

NEW VIOLENCE MARKS STRIKE

Four Workers are Injured at San Pedro; Seattle Facing Embargo

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Meanwhile J. C. Bjorklund, district secretary of the I. L. A., announced that he had wired union headquarters in Europe, Asia, Australia, New Zealand and South America, requesting them to refuse to handle cargoes on ships which had been loaded by non-union men.

Mayor Jimmy expressed the belief that President Roosevelt is the only one in a position to handle the situation.

At Pier 40, unloading was completed of the British motorship Modavia, and work was started on putting 2,500 cases of salmon on board. Forty new non-union workers, who arrived at the pier this morning by launch, started taking off 1,600 tons of general cargo from the freighter Everett.

Despite reports that trouble would start when cargo booms on any of the American ships began moving, there was a noticeable let-down in tension at the pier, with picket-lines dwindling to only about 100 men.

An announcement from the citizens emergency committee stated there was no shortage of labor, with 400 experienced long-shoremen registered for work, and 150 applicants for work as seamen taking examinations for life boat certificates.

Second Story of Eugene Creamery Damaged by Fire

EUGENE, June 22.—(P)—Fire spread by an explosion gutted the second story of the Eugene Farmers' Creamery and caused an estimated \$25,000 damage before it was brought under control early this morning.

Heavy black smoke from stored tires that started in flames and escaping ammonia gas from the refrigeration plant impeded fire fighters. However damage was

limited to the second story and did not reach valuable equipment on the ground floor.

Fire trucks returned to the station only to be called at once to cope with three burning houses. The fire originated in an old shack occupied by transients. Firemen let it burn and poured their streams of water on flaming structures on either side of the shack.

SCOLLARD MYSTERY SOLUTION CLAIMED

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to court a silver casket of ashes and papers purporting to prove they are the remains of his business ally, Sarah E. Corbett-Smith-Willard Scollard, dramatic, eccentric juggler of fabulous fortunes and millionaire husbands, who had been mysteriously missing and sought around the world.

Mrs. Brown said the papers proving Mrs. Scollard died in 1932 at Montreal of pneumonia, and the ashes, had been secreted in her husband's apartment on his \$1,000,000 estate at the Yakima Indian reservation.

Mrs. Scollard, romantic figure in finance, who was called "the Hetty Green of La Salle street, Chicago," vanished from Seattle in 1927, leaving a tangle of staggering lawsuits, a group of bewildered attorneys who charged Brown had stolen millions from her while she was mentally incompetent, and federal income tax charges that caused agents of the department of justice, the federal bureau of internal revenue and the United States marshal's office to seek her fruitlessly ever since.

She made a fortune by brilliant real estate operations in Chicago. She married James Smith, wealthy pick-and-shovel miner of Idaho, on his deathbed, inheriting another fortune. She wed R. T. Willard, one-time Yale football star, and divorced him after lavishing thousands upon him. She married G. F. Scollard of Bellingham, Wash., and divorced him after accusing him of taking more than \$1,000,000 from her estate.

\$600,000 Allotted Oregon for Roads

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—(P)—Oregon's share of funds for construction of national forest roads for the fiscal year of 1935 will be \$610,134, District Engineer W. H. Lynch announced today.

Of the \$7,000,000 appropriated for the entire United States, Oregon, Washington and Montana will receive \$1,623,993. Washington's share will be \$403,827 and Montana's \$610,132.

2,157 CCC Boys To Be Recruited As State's Quota

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(P)—New York, California and Texas will receive the largest quotas of new recruits in the civilian conservation corps, which will add 2,157 boys to the ranks of the force during July as replacements for men who have dropped out or will be discharged prior to July 1.

The state quotas include: California 5699, Idaho 646, Montana 764, New York 7870, Oregon 2157, Texas 5227, Washington 2632.

FUND ALLOTTED TO RIVER CHANNEL JOB

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(P)—The war department today announced approval of allotments totaling \$1,512,400 for the maintenance of authorized projects throughout the Pacific division for the fiscal year 1935, with the exception of projects in the Honolulu district.

The largest allotment, \$595,000 was for the Columbia and lower Willamette rivers below Vancouver, Wash., and Portland. Allotment of \$62,000 was made for work in the Willamette river above Portland and Yamhill river. Other allotments included: Examination, surveys and contingencies, Portland district, \$23,250; Tillamook bay and bar, \$16,000, and Cowlitz river, Washington, \$10,000.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—(P)—The war department allotments for work on the Columbia and Willamette rivers were for continuance of channel maintenance work which has been carried on for a number of years, Major Charles F. Williams, district United States engineer, said tonight.

Two Applications For Relief Sent
