pany may use one of its own engineers. There was some argument over the company's contention that all should be members of the American Society of Civil Engineers, the company contending that this was the recognized professional society and that the trustees would insist on selection from such a group. Mr. Cunningham is a member of the society. The city representatives thought that other engineers would be qualified and might be more easily available. This point remains to be settled.

The second point at controversy was the suspension of condemnation proceedings. The city in its draft of contract included provisions by which the city and company would agree to have the pending case in federal court set for trial, and if at the time fixed for arbitration was not concluded or nearly so both sides would go to trial.

The company objected to this provision because of the expense of preparing two sets of proceedings: arbitration and condemnation; and in their amendments presented in the afternoon gave the city option to discontinue arbitration at any time, but the company would have 60 days before going to trial in the condemnation suit.

The city attorneys argued against danger of further delay in the condemnation case if the arbitration matter was held up indefinitely, on the ground that PWA might cancel the loan-grant of \$1,500,000.

Conferences were held in the offices of Walter C. Winslow, special attorney for the city, Mayor McKay and Councilman Vandover were out of town during the day, Sam Hughes, chairman of the utilities committee, and City Attorney Kowitz being the only other city representatives on hand. President Earl C. Elliott, Henry Costigan, attorney, Walter E. Keyes and J. T. Delaney represented the water company.

Makin Moves in Court to Obtain Freight Permit

W. F. Makin, operating as the Makin truck line, filed mandamus proceedings Tuesday in the Marion county circuit court to compel Charles M. Thomas, state utility commissioner, to grant him a permit to operate as an anywhere-for-hire freight motor carrier under the state transportation act. The court set June 29 as the date for hearing arguments of attorneys.

Makin alleged that he was entitled to a permit for the reason that he operated as a contract carrier in 1932. Utility department officials declared that Makin's application to operate as an anywhere-for-hire freight carrier was refused for the reason that he had not complied with the rules and regulations of the state transportation division. Headquarters of the Makin truck line are at Ontario.

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FIGHT ON GAMBLING PLAN OF GOVERNOR

BATON ROUGE, La., June 26. — After hinting that he planned sensational action against gambling in Louisiana, Governor O. K. Allen tonight kept his state guessing on what steps would be taken to dim the bright lights of gambling places he recently condemned.

His chief political advisor, "Kingfish" Huey P. Long, who has shared the executive's offices here since returning from Washington last week, unequivocally recommended use of the national guard as he himself had done back in 1928, but the governor kept his counsel, declining to discuss reports that the militia was ready to pounce on New Orleans resorts of chance.

Just the reports, however, appeared to have been enough to still temporarily the rattle of dice, the click of roulette wheels and the muffled shuffle of handbook betting slips and lottery tickets in at least a portion of the state. For reports reached the capitol that leading gambling places in and about the city of New Orleans had closed down at least for a time early today, pending developments.

Published reports there said the shut-down was prompted by a fast-flying rumor the militia was mobilizing at Jackson barracks, just below the city. Inquiries at the barracks brought an often heard explanation that certain companies were "just having a regular drill night."

Beat egg whites stiff. When half beaten add cream of tartar. Fold in sugar gradually and add remaining ingredients. Drop from teaspoon to greased cookie sheet. Bake at 325 degrees until a golden brown. Makes about 3 dozen.

½ cup finely chopped popped corn
½ tablespoon soft butter
1 egg white
½ cup sugar
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon vanilla
blanched and candied cherries

Add butter to corn. Beat egg white until stiff and add sugar gradually, continuing the beating. Combine mixtures, add salt and vanilla. Drop from tip of spoon on a well buttered sheet one inch apart. Shape in circular form with case knife first dipped in cold water. Sprinkle with almonds and place a piece of candied cherry on center of each. Bake in slow oven until delicately browned. Makes 2 to 3 dozen.

1 cup shortening
2 cups brown sugar
2 eggs
1 cup nuts
1 cup dates
3 ½ cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
Cream shortening, add sugar gradually and cream well. Add well beaten eggs, nuts and dates, chopped fine in food chopper, vanilla. Sift flour, soda and salt together. Mix this in the creamed mixture with hands. Form in a roll, wrap in a wax paper, chill until firm, slice in ¼ inch slices and bake eight to 10 minutes on ungreased tin in 375 degrees oven. Right dozen small cookies.

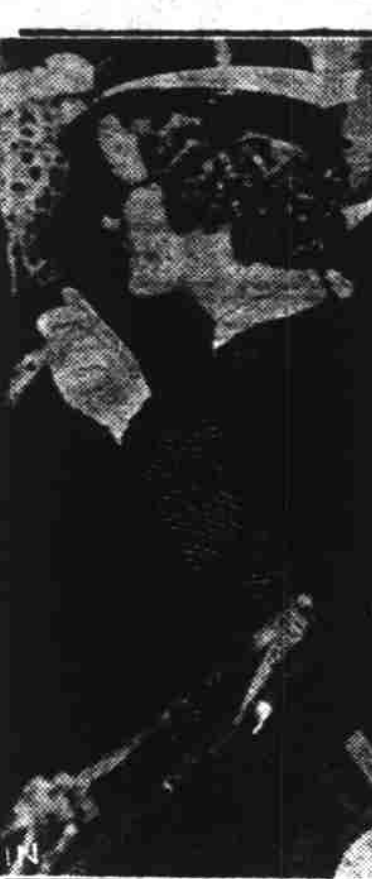

the legality of this year including depreciation as a tuition expense item but Weinacht held it a duty of his board at least to secure a compromise on the amount, if possible.

Dr. B. F. Pound was the only Salem director suggesting there should be a compromise.

Directors Walter B. Minier, E. A. Bradford, Mrs. David Wright and Frank E. Neer argued that including depreciation as an expense item was acceptable "in an ordinary business," that Salem taxpayers would question their action if they did not require tuition students to help share this expense, and, finally, that since the tuition students received the same privileges and opportunities as Salem students they should therefore pay on the same basis as Salem district taxpayers.

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
