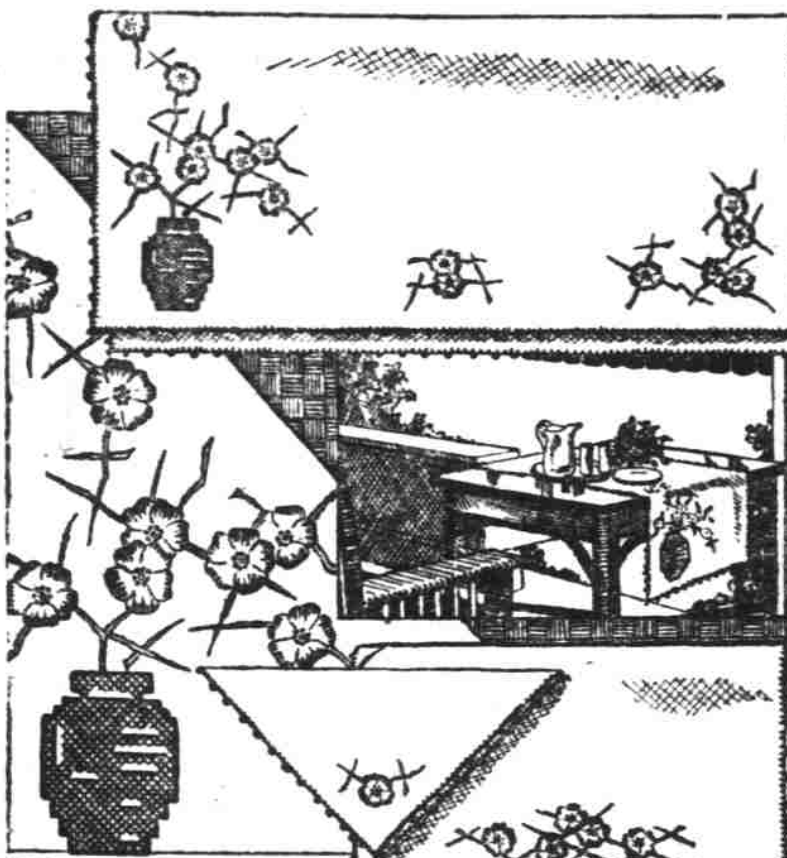

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Canned Corn, Hot Breads Included in Recipe Topic

Does your corn bread remind dinner guests of southern hospitality? We have many pickle recipes from this week's contest and will continue to print them until next Friday.

Cantaloupe Pickles
6 cups cantaloupe cubes
1/2 cup salt
6 cups water

Cut off rind and remove seeds and soft pulp. Cut rinds into pieces or small triangles. Sprinkle with salt and add water. Soak over night. In the morning drain and cover with water. Boil 4 minutes, drain and rinse in cold water.

Make the following syrup mixture:

6 cups sugar
4 cups vinegar
1/2 cup cinnamon bark
1/2 cup whole cloves
Loosely tie the spices in a cheese cloth, place in the sugar

and vinegar and boil five minutes. Add cantaloupe pieces and boil until they are well glazed and very tender. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

1 lb. seeded walnuts
1 lb. seeded raisins

Pulp the grapes and heat the pulp. Rub through a colander. Chop the skins, raisins, and nuts, mix with grapes and sugar. Boil 15 to 20 minutes. You may boil less time if Certo is used. If the latter method is used, add nuts just before filling glasses.
