came for auto, thereby exempting the large car owner from proportionate payment, but he aided in getting a higher gasoline tax passed," Orton declared.

**Martin Candidate of Power Trust, Claim**  
General Martin was characterized by Orton as a hand-picked candidate of the power trust, declaring that "stool pigeon" on West went east to get Martin to run. The crowd cheered as Orton played West. Orton also declared Dunne was satisfactory to the utility interests.

R. M. LeFevre of Yamhill county was elected chairman. He made a brief speech, urging the choice of a "dirt farmer" for governor.  
A. G. Rempel of Polk county, Ted Smith of Marion county and G. M. Davenport of Yamhill county served as the main committee credentials. Delegates officially seated numbered 219 or more than twice the 100 required by statute as necessary to make up an official independent convention. Fully 600 persons, delegates and others, were in the halls of the house of representatives at the meeting progressed.

On the resolutions committee chairman Orton placed A. M. Church and Roy R. Hewitt of this city; Martin Rostvold of Mt. Angel and Dr. Albert Slaughter of Portland.

Orton named Morton Tompkins of Dayton, Charles Nelson of Yamhill and W. K. Patrick of Portland as a committee to notify Senator Zimmerman of his nomination.  
Zimmerman's name was placed in nomination by Carl E. Nelson of Dayton, Yamhill county. Nelson characterized the Yamhill county senator as a fit captain "to take the command in the dawn of a great political battle." Zimmerman is a "real dirt farmer, with dirt under his fingernails" Nelson declared. "He is a fearless sponsor of legislation for the common people."

The delegates rose and cheered when Nelson closed his speech with Zimmerman's nomination. Don't Want Business Man Says Collier

"We don't want a business man in office," F. E. Colter of Portland averred in a second Zimmerman's nomination. "We've got a business man now and God for give us, Zimmerman gave up a career as a business man to go for the people; we need him now because he will stand with the people."

John V. Bosorth of Tillamook said he had been a republican and had voted the ticket as "long as his conscience would permit him." He declared the "old order" had passed; the people had nothing to hope for from the old parties."

Tom Monks, defeated candidate for county commissioner in Portland, said that Multnomah county had many "liberal" citizens who would support Zimmerman. He said Joe Dunne's position was shown by his support of Wilbur Henderson for county chairman of the republican party. Monks assailed Meier. "It's hard for a great mercantile millionaire like the governor to take sides in a labor controversy such as has tied up the state when his business might be boycotted," Monks averred.

Robert Shuble spoke for Zimmerman and his state bank plan, saying interest on debt in the United States now ran to 15 billions of dollars a year, an amount the people cannot pay.

Dr. Albert Slaughter praised Zimmerman as the people's candidate and struck at the Oregonian for alleged misrepresentation of Zimmerman's abilities.

J. W. Johnston, Gervais resident, urged all "real grangers—masters and subordinates in granges throughout the state—to get behind Peter Zimmerman." Johnston said he had been active in the campaign for Sam Brown.

"We know we are not allowed to use political influence in subordinate granges," Johnston said, but I think it correct that I urge the leaders to work for Zimmerman.  
J. M. Wise of Kenton, Multnomah county, reported that a straw ballot taken through a number of districts in Portland had resulted as follows: Martin 1320; Dunne 656; Zimmerman 1130. "Martin is getting all the votes of well-to-do people; Zimmerman must depend on labor and the farmers to support him," Wise concluded.

## PORTLAND DENIED LOAN FROM STATE

J. E. Bennett, city commissioner of Portland, yesterday conferred with Ferd Paulus, deputy state treasurer, to determine on what terms the City of Portland could borrow a part of the state's surplus funds of \$1,000,000, represented in a sight-draft on the Federal Reserve bank.

Bennett told the treasury department officials that the City of Portland required approximately \$200,000 to meet its current expenses and interest payments during the next few months. He said the city was now paying interest to the banks at the rate of approximately 5 per cent. Bennett urged a short time loan, with a maximum maturity of four months.

Paulus informed Bennett that the City of Portland's existing indebtedness precluded such a loan, and that it could not be negotiated under the statutes at the present time.

## DEPOSIT RELEASES GRANTED 2 BANKS

Orders granting extensions of time to three Oregon banks in which to place their affairs on a 100 per cent unrestricted basis, were issued Monday by A. A. Schramm, state superintendent of banks. In two cases, additional deposits were released.

Suspension of the bank of Sellwood was extended from June 25 to July 2.

## OREGON V. F. W. IN LINE FOR AWARDS

New Post Quota Met, Others In Prospect, Conley Tells Local Group

"If I do not drive one of those new Chevrolet cars back to Oregon from the national encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars at Louisville, Ky., in October, I will be sadly disappointed," declared State Commander Bryan H. Conley at the meeting of Marion post in Miller's hall last night. The Oregon Department also stands in line for one of the four silver trophies offered by the national department in the membership drive competition, said Commander Conley.

The national department is offering seven new Chevrolet cars and four silver trophies to state department winners in the nation-wide competition. Oregon's quota of new posts was set at 10 and total state membership increase at 300. Oregon department has already instituted its quota of new posts, has two or three others in process of organization and has far exceeded its membership quota, with over three months to go before the campaign closes. More than 300 new posts have been organized throughout the country during the organization year, which ends September 30, making more than 3000 individual units.
