

BENEDICTINES RECALL MOVE

Permanent Mt. Angel Home
Established 50 Years
Ago This Week

MT. ANGEL, July 9.—Two events in local Benedictine history stand out this week, as the 50-year mark is reached in each. Saturday, July 14, will mark the 50th year of establishment of the permanent home of the Benedictines here. And three days earlier, July 11, will mark the golden anniversary of Benedictine vows for Rev. Father Placidus.

The Benedictines came to Mt. Angel July 14, 1884, from their temporary home in Gervais, where they had settled upon coming to Oregon October 30, 1882. The Cornerstone for the monastery at the foot of the hill on the old Palmer place was laid May 11, 1884, by Very Rev. Prior Adelhelm, and this building housed the family for eight years. This first building was a two-story frame structure, 76 by 38 feet, with basement. Some of the foundation stones still stand. The church adjoining the monastery formed a letter T and was built from lumber from their own sawmill on the Baron place.

The day the Benedictines came from Gervais to the monastery, the divine office also was inaugurated by singing vespers and the next day the first conventual high mass was chanted.

Serves for 50 Years
Father Placidus pronounced the first Benedictine vows at Gervais on the feast of St. Benedict, three days before the group removed from Gervais to Mt. Angel. Father Placidus was pastor here from 1900 to 1910, and probably baptized half the present generation. Among his many services to the town was reorganization of the Mt. Angel band on a large scale and direction of open air concerts. Father Placidus' handicraft gives daily joy to the people hereabouts, for it was he who designed and built the roof of the present parish church.

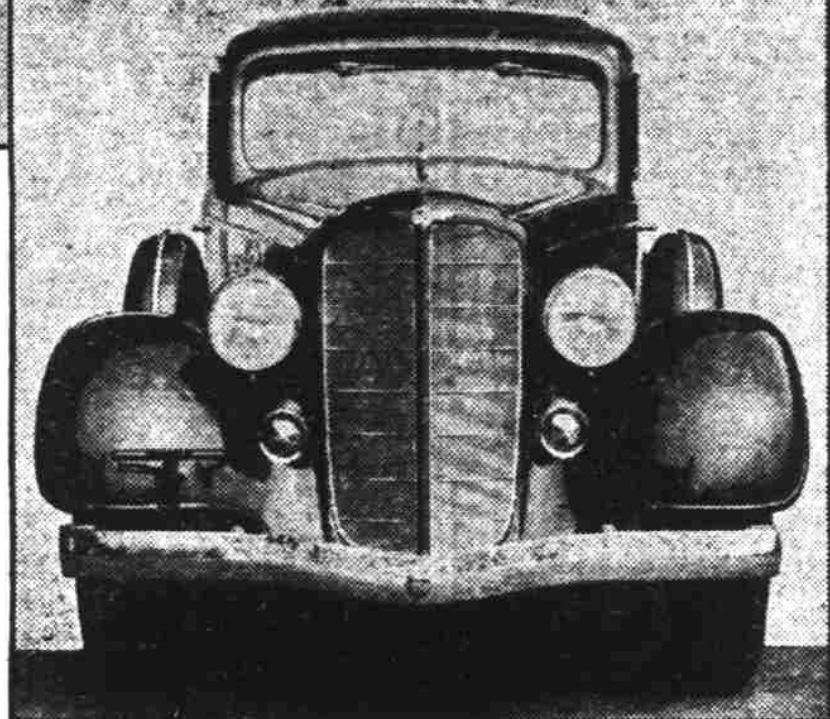

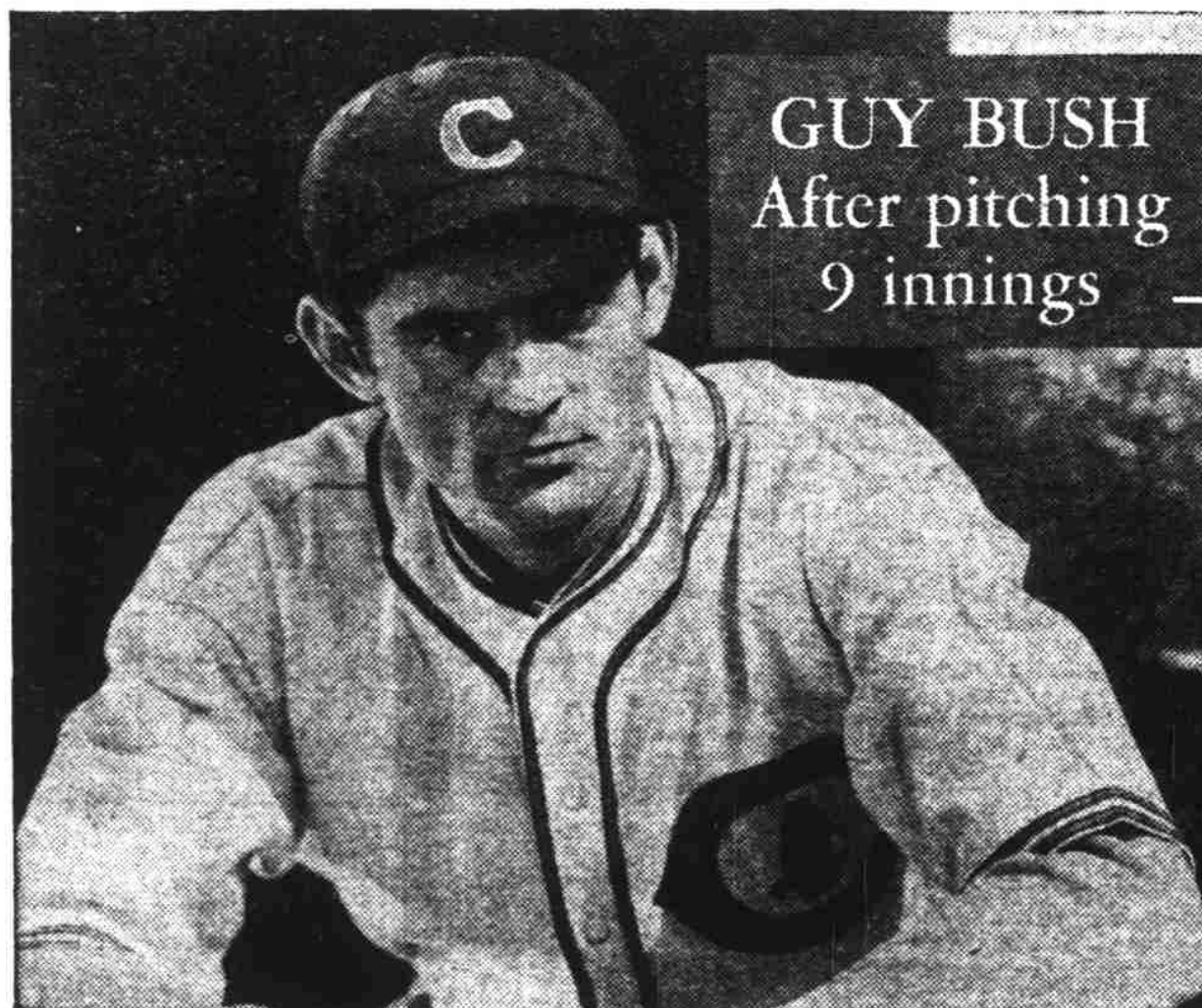

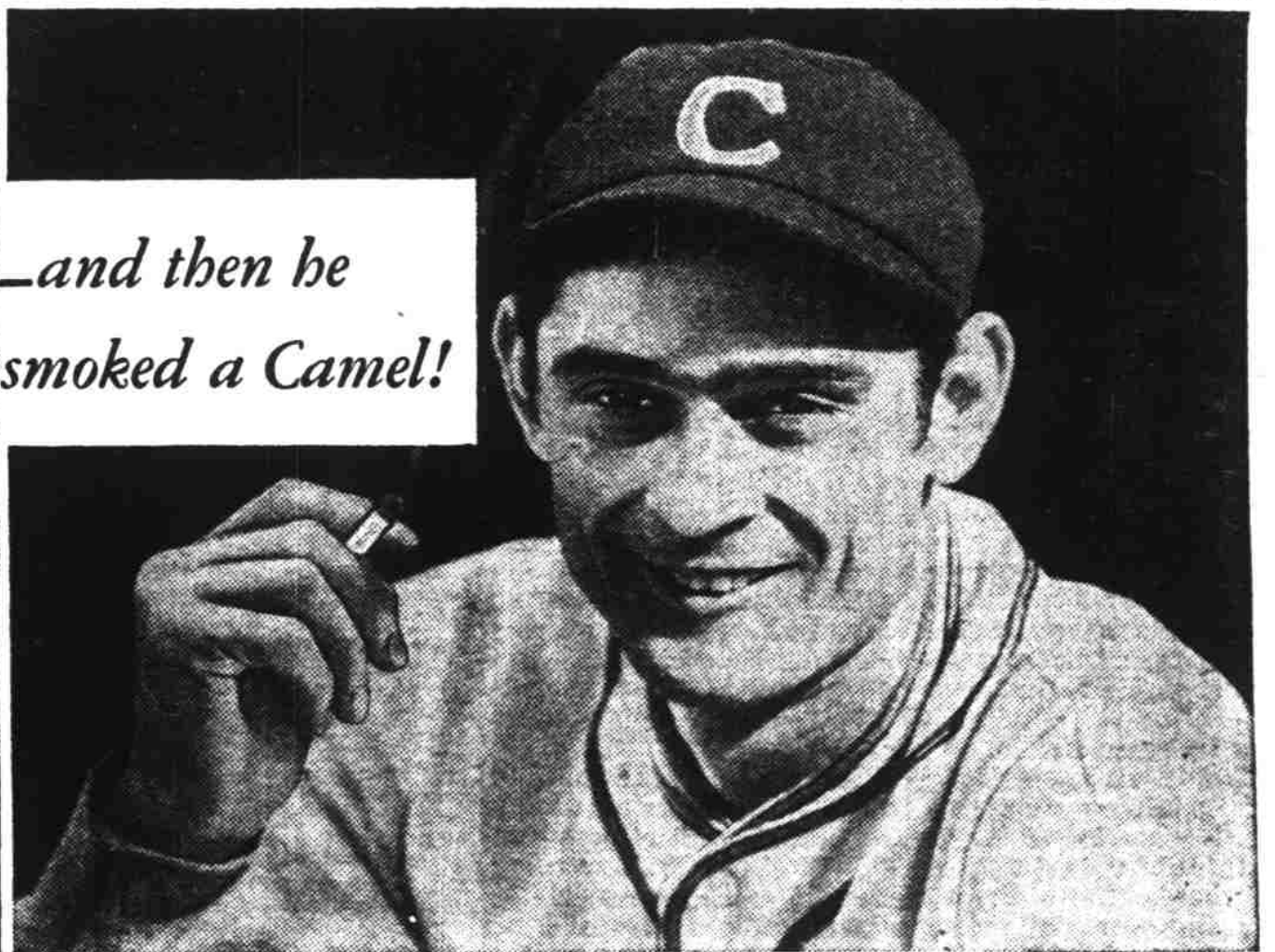
