FARM DEBT AID BILL IS SIGNED

Oregon Committee Expected to Handle; President Explains Program

They will not evade the payment of just debts.

He added that "contrary to the belief of many uninformed persons that this is not a general or wholesale moratorium privilege." After the farmer begins bankruptcy proceedings, the court is to appoint appraisers to arrive at the "fair value" of his land and chattels, if liens are held against them.

If that appraisal is satisfactory to the lien holders, the farmer may pay off the indebtedness over a six-year period.

All he would have to do the first year would be to pay one per cent interest on the appraised price. As explained by congressional advisers, the measure provides interest payments after the first year would continue at the one per cent rate while two and one-half per cent of the principal of the appraised price would be paid the second year and again in the third, five per cent of the principal in both the fourth and fifth years, and the balance of the appraised price within the sixth year.

At the end of the five year period, the court may take a new appraisal of the property and the farmer could still be relieved of his debts if the lien holders accept that valuation and it is paid. Otherwise, foreclosure may be resorted to.

Serve with mayonnaise to which an equal amount of whipped cream has been added, with a few marshmallows cut in small pieces and mixed in.

POOREST MONTH IN SHIPPING IS NOTED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—(AP)—Portland's poorest month in ship arrivals and departures and waterborne cargo handling since statisticians began keeping such records came to a close tonight.

The merchants' exchange reported that not a pound of freight left this port for foreign markets, for California, the Atlantic, or Hawaii.

The port's entire outbound cargo movement was confined to 187 short tons of miscellaneous foodstuffs and fishing gear, valued at \$55,454. It was loaded upon the cannery steamer North King, with permission of striking organizations, and dispatched to Alaska.

Inbound cargo was confined to 194,500 barrels of gasoline and 83,000 barrels of fuel oil, most of which was discharged under heavy police guard.

C. Dalgleish, were informed here.

REDMOND, Ore., June 30.—(AP)—Critical injuries were suffered by Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Shank of Hood River when their automobile plunged off a 12-foot bank seven miles east of Mitchell early today.

Their grandson, Earl Shank, was not seriously injured but was unable to give coherent answers to K. L. Raab of Seattle and O. M. Hill of Portland who discovered the accident.

The injured persons were brought here in the Redmond ambulance, treated and accompanied to Hood River by Dr. Raymond F. Jones.

DILLINGER CLAIMED BANK RAID LEADER

SOUTH BEND, Ind., June 30.—(AP)—A bandit quintet, with John Dillinger reported in command, stormed the Merchant's National bank today, scooped up \$28,439 and fled in a wild barrage of bullets, leaving a slain policeman and four wounded men in their wake.

The ruthless raiders engaged in gun battles with a detective, two officers and a jeweler as they emerged from the bank and made their way to the escape car a half block away. More than 50 shots raked the street in the heart of the city.

Officer Harold Warner encountered the three gangsters who carried out the actual robbery as they were hurrying from the bank. He was fatally wounded before he could reach his pistol.

Those wounded were P. G. Stahley, manager of the Birdsall Manufacturing company; Jake Solomon; and Detos N. Coen, a cashier. Their wounds were not regarded as serious.
