Woman's Condition 'Fair'—Condition of Mrs. W. E. Bailey, route eight, who suffered severe head and leg lacerations as the result of an automobile collision here Wednesday night, was reported at Salem Deaconess hospital last night as "fair." Dorsey D. Reeves, 1964 Hazel avenue, whom police arrested following the accident on a charge of drunken driving, was released from jail yesterday on \$500 bail. E. J. Simpson, 856 North 17th street, companion of Reeves and arrested for being drunk, pleaded guilty in municipal court yesterday and paid a \$5 fine.

Huckleberries Scarce—Due to lack of late spring snows, it is believed, the huckleberry crop in the Cascade mountains will be very light this year, persons who have scouted some of the larger patches report. Their theory is that the bushes of the blue huckleberries, which normally are protected by snow from late frosts, were not thus sheltered this season. The red variety crop is expected to be normal.

Jefferson Park Dry—The wild flowers that usually abound in Jefferson park, on the northwest slope of Mt. Jefferson, are drying up and the area is devoid of snow, a party which entered the park just before July 4 reported yesterday. Except on the upper slopes, Mt. Jefferson also is barren of snow; rock slides rumble down its slopes throughout the day. The hikers found mosquitoes too numerous for comfort.

Disease Cases Fewer—Seven fewer new cases of communicable disease were reported in Marion county last week, according to the state department of health bulletin. Of the ten reported, five were whooping cough, three tuberculosis and one each pneumonia and chickenpox. In Polk county there were six of whooping cough, two of scarlet fever and one of measles.

Hire Peach Pickers—The national re-employment agency, 510 Court street, yesterday filled its first order of the season for peach pickers. Two men were taken from there by an unidentified peach grower.

Hold Picnic 4th—The Seventh Day Adventist church, 5th and Gaines, held a picnic at Hazel Green park the Fourth. Pastor Thompson gave a patriotic address and appropriate musical numbers, including piano and violin selections, rounded out the program. A number of other churches were represented and a truckload of boys and girls from Chemawa also enjoyed the event. A table 60 or more feet long was set for the group feast, with two meals being served.

Livesley & Co. hop ranch, the latter firm declares in its answer to plaintiff's damage suit, the answer being filed yesterday in circuit court here. The company was sued recently for a large sum by Miss MacDonald. The defendant claims she did not start to walk down the steps of the Livesley recreation hall.

SIAMESE TWIN NOT PERMITTED TO WED

NEW YORK, July 5.—(P)—Flatly refused permission to marry in two states because she is a Siamese twin, red-haired Violet Hilton and her twin sister, Lorraine, Maurice L. Lambert, decided tonight to wage a legal battle for the license.

In both New York and New Jersey officials were unyielding to pleas of Violet, accompanied, of course, by Daisy, the left half of the famous twins, and Lambert. They based their refusals on moral grounds.

The trio appeared first at the municipal license bureau in Manhattan, where a stammering clerk delayed them while he sought a legal refuge in the corporation counsel's office.

After a lengthy study of legal tomes was made, it was decided no license would be issued.

The twins and Lambert journeyed to Newark, N. J., and there the refused clerk was based on the same moral grounds that caused a hitch in the proceedings across the Hudson.

"We'll go to Elkton, Md.," said Violet.

But instead, the trio turned back to New York, and their attorney said he would start mandamus proceedings against city officials tomorrow in supreme court.

"The very idea is quite immoral and indecent," said Acting Corporation Counsel William C. Chandler, "in the law against it, but it just seems indecent to me."

BEEMONT, O., July 5. — (P) — Two lads, their trail bodies grotesquely twisted from a strange paralysis, lived today in memories, and in anticipation of the future.

The memories were supplied by a cross section of the country that paused long enough in its workaday tasks to scatter a little cheer in the two blighted lives.

Giant rockets, pin wheels, Roman candles and sparklers were still visible to the boys, Glenn and John Deltrich, the eighth and ninth victims of the strange disease in their family strain.

Today the lads, 16 and 17, still tingling with excitement, asked reporters to thank their friends from all sections of the country who remembered them yesterday with dozens of letters and postcards and fireworks aplenty.

Never before had the youths experienced such an exciting Fourth of July.

"People are pretty good to us," said Glenn, the younger. "It's pretty hard to sit here all the time but my relatives did and I suppose I have to for some reason or other. I couldn't set off the fireworks, but my dad did. I had a nice Fourth."

Boys will be boys and as such must occasionally be chastised was fully proved here on the Fourth of July when Arthur Dahl, Silverton's chief of police, arrested E. A. Sewell, "Happy" Sewell, when the latter was caught in the act of shooting firecrackers in the Kel-

ley billiard hall. Sewell will appear before George Hubbs Friday morning at 9 o'clock for a hearing. Ordinances forbid the shooting of firecrackers within the city limits of Silverton.
