

GEORGE PAULUS ON PEAR CONTROL LIST

Code Tentatively Approved by Wallace; to Limit Size of Fruit Pack

George B. Paulus of this city would be one of the members of a control committee for the pear canning industry if a code tentatively approved by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace becomes binding on the industry. The code is designed to limit the canning of pears and to improve prices.

The agreement, which will be sent immediately to the industry for signature, would provide a control committee to supervise the receipt of pears by canners. Canners could not receive or can any lot of pears in which grade number 2 fruit exceeded 10 per cent, by weight, the number 1 pears contained in the lot, or in which culls exceeded 7 1/2 per cent of the total of number 1 and number 2 pears.

4-H CLUBBERS JUDGE LIVESTOCK

MONMOUTH, July 7.—The first county-wide 4-H livestock judging practice was held in the Monmouth district Saturday morning with 34 livestock club members present. Hampshire pigs and Jersey cattle were the classes that were judged under the dual direction of L. J. Allen of the state college extension service and County Agent J. B. Beck.

The first stop was at the James Gentle farm just north of Monmouth where two classes of Hampshire pigs were gone over. The second stop was at the M. N. Tibbles place just east of Monmouth. Two fine classes of registered Jersey cattle were brought out for the young folks to practice on.

The meeting Saturday is the first in a series of three or four meetings that are held for all the livestock club members of the county each year. In coming meetings more hogs and cattle will be judged and one future meeting will be devoted to sheep. These meetings are held to prepare the young folks for the contests at the close of their club year at the different fairs.

WHAT IS HOME WITHOUT A GARDEN?

GARDENERS are continuously complaining of weak-necked roses this year and of an over-supply of mildew. Even roses which have had strong stems and no mildew in former years are given to these ailments now, these gardeners report.

Perhaps the roses have been given an over-abundance of nitrogenous foods. Nitrogen, in too heavy helpings, tends to produce both weak-necks (because of too rapid growth) and mildew. Superphosphate and potash will tend to strengthen the stems. Of course, neither of these is a complete fertilizer and should be given in addition to whatever other fertilizer is used. Manures and ammonium sulphates are both heavy in nitrogen.

Spraying with a solution which contains sulphur or using a dusting powder which is largely composed of sulphur will check the mildew.

Do not let your azaleas dry out during the summer months. Give them a really good soaking at least once a week. This is much better than to be continuously sprinkling them. It is also well to give each azalea a heavy greasing of peat moss to keep the ground cool around the roots. Peat is a very good medium by which to retain moisture and it is also fine to keep the soil acid, a decided requirement of azaleas. Rhodoln Cooley, through years of experimenting with iris culture, has gained a wide reputation for his expert knowledge of how the iris should be treated to do its best. I visited the Cooley gardens during the blooming season and found that Mr. Cooley and his father, C. J. Cooley undoubtedly practice what they preach.

Cooley on Irises
Mr. Cooley is now reminding growers that it is iris planting time. There are certain things that Mr. Cooley also suggests to help toward the success of the plantings:

The bearded irises are essentially sunlovers. Good drainage is absolutely necessary. A sunny location, good drainage, and the success of the iris is almost assured. They are not particular as to soil. However, an acid soil is not exactly to their liking. Top dressings of bonemeal, manures or patent fertilizers are best kept out of the iris beds. Ground limestone, dug into the bed before the irises are set out, supplies all that is needed until they are replanted.

How often irises should be transplanted depends entirely upon the plants themselves. Some are rampant growers and should be transplanted every other year. Some do not need it for several years. A liberal use of superphosphate of lime dug into the soil will do much to ward off rhizome rot.

Irises rhizomes may be left in the open sun while they are being transplanted. They seemingly are not at all injured from a "baking".

Don't Plant Deep
Irises should not be planted deep. The rhizomes should be
