BUILDERS SEEK AID IN HOUSING SURVEY

Chamber of Commerce to Be Asked to Assist; SERA Help Eyed

A local housing survey to provide information in line with Roosevelt's federal housing bill is too great an undertaking for the Salem Building congress to undertake alone, the builders decided at a meeting last night. They will appoint a committee to present the idea to the chamber of commerce, with assurance of full cooperation in case the chamber should elect to carry through the survey.

Estimates of the builders indicate it will take full time of 50 men for 30 days to gather all the information sought in the multiplicity of questionnaires received on the survey from Washington, D. C. Builders here have made the suggestion that the survey be carried on locally by SERA paid workers.

Suggestions from Washington are that the survey be handled by a group of volunteer workers organized from civic groups and service clubs. The survey would canvass the entire city to obtain information on all eligible for modernization and new home construction under the federal housing bill which congress voted.

The builders group made no effort to ask that a survey committee, as outlined by Washington, be appointed here, pending conference of the committee with the chamber of commerce.

DELAY FORESEEN IN MAKING CONTRACTS

Contracts for the education of non-high school district pupils in adjacent schools, for the year 1934-1935, set to be made by July 15, it was announced yesterday at the courthouse. A number of boards of education for non-high school districts in other counties in the state have already completed their new contracts.

Delay is expected in completing the contracts in this county due to differences of opinion between the county board and the various high school boards on what constitutes "costs". Last year's contracts were indefinite on this item. The present county board doubts if depreciation is a fair cost. The various high school districts insist depreciation must be included in the costs charged for each student's tuition.

The 1933 law passed to clear up ambiguities in the prevailing law, which provided that districts not specify which items should be included in costs for making up tuition bills. In a manual suggesting procedure in making contracts between high school and non-high school boards, the state superintendent's office has suggested that depreciation be included as a cost.

CHANGE IN FISCAL YEAR IS PROVIDED

Under a new 1933 legislative act, which became effective recently, the 1935 legislature will make appropriations for two and one-half years, after which the appropriations again will be made on the two-year basis, it was announced at the state department yesterday. This law provides that the fiscal year for all state activities shall end June 30.

Officials said the new law would operate so as to provide funds to conduct state departments and institutions during all times of the year. Under the old system biennial appropriations expired on December 31, with the result that in legislative years, there were no funds for some state activities during January and February.

Prior Claim to Fund in Stayton Bank Is Sought

Elmer Archambeau filed suit here Friday to have a \$275 deposit of his in the Bank of Stayton, in liquidation, declared a prior claim. Archambeau's reason is this: A few days before the bank closed, he alleges, he agreed to loan \$2800 to A. W. and Carrie M. Sunderman. He tendered the money to J. W. Mayo, cashier, in trust and as an escrow holder. The loan did not materialize.

Mayo told plaintiff, the latter alleges, that he had deposited the money in a Salem bank. Not for months after the Stayton bank closed, Archambeau alleges, did he know that \$275 of his money was placed to his credit there.

Walnut Outlook Unusually Good Says Van Trump

Marion county never had a better outlook for a walnut crop, at this time of the year, than this summer, S. H. Van Trump, horticulturist for the county, declared yesterday. He said the walnut orchards he had seen recently confirmed his view.

Mr. Van Trump, back at his office this week after his prolonged illness and operation, is gradually regaining his strength. Yesterday he went to the Skyline walnut orchard and made an inspection. He reports that orchard—largest singly-owned walnut acreage in the world—in excellent condition.

For several summers he traveled with the nationally known Petticord evangelistic party. HIGHWAY PROGRAM PERILED BY STRIKE

Loss of Fuel Tax Money Is Mentioned by Baldock; Contractors Hurt

Continuation of the longshoremen's strike now in progress in Portland and at other Pacific coast ports, with a corresponding curtailment of the movement of gasoline and other materials through the Portland docks, would play havoc with the plans of the Oregon state highway commission, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, declared Friday.

Baldock referred particularly to curtailment of the gasoline supply, for which there is a heavy demand at this time of the year. "A shortage of gasoline just prior to the fourth of July would cost the state a large amount of money in fuel taxes," Baldock said. He also declared that highway contractors would be unable to transport materials within their bids on various road and bridge construction projects.

"None of the contractors are provided with storage facilities sufficient to tide them over for any extended period," Baldock continued. "All of them are dependent upon gasoline for the operation of motor driven equipment, and virtually all asphalt required for paving jobs comes through the Portland port."

Baldock said that the highway department's maintenance operations also were menaced by the strike, and that nothing could be done without a sufficient gasoline supply. He declared that gasoline could be shipped in by rail, but that this would increase materially the costs of the maintenance work.

Figures compiled by Baldock showed that a cessation of operations by the highway commission would throw more than 5000 men out of employment.

Foreclosure Is Held Violation Of Agreements

Alleging that he had been told that a mortgage for \$10,200 "would not be foreclosed during the pendency of the depression," Fred Schirman and several others, filed their answer to a recently filed foreclosure suit, in circuit court yesterday. Schirman said he also understood that the mortgage holders would not foreclose since he had made numerous payments to the mortgagee.

He says in his answer that he acquired the place from Ernest C. and Lena A. Wiesner, giving them \$7800 in property and a \$20,000 mortgage to make up the balance. A refinancing deal to secure a federal loan for \$6200 was blocked by the plaintiff, the United States National corporation, after agreement had been made to make the loan, the defendant alleges.

Erickson Booked On Conclave of Higher Ed Group

Dean Frank M. Erickson of Willamette university is to head a departmental discussion on "Present Educational Trends" at a conference on higher education at Eugene July 11-14. The dean's portion of the program is Saturday morning, July 14. Dr. F. J. Kelly, chief of the division of higher education at Washington, D. C., will speak at that time.

Educators from all parts of the state are to attend the conference. Open forums at each afternoon session are to be a feature of the gathering the purpose of which is to be to "study the responsibilities of higher education in the light of the changing social, economic and political trends."

CURB UPON USE OF FORESTS ORDERED

Increasing fire hazards in various sections of the state Friday caused Governor Meier to issue proclamations regulating the use of forest lands.

Effective July 1, it will be necessary for all campers who intend to build fires at other than designated campgrounds, to obtain fire permits before entering any national forest in the state with the exception of the Siuslaw. Smoking will be prohibited except on surfaced highways. There also is a requirement that persons entering these forests shall carry tools suitable for fire fighting. These tools consist of a shovel, axe and saw.

Areas coming under the same regulation but located outside the national forests include all privately owned timber land adjacent to the Ochoco, Deschutes and Malheur national forests. In southern Oregon the same regulation applies to land lying north of Trail and Butte creeks, northeast of Medford, the area south of Korb, and that southwest of Ashland.

Mariam H. Dodge Services Sunday; Dies at Newberg

Mariam H. Dodge, mother of S. B. Dodge, died Thursday noon at her home in Newberg. Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Sunday from the Hollingsworth chapel in Newberg.
