

DAWES CITED FOR
ANTI-PAY THEORY

LONDON, June 27.—(AP)—Great Britain in a note made public tonight rejected the American suggestion for payment of war debts in kind as impractical and a threat to Anglo-American trade.

The British note, answering a communication of Secretary of State Hull in which the suggestion was made, expressed a desire for a final settlement of the debt problem, but stated that the government sees the same effect on economic conditions by payment in goods or services as by payment in cash.

Former Vice-President Charles G. Dawes was quoted to back up this argument.

"In their effects, deliveries in kind are not readily distinguishable from cash payments," the British note from a statement made by Dawes as head of the 1924 reparations committee.

The communication reiterates the desire of Britain for a full and permanent settlement of the problem, "whenever it may appear that the present abnormal conditions have so far passed as to offer favorable prospects for a settlement."

The government, adds the note, "is sincerely anxious to remove from the sphere of controversy all or any matters which might disturb the harmony of relations between the two countries."

MORE DATA ON COST
FIGURES IS ASKED

High school districts in the county were asked yesterday by the board of education for the non-high school districts to supply more information on their 1933-1934 costs than is contained in the reports accompanying the various district's bills for tuition.

The board of education, while not refusing to pay the tuition bills, is scrutinizing them carefully with the view to reduce every possible item of expense for the out-of-city area.

It was revealed yesterday that the item of depreciation—objected to by the non-high school district board—is not fixed by law as an expense. Rather the tuition expenses result entirely from contracts entered into by the high school and non-high school boards of education. The state department of education does recommend that depreciation be considered as a fair cost. The charge is not mandatory.

in Boy's Killing

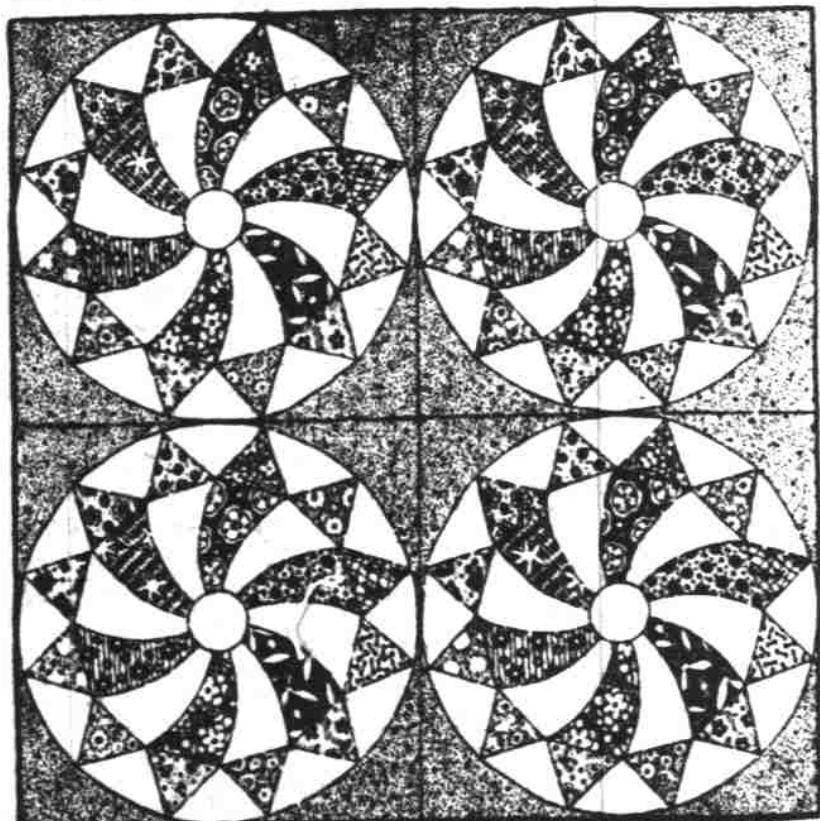

Probe Started
of Tax Returns

The state tax commission has entered upon the task of investigating all 1934 returns, involving personal income, intangibles and corporate excise taxes, to determine whether they comply strictly with the existing tax laws. Officials declared that a number of complicated questions had arisen in connection with some of the returns. One of these has to do with the status of corporations financed by federal funds. Some attorneys have held that these corporations were federal in character, while other attorneys declared that they were subject to the corporate excise tax and personal income tax acts.

I was very pleasantly interested in The Statesman's account of the reunion of the members of the Avenue Tennis club, which was organized 45 years ago in Salem and am delighted to note that so many of the participants of that time are still among the living and active in social and business life.

Somewhere, however, has a faulty memory as to location. "The spot across from Willson park where the Thomas B. Kay residence now stands" was not available as a tennis court in 1889 any more than it is now, as the same residence which stands there at present stood there then, occupied by Moody, who had built it while governor in the 1882-1886 term.

Just reverse the location of that tennis court. I remember it well. Instead of being across from Willson park where the Kay residence stands, it was in Willson park opposite the Kay property (then the Moody property). The reason the club was named the Avenue Tennis club is because what is now Willson park was then Willson Avenue and was not given the "park" name until many years afterwards. And the club's playground was in "Willson Avenue."

1000 DRIVERS NOW
UNDER STATE TABOO

Approximately 1000 Oregon motorists are now included in the list of those whose driver's licenses have either been suspended or revoked, according to a report released yesterday by P. J. Stadelman, secretary of state.

During the month of May there were 81 suspensions and revocations, which set a new all-time record for any single month in the history of the state department. Of these, 55 were revoked for driving while intoxicated and none can apply for reinstatement or new licenses until after one year. In one case the license was revoked when the holder was convicted of involuntary manslaughter. There were nine suspensions for reckless driving.

William Hammond, in charge of the state operators' bureau, announced that the police and circuit courts in all parts of Oregon were now cooperating with the state department and that all traffic accidents were being reported promptly. During the past month more than 750 abstracts of court records were received at the automobile division.

SERA HALTS DUE TO
SHORTAGE OF CASH

Lack of funds yesterday forced the Marion county SERA administration to close down most of its projects for the remainder of the month. Placement Officer D. G. Metcalf estimated the shutdown affected 267 men and women, including 23 at Silverton.

While no allotment has been announced for July, local officials believe additional funds will be made available so that the SERA work relief may be resumed here.

Yesterday's stop work orders did not affect the rural relief projects at Woodburn and Hubbard because the only wages they pay are in groceries and clothing. A crew of eight SERA workers also was retained to continue upkeep work at Olinger swimming pool.

Costs of completing the Leslie pool system with private labor was being considered by the Salem school board. It was estimated five days' work remained, chiefly in laying the pipe line for the pool water supply.

Livestock Boost

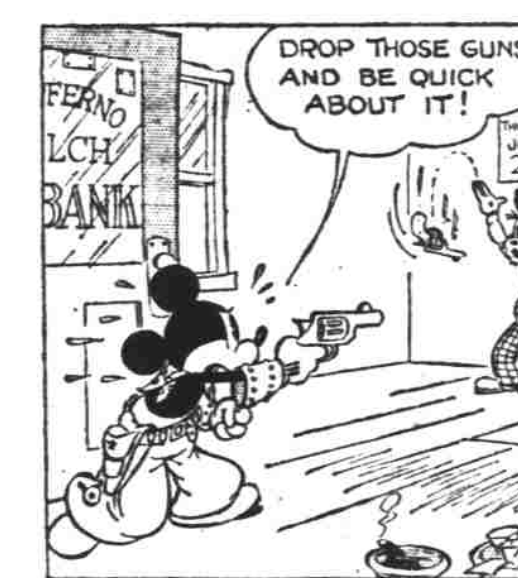

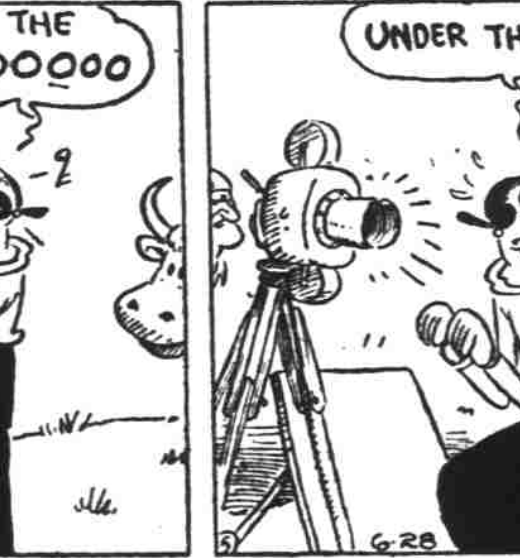
