

800 4-H'ERS AT CORVALLIS

Marion County Delegation
This Year Doubles
1933 Showing

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, June 21.—Among the nearly 800 club members and 60 leaders attending the 20th annual 4-H club summer school on the campus here are 10 boys, 19 girls and two leaders from Marion county, or about twice as many as Marion sent last year. The club summer school this year is the largest ever held in Oregon.

About 12 of the Marion delegation are here on scholarships won at the spring club fair this year, and about five or six others hold scholarships from service clubs of the county. Ten are holders of state fair scholarships, and the

others are providing their own money for tuition. Among the Marion delegation are LaVerna Whitehead of Turner, champion 4-H apple writer of the state, and Wallace Doerflinger of Oakridge, one of the two outstanding 4-H boys of the state last year, who is a member of the Boys' Executive committee at the summer school.

Have Full Schedule
The boys at summer school live in the college men's dormitory, and the girls occupy two women's halls, Waldo and Kiddle. They spend their mornings attending classes and their afternoons, following the daily assembly, are spent in athletics and other forms of supervised recreation. Their evenings, too, are full, with parties, pictures, local talent shows and similar entertainment. A number of new classes have been added this year and are meeting with great favor among the clubbers.

Special programs, usually featuring some prominent citizen or citizens of the state as speakers, are arranged for each assembly. These programs are broadcast for the benefit of parents and friends of clubbers and for the thousands of members over the state who are unable to participate in summer school. Each county delegation also broadcasts over station KOAC between 7 and 7:45 o'clock in the evening at two week sessions.

Govern Self
Self-government is the rule at summer school, with the boys and the girls having separate executive bodies. Irene Eitter of Pilot Rock is president of the girls and Ivan

Blery of Washington county is chairman of the Boys' Executive committee.
