

10 LIVES SNUFFED OUT BY DYNAMITE

squads of Olympia police and firemen and state patrolmen were hurried to the scene. All of the available ambulances in Olympia were rushed to the plant.

State Patrolmen Fight Brush Fires Nearby

The state patrolmen, after working with Olympia police and firemen in removing the bodies from the wreckage and gathering up others that had been hurled clear, remained to combat brush fires.

The plant was a comparatively small one, employing 15 men on a shift. The loss was estimated at \$75,000. The plant was owned by J. V. Denn, whose headquarters are in Portland. He was out of the city when the blast occurred.

The explosions were preceded by a fire that ignited the clothing of Roscoe Dehn, mixing room employee. He leaped into a safety tank and while fellow workers turned into a fire fighting unit he was rushed to the hospital by Henry Dehn.

Dehn had barely reached the road from the plant when the major explosion occurred, he said.

Hazel Eppley, one of those killed, assisted in loading Dehn into an emergency car and had just returned to the plant to assist in fighting the fire when the explosion occurred.

The origin of the fire that set off the blast was not immediately determined.

Boy Returns Against Stepfather's Orders

Oliver Wilson, the boy victim of the tragedy, was ordered to a point of safety by his stepfather but returned to the fire in time to be caught by the explosion.

Victims of the tragedy were in some instances hurled clear of the burning structure and were not discovered for some time.

The death toll was believed to have been made larger by the confidence of workers in the non-explosiveness of the powder by fire.

A recent blaze destroyed the company's plant without exploding dynamite and powder. The plant was then rebuilt. John Clausen, who was critically injured in the previous fire, returned to work Monday after recovering from his injuries and was among those killed.

Three of the 11 died after they were taken to the hospital. They were Alvin Smith, H. J. Denn, Sr., and Andrew Hayden.

Olympia undertaking establishments were turned into emergency morgues to care for the bodies.

Henry Denn, from whom names of employees were obtained, said there were 15 on shift. Two employees on duty were reported to have escaped uninjured. Henry Denn was not on duty when the explosion occurred.

Confusion from the explosion wrecked office buildings and residences of employees near the plant. The entire end of the office structure was hurled through the length of the building.

Blast Heard Miles

TACOMA, June 27. — (P) — The terrific explosion which wrecked the plant of the Denn Powder company on Hawks Prairie, near Olympia, late today was heard in all parts of Tacoma. Telephone exchanges and newspaper switchboards were flooded with calls as citizens sought to learn the nature and location of the blast. Hawks Prairie is about 22 miles southwest of Tacoma.

en. In general, the hop season is a full month ahead of the usual developments at this time of year. Just what the next 15 days will bring even veteran hopgrowers decline to venture.

"This hop business is all up in the air," opined Henry Cornoyer, grower and dealer who in ordinary seasons makes pretty close observations during the growing season. Cornoyer says he has heard a number of the oldest growers in this section declare they've never seen anything to beat the present growing conditions and uncertainties.

In the last week, three lots of hops have been sold in this section. Horst bought 84 bales from Gooding at Aurora at 20 cents; Wolf Hop company bought 99 bales from William Krebs and 120 bales from August Crocker, the latter at 25 cents. These were all 1933 clusters.

aries Morgenthau, Wallace, Ickes and Perkins, and an advisory group on social legislation including business, industrial, labor, social and other leaders. Possibly an expert would be employed and given a staff to direct the research, fact-finding and coordinating job.

The program, which Mr. Roosevelt outlined to congress stressed three points:

"This security for the individual and the family concerns itself primarily with three factors. People want decent homes to live in; they want to locate them where they can engage in productive work; and they want some safeguard against misfortunes which cannot be wholly eliminated in this man-made world of ours."

PLAN TO BE LAID FOR NEW VET POST

crisis in the waterfront strike situation. In addition, 303 special officers have been sworn in.

Police were ordered tonight to report again at 6:30 a. m. Thursday, regardless of shifts, at municipal terminal No. 4 where three vessels are berthed. Chief of Police Lawson prepared to spend the night at the terminal. Though waterfront employers have not made any statement, both police and the augmented picket line apparently expected the first test attempt to break the strike to be made Friday morning.

Manning of Police on Docks is Protested

In anticipation of a "zero hour" officers of the International Longshoremen's association today presented an open letter to Mayor Joseph K. Carson, protesting the massing of police and warning the mayor responsibility for harm to persons or property would be his if any attempt is made to move cargo.

Developments in the strike today were two: the tanker Arizona slipped out of port early this morning, presumably with a cargo of oil. The craft was guarded by 10 police, and strikers made no attempt to halt her. Second, two members of the so-called "conservative" longshoremen's union were ganged and beaten early today. Later, two longshoremen identified by one of the victors as his assailants were arrested and indicted by the grand jury on assault and battery charges.

Portland's gasoline and fuel oil shortage became acute today when the Texas company was added to the "unfair" list by the strike committee.

A new step toward settlement of the strike was taken when representatives of strikers and employers met with the city council and a committee was named to re-draft the "Portland plan," eliminating features objectionable to other ports.

HARRIMAN GIVEN 4 YEARS; WIFE CRIES

NEW YORK, June 27. — (P) — Joseph W. Harriman, once affluent financial figure in the world, was sentenced today to serve four and one-half years in prison.

The 67-year-old former head of the closed Harriman National bank, convicted in federal court of making false entries in the bank's books, appeared more cheerful than many in the dingy court room.

Judge John C. Knox's voice broke as he concluded a long explanation of the sentence with these words:

"Each of us in the face of adversity must stand steadfast, and this message must go to everyone in a position of public trust."

Harriman's wife was a grief-stricken figure. His daughter, Mrs. Boykin C. Wright, wept. He only compressed his lips, staring blankly at his counsel.

The former banker—convicted of falsifying bank records to the extent of \$1,713,225 and misappropriating approximately \$600,000—stood motionless as his daughter left her seat and kissed him. They smiled at each other.

FRISCO DOCTOR IN BAD TRUCK SMASH

ALBANY, Ore., June 27. — (P) — Fears that Dr. William E. Smith, San Francisco, may have sustained internal injuries when the truck in which he was riding collided with "another truck on a highway near here today were expressed tonight by physicians at the Albany hospital to which he was taken. Dr. Smith has a brain concussion and severe cuts and bruises, doctors said, but his condition late today was improving.

Ed Hostetter, of Lebanon, Ore., also suffered possible internal injuries and broken ribs in the wreck. He was taken to Lebanon. Joseph Turcott, Corvallis, Ore., received cuts and bruises.

Dr. Smith and Turcott were riding in a hay truck driven by B. H. Bevins, Airlie, Ore., when it collided with a large logging truck driven by Hostetter. Dr. Smith, with his three children, has been visiting for two weeks at the home of his sister, Mrs. S. E. Beal, of near Corvallis. The logging truck was being taken to the Bevins home.

Dr. Smith's children were not with their father on the truck.

GAS, POLICE CLUBS QUELL DISORDERS

MILWAUKEE, Wis., June 27. — (P) — Tear gas and police clubs quelled a sudden resumption of disorder in the strike of Milwaukee Electric Railway and Light company employees tonight.

One policeman was reported stabbed and several persons injured and arrested before the demonstrators, who, with onlookers, numbered, according to police, about 5000 persons, were finally quieted. The number of injured was not immediately available.

The center of tonight's trouble, which resulted in an immediate order by the company halting all trolley service until daylight, was the Klunkinickin car barn, where last night's outbreak in which 47 street cars were battered by a crowd of about 5000, also occurred. There were other disturbances at the West Side barns to night.

Police hurled about 10 bombs before the demonstrators and strike sympathizers finally began dispersing.

GIRL, 10, KILLER AIDE
