-showing censorship.

In Great Britain censorship is strict enough to remove a great deal of material from American films, and the Italian censor said there is a 50 per cent rejection of American films.

The French censor, on the other hand, said he could remember no complaints against American films, but in his country a Catholic organization maintains an "index" of pictures containing material regarded as immoral.

ROME, June 21. (AP)—The American Catholic campaign for clean movies has struck a responsive chord in Rome and Vatican City, the more so because the Italian censors consider American productions particularly bad.

"Osservatore Romano," which represents the pope's opinion, today published an article warmly praising the American movement and stating that the crusade is being taken up in Europe.

"We are in full accord with the idea," said Leopoldo Zuelo, president of the government's censorship board. "We are doing our best and will continue to do so to censor immoral films coming from Hollywood."

"Our percentage of rejection is fifty. There is scarcely an American film where the kisses are not yards long."

"We would censor more if the technical difficulties were not so great."

The Vatican organ said that the fight is one for "liberation of actors from repugnant slavery and for recreative sanity."

SAYS DISTRICTS SHOULD JOIN HANDS

SPOKANE, Wash., June 21. (AP)—The example of California orange growers in rising above district rivalry to cooperate for the benefit of the industry was urged upon the apple industry of the Pacific northwest here today.

Addressing the agricultural council of the Pacific northwest advisory board, Glenn B. Marsh, general manager of the Hood River Apple Growers' association, said the domestic market must be developed for apples and better prices obtained. High foreign tariffs have necessitated turning to the domestic field.

Dr. R. B. Heflebower, Washington State college economist, said that although government price manipulation was still an uncertain element, the finding and preserving of foreign markets could be expected from government activities in agriculture.

He declared the spread between prices of raw materials and finished products must be reduced. Raw-material prices must rise, he said, but a relative increase in prices of finished goods would be of little benefit.
