DAVIDITES GET 3 RUNS, FIRST

Solo Hurler Bit Weaker Than Second Hirsute Nine Here in Week

Bearded men will be anathema to the Salem Senators after taking a 7 to 2 beating from the second alfalfa adorned House of David team to appear here with in a week yesterday. MUTUAL BETTING IS UPHELD IN OPINION
Mutual wagers, as sanctioned by the Oregon state racing commission, is not a violation of any provision of the Oregon constitution prohibiting lotteries and the sale of lottery tickets, Attorney General Van Winkle held in an opinion handed down Thursday.

The opinion was requested by Lotus L. Langley, district attorney of Multnomah county. In an opinion, Van Winkle held that the state board of dental examiners has no authority to decide in advance and specify the maximum dimensions of signs used by dentists in a given location.

This is a question of fact to be decided by the board as the occasion arises," Van Winkle held. "If the kind of advertising used by a given dentist affords an unscrupulous practitioner a means of perpetrating fraud and deception, then the remedy of the board is to proceed to suspend or revoke his license as provided by statute."
