

CREW REFUSES TO MOVE TRAIN

Freight Movement Blocked
Again; General Strike
Vote Set Monday

Committee comprised of representatives of each of 80 local unions will meet Monday to plan a course in case a general strike is called. Have voted to strike if their leaders deem it advisable.

Since other unions have contributed to strikers' sustenance, they have individual interest in the strike's outcome, members declared.

I. A. Snider, state legislative chairman for the locomotive firemen, scouted a report that members of the railroad brotherhoods were angered by the throwing of rocks at the train by strikers.

"There is no hard feeling between the train crews and longshoremen," he said. "I believe the train crew, in fact, did not feel that the rocks were meant to be thrown directly at them. The rocks were thrown probably more as a gesture of protest."

Under police protection and strategy—20 more non-striking workers were deposited on terminal 4 tonight. A group of police cars raced to an up-stream terminal, ostensibly to transfer workers to a new location.

Picket cars fell for the decoy and pursued, while a larger group of officers spirited the workers to a down-stream terminal where they were transferred to a river boat which conducted them to their destination.

PRUNE INDUSTRY TO HAVE CODE, AGREED

the growers and the federal or state directors. The board also is authorized to fix a minimum price for which the growers shall sell their prunes, and may establish the percentages of a crop that a grower may sell. The price fixing provision also extends to the price which buyers may pay for prunes.

In the case of cooperatives the board is authorized to fix a price for which prunes cannot be sold.

When percentages of the crop to be sold are fixed such percentages shall favor the small grower. Penalties are provided for violation of the proposed agreement.

In each of the separate districts there shall be a local committee of three members, who shall serve as an agency for the central or state board. These committees shall exercise only those powers delegated to them by the central board.

Funds to defray the costs of administration shall be derived from levies upon prunes sold.

Growers and processors would be prohibited from:

Engaging in false or misleading advertising or making misleading statements regarding prices, policies, services, or financial status of himself to any other grower.

Making discounts, rebates or refunds on prunes sold.

Sell to any buyer on consignment any prunes unless guaranteed the minimum fixed price by the buyer.

The code and all of its provisions are made applicable to now existing contracts for the sale or purchase of prunes.

Sailors Allowed Ashore; Promise They'll Be Good

NICE, France, July 7.—(P)—United States sailors and marines strolled along the Riviera tonight under a pledge to "be good" and not repeat the outbreaks of last night in which 28 persons were injured.

To make certain that the promise was not broken a double shore patrol was on duty from the two American battleships, the Arkansas and Wyoming, which lie in Ville Franche harbor.

The shore leave for small groups was a reversal of the first policy following the fight.

After the sailors injured and arrested in last night's fight were turned over to naval authorities, all shore leave was cancelled.

Skerzies Death Inquest Delayed

DALLAS, July 7.—An inquest into the death of Wilbur Skerzies, 13-year-old lad who was fatally injured Friday afternoon when struck by an automobile driven by Fred Hammack of route 8, Salem, was opened here tonight by C. W. Hinkle, coroner, only to be adjourned until 10 o'clock Monday morning.

At the time of the accident the boy was playing on a scooter in the road. Hammack, coming over the hill, saw him and swerved. Onlookers said the boy also dodged, but into the path of the swerving car.

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800 CCC RECRUITS BEING SIGNED UP

Period in Camp is Limited;
No Instructions Had by
Relief Agency Here

Enrollment for the third period of CCC camps started July 1 and will be completed July 10, Lynn Cronmiller, state forester, announced Saturday.

In this new enrollment there will be 800 men between the ages of 18 and 25 years, exclusive of experienced woodsmen who are to be selected by the forestry agencies.

Under a recent order of the president the length of time an individual can stay in the camp is limited and hence this new enrollment is to take the place of men who must be discharged. Some exceptions are made and a few old men are allowed to remain. These are the individuals who have been especially trained in the conduct of the affairs of the camp. They may be assistants in the cook house, clerks, warehouse men, or work of a similar nature that requires considerable training.

In the four state camps the quota of local woodsmen that is to be enrolled totals 76 men. In addition to this there are 56 men whose period of enrollment has expired but will be re-enrolled because of their experience in aiding in both the camp and the field work.

While in the past CCC crews have been recruited through the county relief agencies, no instructions to sign up young men for this latest quota have been received here, according to Administrator Glenn C. Niles. Qualifications in the past have been that the recruits must be eligible for relief.

Only the 76 experienced woodsmen will be recruited through the state forester's office, Cronmiller stated last night.

authority, according to Schoettler. "The cut in prices will be most severe on low grade lumber items and it is these that are used in greatest volume in house construction," Schoettler explained. "The farmer also will benefit greatly by the new schedule of prices."

Not all material items were reduced in price by ten per cent but some were cut as much as 20 per cent, Schoettler stated. A new system of computing delivery costs will be more favorable to the small purchaser than was the old.

The next step in the housing program, conduct of a housing needs survey here to determine the amount of new home construction and of alterations and modernizations needed, will be considered at a meeting of the chamber of commerce board of directors Monday night, Salem chapter, Oregon Building congress, initiated the movement here late last month.

Sweet Pickled Peaches

Select medium size peaches. Remove the skin by pouring boiling water over them a few at a time. Weigh them. To each pound of fruit allow half a pound of sugar and half a pint of vinegar. Make a syrup of the sugar and vinegar and while this is clarifying, put into each peach four whole cloves. When the syrup is ready place peaches in it, a few at a time and cook them. Put them into jars and pour hot liquid over them. In a few days scald the syrup again and pour over. If there is not enough syrup to cover them make a little more. Any fruit can be pickled this way.

Commercial Sweet Pickles

Wash 75 cucumbers three or four inches long, cut into pieces 1/2 inches thick. Makes about 2 gallons. Place in a stone jar, pour two cups of salt and one gallon of boiling water over them. Let stand one week. (Skim every day if necessary). On the 8th day, drain well and pour over them one gallon fresh boiling water, one tablespoon powdered alum. Let stand 24 hours. On the 9th

The Pacific Northwest Veterinary Medical association will open its annual convention here tomorrow with delegates in attendance from all sections of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia.

The opening address will be given by Dr. W. Ferguson of Tillamook, followed by technical discussions and business meeting. Monday night's program will be featured by motion pictures at the Oregon State hospital.

Speakers at Tuesday's sessions will include Dr. Robert Jay, Corvallis; Dr. A. R. Galbraith, Centralia, Wash.; Dr. R. G. Cuthbert, Vancouver, B. C.; Dr. B. T. Simms, Corvallis; Dr. E. A. Ehmer, Seattle, and Dr. E. E. Wegner, Fullman. "The race horse industry and the veterinarian," will be discussed by Dr. Galbraith. The annual banquet and dance will be held Tuesday night.

Dr. Alfred Hendrickson of Washington will preside at Wednesday's sessions. Speakers at the closing sessions will include Dr. A. E. Bruce, Saanichton, British Columbia; Dr. J. N. Shaw, Corvallis, and Dr. H. J. Keown, Victoria, B. C.

mittee. This sum, added to the \$34,000 already turned over brings the total income for the relief committee to \$151,000 from the operations of liquor store and licensing operations by the state.

The liquor commission would like to repay the general treasury the \$107,000 it has already drawn out of its \$400,000 appropriation. It believes it could finance its entire investment in equipment and stocks out of profits. At the present time it is stopped from this repayment by legal rulings which hold the repayment is not possible until \$3,000,000 has been paid to the state relief committee. On the \$107,000 advance the commission must pay five per cent interest.

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
