TINY SLOOP LEADS IN ISLANDS RACE

SAN PEDRO, Cal., July 4.—(AP)—Led by the little 27-foot sloop Common Sense III, a dozen sailing yachts, racing to the Hawaiian Islands, 2200 miles distant, crept away from here at high noon today, urged on by a gentle 15-mile breeze out of the southwest, seeking to shatter the elapsed time record for the distance, 11 days, 14 hours, 46 minutes, which has stood since 1923.

The larger craft, including the scratch boat, Pandango, 84-foot schooner, had trouble getting underway at the starter's gun and were left well behind as the smaller, more easily maneuvered vessels forged ahead.

The Common Sense III, representing the Honolulu Ad club, crossed the line third, but immediately broke out its balloon jib, took full advantage of the gentle zephyr, and moved away toward Santa Catalina island.

Following it toward the horizon was the Monsoon, 45-foot schooner of the California Yacht club, Los Angeles, with the 48-foot cutter Viva, of San Diego, third. Flying the burgee of the Palo Alto Yacht club, the Altair, 48-foot yawl, was next in line with the 48-foot ketch, Burrage, of the Los Angeles Yacht club, fifth.

BLACK SHIRT HEAD KILLED AT MUNICH

MUNICH, Germany, July 4.—(AP)—A hot blooded American student, official authority, killed Fritz Beck, head of Germany's foreign academic bureau, during Saturday's "clean-up" of Chancellor Hitler's enemies. It was revealed today.

Beck, 46 years old, was a familiar figure to American students at Munich university, contacting them as head of the black shirt "foreign academic" organization. "Director Beck met with a terrible accident," it was stated today at the academy headquarters.

The general view is Beck had no connection with the anti-Hitler conspiracy headed by Ernest Roehm, commander of the storm troopers, who since the advent of the nazi regime has been a patron of the academic organization.

DALLAS, July 4.—(Special)—Virginia Graham, eight year old daughter of Floyd Graham of Falls City, was injured at Falls City shortly after noon today when struck by a car driven by S. S. Ruggles of Falls City. The little girl was rushed to Dallas where she was treated for cuts on the head and body, and was then taken to the Dallas hospital. Latest reports indicated that she was not injured seriously and was recovering rapidly.

"The Oregon Trail" is New Name of Spectacle of Past and Present

EUGENE, Ore., July 4.—With a new name, "The Oregon Trail" replacing the former designation of "Sunset Trail" and more elaborate, more impressive features for every event, Eugene's triennial epic of the west will be staged July 26, 27, and 28.

Not only Eugene, but all the surrounding territory has fallen completely into the spirit of the event, which in 1929 attracted national attention. For several weeks men have cultivated beards, and all women of the city are now going about in the hoop skirts and bustles of the 1850's.

The epic will again have three main features—the pageant itself, which this year will bring together replicas of early day scenes, and thousands of pioneer relics, and the Progress parade, which will draw entries from communities and business and industrial organizations from every part of the state.

The pageant, which will depict the development of the Oregon territory from pre-historic times to present, and predictions for the future, will be enacted on Hayward field on a huge stage that will cover the football field. Many thrilling episodes have been added for this year, and the attraction will undoubtedly be the most inspiring depiction of this type ever presented in the United States.

All of the principal officials and directors who made the 1929 event such a success are back this year, and with the event still nearly a month away, plans and preparations are practically complete. Hugh E. Rosson, graduate manager of the University of Oregon, is again manager. Mrs. Doris Smith, nationally known dramatic director, is directing the pageant for the third time; Cal M. Young, noted pioneer authority, is again in charge of the pioneer parade, and Jack Magladry, one of the best known business leaders of the state, heads the Progress parade.

The celebration, which will include many events, will be held July 26, 27, and 28.

Christian Church Plans Big Program to Observe 78th Year at Monmouth

MONMOUTH, July 4.—Members and friends of the First Christian church of Monmouth will gather here Sunday, July 8, to commemorate the 78th anniversary of its founding, and to dedicate 20 trees recently planted on the church grounds. Prominent residents of the northwest including many Portland folk, some of them descendants of the charter members and founders of the church will spend the day in Monmouth to participate in celebration of the event with old time friends and acquaintances.

Pioneers from Monmouth, Ill., came to the Willamette valley early in the '50s and by 1854 had chosen the ground now occupied by Monmouth, Ore. They came west with the dominant idea of founding an institution of learning, and here are the first minutes: "Pursuant to previous notice the brethren at Monmouth, Polk county, met to elect officers for the government and service of aforesaid church, to wit: three elders and three deacons, which resulted in the choice of Elijah B. Davidson, John E. Murphy, and William Murphy for elders; William Mason, Elmer Elliott, L. E. Erpelding, Lloyd Pugh.

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YOUNG COMMUNISTS TO WAR ON THIEVES

Exploitation Through Short Weight, High Prices, Inferior Goods Hit

MOSCOW, July 4.—(AP)—Young communists and the Russian press were drafted today into a war on thieves and speculators said to be exploiting the public through excessive prices, short weights and measures and inferior goods.

The communist party's inspection committee announced it has taken up the gage of battle to rid the country of small and large graft. Kulaks (land-owning peasants) are among those upon whom the lash may fall.

In a speech which Lazar Kaganovich, committee chairman, recently made he appealed to housewives generally and all party and non-party members to join in a drive against dishonesty in shops and industries and in collective and state farms and transport systems.

Although there has been a thorough cleaning of the communist party, Kaganovich said, many bad elements remain.

This, he said, was shown at Kiev, where five communists were shot for cooperating with speculators.

He also mentioned graft, discovered in the oil marketing trust, the fur trust and the glass industry. He said a merciless fight is necessary everywhere to checkmate thieves.

Vigilance on the part of the public was urged by Kaganovich as the best corrective of abuses.

"It is more important to prevent crime than to punish it," he said. "With a turnover of 60 billion rubles annually in the state and cooperative organizations, and a government budget of 47 billion rubles, the opportunities for dishonesty are great, and a vigilant public can aid materially in preventing abuses from being practiced by tens of thousands of persons who are accustomed to living luxuriously through exploiting the labor of others."

ARTS LEAGUE WILL HEAR BONNEY TALK

Although the Salem Arts league is inactive during the summer months, a special meeting and program has been arranged for Tuesday evening, July 10, in the auditorium of the Salem chamber of commerce, for the purpose of hearing a talk by Professor M. E. Bonney, former Willamette university student and former instructor at the Oregon State Normal school at Monmouth, on the subject of "Social Psychology." As it is proposed to form a section of the arts league dealing with this subject, Perry Prescott Reigelman, president of the league, has called the special session, which will be open to the general public.

Professor Bonney, since teaching at the normal school, has taken a Master of Arts degree at Stanford and is now completing his work for a Ph. D. degree from Columbia university. His thesis concerns social psychology, which is attracting a great deal of attention at the present time. He expects to leave Salem before the end of July for New York.

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Americans Win Most Events in Henley Regatta

HENLY-ON-THAMES, Eng., July 4.—(AP)—The disappointment of Americans over the heart breaking defeat of the Kent, Conn., schoolboy eight in the fastest and closest of the opening day's 36 races of the historic Henley regatta today was somewhat appeased by decisive victories of five other United States entries.

Yan's lightweight eight and its four, Tabor academy's eight-oared shell and America's two sculling entries, Winthrop Rutherford and Henry Bugbee all won by wide margins to keep the stars and stripes flying on independence day.

(The agreement does not affect in any way the holders of Dawes and Young loan bonds in the United States, to whom the moratorium still applies.)

DISTRICT MAY HIRE MEN FOR BUILDINGS

School Board Determined to Have Additions Ready for Year Opening

Work is proceeding very slowly on the additions to Englewood and Highland grade schools here but the school board will resort to hiring its own laborers if necessary to insure their being completed by the opening of school in mid-September. Director Frank E. Neer, chairman of the building and grounds committee, declared yesterday.

The walls and roof have been finished at the Highland addition but the skill-requiring task of laying the metal imitation tile on the Englewood unit roof is barely begun. No inside finish work has been done at either site other than laying the first floors.

At present only eight men, all carpenters, are being supplied for these projects by the S.E.R.A. Neer said it was estimated that even if a larger crew were placed on these projects, they would require two months for completion.

As soon as Lyle P. Bartholomew, architect who designed the additions, returns to Salem from a trip to Chicago and Detroit, Neer and Superintendent Gaiser will make a survey of the work that remains to be done and then decide whether or not the school district will have to dig down in its own pocket to finish the buildings. If this proves advisable, the board probably will call for bids on the work.

ANGLO-GERMAN WAR OF TRADE DEFERRED

LONDON, July 4.—(AP)—Great Britain and Germany avoided a trade war for at least six months today by signing an agreement providing for the payment of interest on Dawes and Young loan bonds held by British subjects.

The agreement extends six months from July 1, the day the German moratorium on all foreign obligations became effective. Other long and medium term obligations held in Great Britain, which are mostly commercial, will not be serviced during the moratorium, under the terms of the agreement.
