

BLOCKADE MAY BE ENDED SOON

Ickes Says Government is About Ready to Charter Ships for Alaska

The attitude of at least part of the seamen and longshoremen's groups was described as expressed in the stand, "we can't arbitrate. How can anybody arbitrate? The open and closed shop issue? It must be one or the other."

SEATTLE, June 29.—(P)—A federally controlled secret vote on the strike by longshoremen was promised to a delegation of "conservatives" today, as efforts to effect a 72-hour "truce" on the waterfront here apparently fell flat.

The promise that the longshoremen will be given an opportunity to cast secret ballots under government supervision was made by Charles W. Hope, secretary of the regional labor board, to a group of 20 men who, spokesmen said, represented 600 Seattle longshoremen who wished to return to work and support their families. They contended the local union was controlled by "radicals" who have refused the "conservatives" a voice in the strike proceedings.

Charles A. Reynolds, chairman of the regional labor board, sent here by President Roosevelt's new strike mediation board to investigate the Alaska situation, reported that members of the waterfront employers of Seattle refused to consider the truce, although union representatives were willing to accept it.

STEIWER SAYS PWA FIGURES TOO HIGH

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(P)—A demand for an itemized list of the public works projects approved for Oregon was made to Administrator Ickes today by the office of Senator Steiwer (R., Ore.), following publication of a statement the state had received \$37,561,870 in public works funds.

Steiwer, now en route home, said he believed the figure was much too high unless the public works administration had charged the entire \$20,000,000 allotment for Bonneville dam, on the Columbia river between Oregon and Washington, to his state. He ascertained before leaving that the published figures were given out from PWA.

At the senator's office it was said Administrator Ickes had assured Steiwer and other members of the Oregon congressional delegation that the Bonneville dam allotment would be divided equally between Oregon and Washington states.

strikers to their former positions. The company will restore the status quo as of June 20, 1934. All equities and beneficiary features of the company's union are to be preserved for all employees.

The company will arrange for the immediate withdrawal of bulletin 5. (The bulletin prohibits members of the company's union from joining other unions.) The company will negotiate for wages, hours and working conditions, according to the provisions of section 7A of the National Industrial Recovery act.

Salary Increase Pleas Up Before Board on Monday

Requests for salary increases, involving a number of employees of the state industrial accident commission, will be filed with the state board of control at its meeting here Monday.

Under a recent ruling all salary increases affecting state employees must receive the approval of the board of control. Members of the commission declared that even though the salary increases were approved by the board they would be within the basic limitation fixed by the 1933 legislature.

TURNER CONVENTION WILL CLOSE SUNDAY

Attendance at Church Meet Larger Than Usual During Week

TURNER, June 29.—The annual state convention of the churches of Christ of Oregon, is meeting with larger attendance during the week than usual. The addresses of Thursday were very inspiring. C. F. Swander, state secretary, and W. F. Nankwest, both of Portland, were the morning speakers. The afternoon session was taken up by addresses by two returned missionaries, Mrs. Grace Hendricks, home from Japan, who said upon her departure for the home land the native Christian women urged her to emphasize "We are Christian sisters."

Miss Goldie Ruth Wells, whose first trip to Africa on the Congo was in 1920, referred to the sacrifices of the Oregon churches 20 years ago in providing means to buy the river boat Oregon which was so badly needed by the missionaries. Stephen J. Corey of Indianapolis, a member of the national board of the United Christian missionary society, spoke of problems confronting the board. The finances have not been so good and a number of missionaries were necessarily called home. He also stated that missionary money is coming in better during the present year.

The usual banquet was served at the close of the session and was given in the local Christian church by the local church women with plates for 125.

Friday's program included addresses by Stephen J. Corey, guest speaker; T. T. Swearingen of St. Louis; O. W. Jones of Bend; William R. Baird of Medford and A. C. Bates of Klamath Falls.

The 11:30 o'clock address Saturday morning will be given by Rev. Guy L. Drill at the Salem First Christian church, whose topic will be "Growing in Human Sympathy Through Christian Brotherhood." The morning address at 10:45 will be by C. W. Reynolds of Portland.
