There were 532 accidents reported to the commission.

Coquille Hearing Set—Hearing of the application of the Natural Gas Corporation, Inc., to sell its Coquille plant to the Coquille Gas and Power company, will be held in Salem July 17, Charles M. Thomas, state utility commissioner, announced Friday. The city of Coquille has approved the proposed sale.

New Pastor Here—Rev. and Mrs. John H. McDonald and family have moved to Salem and he will preach his first sermon as pastor of the Leslie Memorial Methodist church Sunday. Rev. McDonald comes here from St. John's Pioneer church in the Portland section, and succeeds Rev. S. Darlow Johnson who went to St. John's.

Stock Decreased—The Capitol Dairies of this city has filed with the state corporation commission a certificate showing a decrease in its capital stock from \$90,000 to \$40,000. Under a certificate issued by the commission, the Fairmount Dairy and the Capitol Dairies have both been reinstated under the corporation department.

SCHOOL LEADERS TO GATHER HERE

County school superintendents will gather here July 12, 13 and 14 for a conference on school problems, held each summer under the auspices of C. A. Howard, superintendent of public instruction, and the county school superintendent's association.

Officers of the county school superintendents' association are T. Frank Brumbaugh, Wasco county president; A. M. Cannon, Lincoln county vice-president, and Katherine McRae, Clackamas county secretary-treasurer.

Committees of county superintendents were appointed earlier in the year to study problems dealing with improved supervision of schools, permanent pupil record cards, school legislation, apportionment of school funds, federal emergency education program, and objectives for rural school improvement during the school year 1934-35. One More \$150,000 Outlay To Bring North Santiam Grading Job to Its End

The 1934 federal tidbit of \$150,000 to be spent on the North Santiam highway is about one-half enough to finish the grading on that important route, in the opinion of James Smith, Marion county commissioner. Smith opined yesterday that by the time the forest roads department had dropped another \$150,000 into the Santiam road work, the 11-mile stretch of ungraded road in the Big Meadow area would be completed.

Such completion would mean that Salem traffic, going through Stayton—Mill City—Deroit could swing on over Whitewater creek, travel south over the new grade to the junction with the South Santiam, then on over the Cascades, through Sisters and down to Bend.

However, the completion of the grading of the North Santiam by no means implies that the road is completed. First, the stretch from Whitewater creek south must be graded.

Then the entire Mill City-Brettonbush stretch must be made over. Theodore Arenz with his contract for widening and grading the Mill City to Gates stretch is doing the initial part of this work. However, from Gates and Niagara to Detroit the narrow, crooked road now used must be either abandoned or greatly widened before the North Santiam route over the mountains is truly completed.

Divorce Sought by Mrs. Becken in Dallas Court
DALLAS, July 5.—Virginia A. Becken filed a divorce complaint here today against William H. Becken in which she charges cruel and inhuman treatment. The couple were married at Independence on October 30, 1929, and have no children. There are property rights involved in the suit. The plaintiff seeks a judgment granting the divorce and restoring her maiden name of Virginia A. Stapleton.

The Traveler's Insurance company filed a complaint against August William Fischer, et al, in which they seek to collect a total of \$10,581.08 plus interest, and \$40 attorney fees. The plaintiff also seeks to have its mortgage declared a prior lien, and to have the mortgage foreclosed and the property sold to satisfy their claim.

New Jobs Here Exceed Numbers in Other Areas

The mid-valley reemployment office district consisting of five counties of which Marion is the largest, placed more men in private industry and in public work during the last week than any area in the state, according to figures released yesterday. Private industry took 182 workers from the reemployment offices in Linn, Lincoln, Polk, Benton and Marion counties. From the same territory 102 men went out on public jobs. The Eugene district came next with 160 placements on private work and 56 on public jobs.

More Money for Inheritance Tax Sought by State

The State of Oregon yesterday petitioned the probate court here to add \$850 to the inheritance tax to be paid by the estate of the late Peter D'Arcy of this city and also to strike off the proposed five per cent discount since the inheritance tax allegedly was not paid within the eight months period when the discount is allowed.

The total net tax claimed by the state is \$16,558 on a taxable estate appraised at \$114,497. Judge D'Arcy died here last October.

City Warrants are Called and Bonds Retired

The turnover of \$100,491.67 in city funds has been practically completed by City Treasurer C. O. Rice. This includes the calling of city general fund warrants and retirement of bonds.

General fund warrants have been called in the amount of \$35,659.95. Bancroft Improvement bonds have been paid in the sum of \$25,500, municipal bonds \$20,500, Bancroft bond coupons \$1,001, and municipal bond coupons, \$2,120.

The payments made are part of a transaction calling for the payment of Bancroft bonds July 15.

Douglas County Pays—Douglas county yesterday sent to the state treasurer a check for \$23,117.93, covering its third quarter state taxes for the year 1934.

SWIMMING CLASSES SLATED AT STAYTON

Red Cross Will Give Free Instruction to All Beginning 9th

Schedule for the Red Cross swimming campaign classes to open in Stayton, at the Masonic park, Monday under auspices of Willamette chapter of the Red Cross, was announced yesterday. Eleven Moore and Helene Price will be instructors for the week's campaign, open to everyone in the Stayton area. Adults especially are urged to avail themselves of either beginners' or swimmers' classes.

All instruction is free. Children must have consent of their parents, and will who participate must bring towel and bathing suit. Registration will be Monday preceding the various classes.

The schedule, including junior and senior life saving classes, follows:

- 9 to 9:30—Swimmers over 11 years old.
- 9:30 to 10—Swimmers under 11 years old.
- 10 to 10:30—Adult beginners.
- 10:30 to 11—Adult swimmers.
- 11 to 11:30—Beginners under 11 years old.
- 11:30 to 12—Beginners over 11 years old.
- 12 to 2—Junior life saving class.
- 2 to 4—Senior life saving class.

To qualify for junior life saving class, one must be able to swim 220 yards; for senior life saving, the qualification is 440 yards.

STAYTON, July 6.—The Red Cross is sending two swimming instructors to Stayton next week, to hold classes for all ages. If necessary, there will be evening classes for adults.

Registration will take place at the Masonic park Monday morning at 9 o'clock. The only thing people have to furnish is their own bathing suit and towel.
