

VON PAPEN TO KEEP POSITION

But May Take "Vacation" in Near Future; Estimates of Dead Lowered

ery" which aroused the fury of Hitler.

Von Papen held a conference with the chancellor late tonight, being accompanied by his son and secret service operatives as he went to the chancellery.

It was stated no announcement would be made regarding the conference before tomorrow.

Meanwhile, another tragic chapter in last Saturday's story of bloody deed was written with the revelation in Munich that Fritz Beck, 46-year-old head of the foreign academic bureau, was killed. "Director Beck met with a terrible accident," said the bureau, and it was understood that he was killed by a hot-headed Nazi acting without authorization.

Manich heard many prominent persons, not yet officially listed as dead, fell. One was said to have been killed because he was mistaken for another person.

The press department, while still not giving out an official list, revised its former estimate of the number of executions downward.

Yesterday the number was given as "below fifty," and today as "below fifty." Unofficial estimates run into the hundreds.

Reports from both Silesia and Bavaria were rather disturbing. Dispatches from Warsaw told of Silesian refugees fleeing across the border by the hundreds. Some 2,000 already have entered Poland, these reports said.

ST. ANSGAR, Ia., July 4.—(AP)—Four men and a woman met a fiery death today when the plane in which they were taking a holiday spun dizzy to the earth and burst into flames.

The dead: Fred Symington, of Ackley, Ia., pilot; Ed and Daney Libersky of St. Ansgar; and Marvin Miller and Gladys Ucker of Grafton, Ia.

The plane was flying low over town when it fell to the ground and instantly burst into flames, giving rescuers no chance to extricate the bodies until they were burned almost beyond recognition.

Symington, about 35, had housed his plane at Waterloo for the last five months.

This northern Iowa town held its first Fourth of July celebration in 50 years and the victims were enroute to attend it.

Judge Overrules Judgment Given Against Premier

EDMONTON, Alta., July 4.—(AP)—The jury's verdict assessing \$15,000 against Premier J. E. Brownlee in Vivian MacMillan's suit charging that he seduced her was set aside today by Justice W. C. Ives, who presided at the trial of the case.

Justice Ives gave a judgment in the Alberta supreme court which dismissed the suit of the girl, a former government stenographer, and her father, Allan MacMillan. The action means that Miss MacMillan and her father will have no claim on the premier for the sums of \$10,000 and \$5000 awarded them, respectively, unless they can successfully prosecute an appeal.

Gentry Slaying Said Confessed; Reason Is Cited

JEFFERSON, Wis., July 5.—(AP)—(Thursday)—Sheriff Joseph T. Lange of Jefferson county this morning said he had captured George "Slim" King who had made a full confession of the slaying of Earl B. Gentry, former bodyguard to the leader of the Indiana klans.

King, the slayer, Lange said, told him his name was Carl B. Church.

"I'm glad I did it and I'd do it again," Lange quoted Church as saying in his confession. "Carl B. Gentry was a wonderful man and treated me elegantly. I knew Gentry was mistreating her and I killed him as a good deed for the community."

Coast Athlete Wins Decathlon

CINCINNATI, July 4.—(AP)—Undisturbed by blistering heat, Robert Clark, of the Olympic club, San Francisco, won the national A. U. decathlon here today, amassing 7966.050 points for the ten events, half of which were run off yesterday.

Joe Hall, Tallahassee, Fla., was second, with 7488.890 points, and R. Baldry, a club mate of Clark's from the Golden Gate city, third, with 7401.080.

Nearly 1000 people heard the address.

GOVERNOR TO CALL ON NATIONAL GUARD

Protection of State-Owned Railroad is Purpose of Move by Merriam

SAN FRANCISCO, July 4.—(AP)—An ultimatum to maintain strike leaders that the California national guard would be ordered to the San Francisco waterfront tomorrow unless the union heads receded from their determination to prevent operation of the state-owned belt line railroad at the piers was delivered by Acting Governor Frank R. Merriam late today.

The complicated situation, growing out of the coastwide strike of longshoremen and marine workers and the rioting yesterday incidental to the efforts of business interests to "open the port" to commerce, moved swiftly toward a climax in developments over the holiday.

Upon representations to Merriam that employees of the little state-operated waterfront railroad line had declined to continue work at the piers without additional "protection" against possible violence, Merriam first issued a warning that there must be no interference with the state's business.

Subsequently A. R. Pidgeon, superintendent of the railroad, reported that the strike committee of 50, representing all 10 unions involved, had "defied" the line to take its cars into or out of the piers.

Taking cognizance of the "defiance," Merriam immediately proclaimed his intention of sending national guardsmen, equipped with a potent new "vomiting gas," to the state-owned San Francisco waterfront tomorrow unless there was "some modification" of the strike's refusal to permit operation of the railroad.

FRANCE PERTURBED AT ALLIANCE STORY

PARIS, July 4.—(AP)—French officialdom was perturbed today over what was termed "unfounded" talk of an Anglo-French military alliance.

Authorities feared Great Britain, as a result of published rumors of an alliance, would be farther than ever from an "understanding" which Foreign Minister Louis Barthou will seek in London next week.

The Paris Herald printed purported revelations of a full-blooded Anglo-French military alliance being prepared by the British cabinet.

British aversion to a definite alliance is now considered such that the French fear little if anything will be gained by Barthou's visit.

Barthou, it was known, had hoped to get England's open promise to rush airplanes to France's defense in case of necessity. He now is expected merely to try to convince England of the danger of invasion from a re-arming Germany, and to make an effort to win the British to the preparedness idea, since France feels that Britain inevitably will be drawn into any continental war.

PROSPERITY TO BE SHARED, FORECAST

WASHINGTON, July 4.—(AP)—A pinch hitter subbing for Hugh S. Johnson told the nation's educators today that in the future business and industry would be compelled by law to share prosperity profits with the worker.

Former Governor William E. Sweet of Colorado, an official of the NRA, assailed what he called "mal-distribution of wealth and power" in an address before the National Education association.

He said the economic heritage which the present generation hands to its children must include an effort toward universal economic security.

"Many corporations, by a fair division of the profits, are today employing as many people as they ever did and at the same wages."

"In the future such policies will not be left to the good will of the employer but in time of prosperity companies will be compelled by law to share their profits with the worker."

INDIANS COVETING WHITE MAN'S BEER

Red Man is 'Legger's Sole Customer Now, Declares Northwest Leader

WAPATO, Wash., July 4.—(AP)—The Stein Song succeeds the war-whoop among northwest Indians, and today they are asking the great white father for beer.

Ever since this territory was a battleground, with red tomahawks against white sabers and long rifles, the federal government has forbidden sale of intoxicating liquor to Indians, but now tribesmen are sending petitions to federal officials, contending that if they could purchase beer and light wines, there would be less temptation for them to buy bootleg whiskey.

"Everybody was equal under the prohibition law," the Indians say; "red men and white broke the law. Now the Indians are discriminated against."

Nealy N. Olney, Indian justice of the peace, is a leader in this district for the government.

"The Indians feel it is unfair for other citizens to permit the federal and state Indian liquor laws to remain on the statute books. Thousands of Indians have adopted the white man's civilization, attended the same schools and colleges, and vote and hold office the same as other citizens."

"The Indians were made citizens during Wilson's administration and during prohibition all were alike and bought bootleg liquor, but since repeal the Indians are the sole customers. . . . The prohibition law did not stop whites or Indians from drinking. We do not know why the lawmakers believe the Indian liquor laws of many years ago are going to stop them when the prohibition law failed to do so."

WELFARE AGENCIES TO HOLD CONCLAVE

WASHINGTON, July 4.—(AP)—President Roosevelt has invited representatives of the 34 national welfare agencies to meet at the White House on September 28 to inaugurate their 1934 mobilization for human needs.

Newton D. Baker, chairman of the mobilization, announced today that he had conferred with the president just before his departure for America's territorial outposts and that the president had issued the invitation through him.

Mrs. Roosevelt will serve as chairman of the national women's

committee of the mobilization. Last year 355 cities in 40 states organized women's crusaders under Mrs. Roosevelt's direction and the indications now are that an even greater number will be organized this year.

CRACKER PUTS OUT EYE

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Cracker Upsets Dignity of Long as Solons Meet

BATON ROUGE, La., July 4.—(AP)—The Louisiana legislature convened uproariously today, with members tossing firecrackers under one another's feet—exploding one that even upset the dignity of Senator Huey P. Long.

Long had marched into the senate and had leaned over to talk with one of his supporters.

Suddenly a firecracker boomed just beneath his feet.

Long jumped a foot as spectators and senators shrieked with laughter.

The senator took it good naturedly, hurrying up the aisle, his arms waving in mock surrender.

THREE KILLED AS STANDS COLLAPSE

NEW YORK, July 4.—(AP)—Caught in the collapse of a grandstand at an Independence day athletic carnival, three inmates of city institutions on Welfare Island were killed late today and 56 others injured.

The stand, constructed of iron pipe and boards, was built by Welfare Island inmates and had not been completed.

More than 200 men occupying it to watch the afternoon's athletic events rose to their feet as the 60-yard dash was about to start.

The stand swayed dizzily for a moment and then crashed. The occupants were thrown into a heap, a struggling mass. Prison attendants, anticipating possible disturbances, immediately called for reinforcements.

There was no need of police assistance, however, Warden Schleth said, and there was no disturbance. The inmates spectators rushed to the aid of the injured who were quickly carried to the island's hospitals.
