

STEEL JOB SOUGHT FOR OREGON FIRM

Highway Commission Hears Arguments Over New Route to Coast

PORTLAND, Ore., July 12.—(AP)—A move to obtain for an Oregon firm a steel fabrication job already awarded to a Virginia firm was made today at a meeting of the state highway commission.

The perennial battle between proponents of the Wilson river and Wolf creek short cut routes to the sea was carried on by a Clatsop county delegation over the charred remains of a once majestic forest. The delegation charged the Wilson river route would be a bonus to a large lumber company.

The Virginia Bridge & Iron Works company was awarded the contract for supplying steel for the Yaquina bay bridge, one of Oregon's five coast highway bridges to be constructed with public works administration funds.

Governor Julius L. Meier and George L. Baker of the Oregon Manufacturers association urged that Oregon workmen should benefit by the work. Also present was Jack Latourette, attorney for Foote & McGonigle, Portland steel fabricating firm which has offered to meet the price of the Virginia firm.

Withdrawal to be Sought

J. A. McEachern, president of the companies which have the contract for building the Yaquina span, said his firms would hold off for a few days in signing contracts and would endeavor to get the Virginia firm to withdraw its bid. McEachern bluntly stated he did not like to be put in a position of going back on his word.

Leslie M. Scott, highway commission chairman, pointed out that the state would take no action because the main contract was let and approved by the P.W.A.

Ivan Humanson was spokesman for the Clatsop county delegation which declared construction of Wilson river highway to help salvage Tillamook county timber simply would be a bonus to the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, "wealthiest timber owning organization in the world."

"Much more burned timber is directly tributary to the Wolf creek route than is ever likely to come out over the much-agitated 18 miles of Wilson river salvage extension," the group's statement said.

"On the other hand, aside from small owners, the greatest sufferer in the Wolf creek firm was the Oregon-American Lumber com-

mann Wilhelm Goering, Prussian prime minister, told high judiciary officials today as he outlined to them the manner in which justice is to be administered in the future under the Nazi regime.

"We do not regard justice as something primary," he said. "The nation alone is primary. Your task is to protect the state at all costs with any attack upon the state regarded as an attack upon the fuhrer (Hitler)."

"We have created the law and wherever we find it does not conform to our 'weltanschauung' (world view) by the Nazis to refer to their political and social credo) we shall change it accordingly."

During the suppression of revolt between June 30 and July 2, Goering said, measures were taken which constituted the "highest realization of the popular conception of justice."

NEW LESLIE PASTOR LIKES LOCATION

Greatly pleased with Salem is the expression from Rev. J. H. McDonald, new pastor of Leslie Memorial M. E. church who with his wife and two daughters is now located in the parsonage on East Myers street. Rev. McDonald preached his first sermons here last Sunday. He succeeds Rev. S. Darlow Johnson as pastor of the church.

Rev. McDonald, who exchanged pulpits with Rev. Johnson as result of appointments at the recent Methodist conference, reports Rev. Johnson's new charge in the St. John's district of Portland has about the same membership and attendance as the Leslie church. Pioneer church, though not a large as other Portland churches, has the most beautiful auditorium of any Portland M. E. church, Rev. McDonald believes.

Rev. McDonald, who started his ministry in Nebraska, has been in Oregon about 12 years, the past five of which have been at the St. John's Pioneer church. 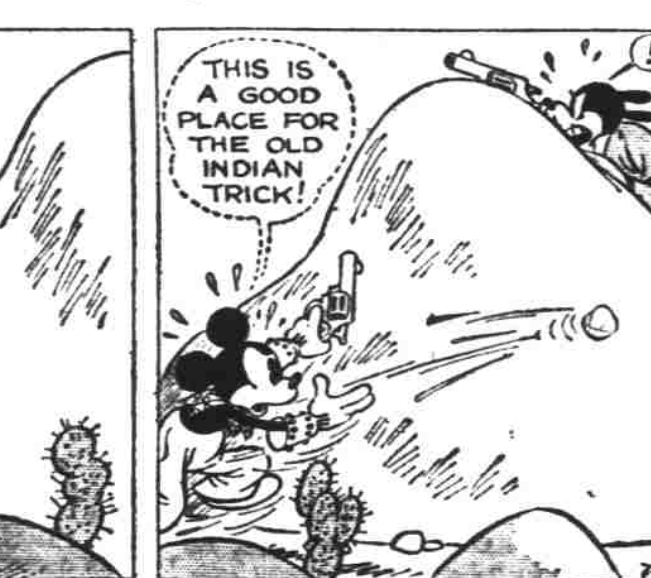
