Holder Experimenting on Summer Grown Vegetables With Creek Bed For Plot

LIBERTY, July 5. — Clarence Holder has a unique summer garden. In a dry creek bed he has built long tables of the type used in greenhouses, filled to a foot or more with sand, and in the sand he will raise vegetables one does not raise hereabouts in the summer time.

He has one table set out with head lettuce and on another are now sprouted radishes, beets, late cabbage and a Russian type turnip, all in neat rows. The turnips, says Mr. Holder, is one raised extensively in Alaska but is not well known here. He will also raise onion sets for fall planting and carrots.

The tables are at an advantage-

ous spot to receive the morning sun and bushes growing around the creek bed offer shelter from the heat of the afternoon.

Water is run by gravity flow through a pipe from a spring a short distance up in the creek bed to barrels placed by the tables. From the barrels water is dipped for the watering of the "garden." The soil can be kept continually moist and is very warm, as the tables seem to hold the warmth given by the sun. The overflow from the barrels makes a very cool, inviting looking pool.

Mr. Holder plans to raise the root vegetables to maturity without transplanting from the tables. He considers this vegetable garden an interesting experiment.

138 NEW VOLUMES ADDED TO SHELVES

SILVERTON, July 5. — A six-month report has been completed at the Silvertown public library this week showing that during the first six months of the year, 138 new books were added to the shelves. There were also 23 books rebound and 175 books mended.

Besides the 138 books bought, 41 books were donated. Seven volumes of the National Geographic Magazine have also been bound and placed on the shelves of the reading room.

During that period of time, 25 readers' cards have been drawn, but 108 new readers have signed up making a total of 1375 men, women and children who have used the library at one time or another during the past six months. During that time, \$854 books and 497 magazines were passed across the circulation desk. Fifty-nine books were removed from circulation.
