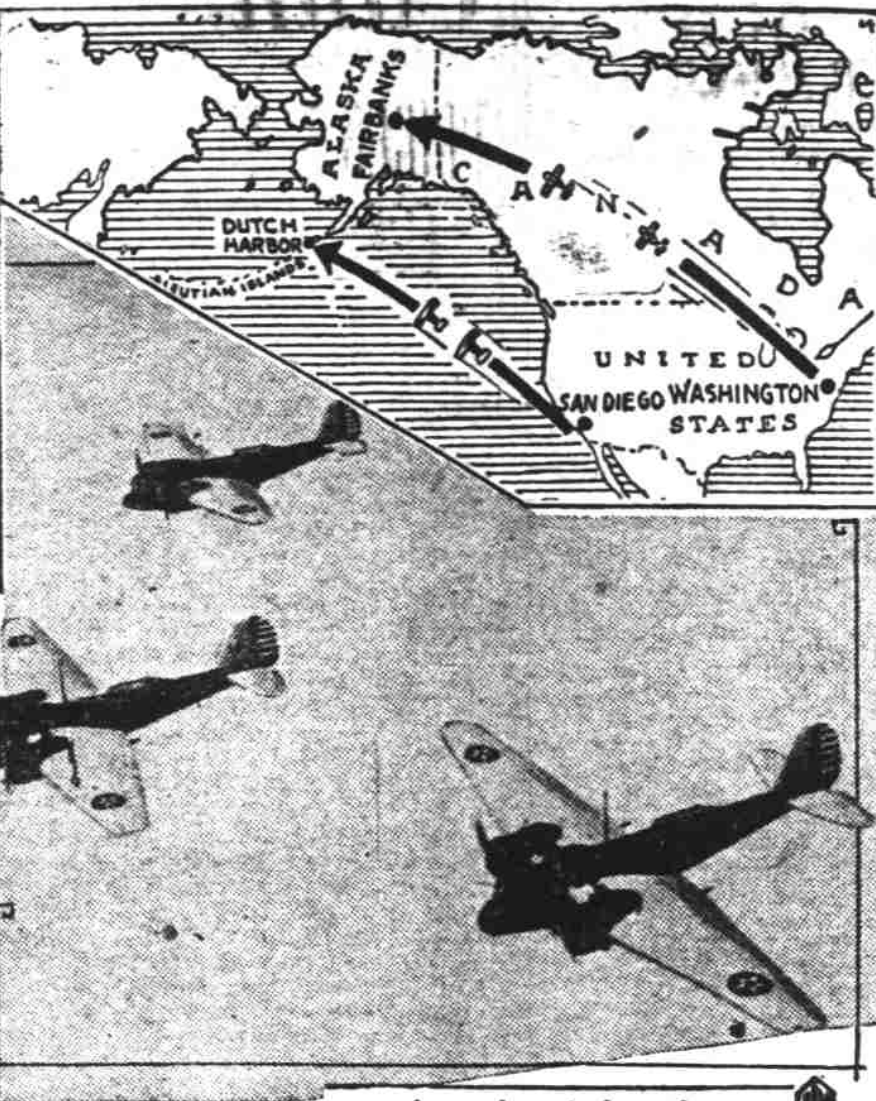
Army and Navy Airmen Set for Hop

Watermelon Pickles Are Popular Recipe Editor Finds From Housewives

Watermelon pickles are some of the easiest kind to make, are universally liked and go well with all kinds of meat dishes. They are rather rich, however, so should not be served with fat meats or loaves which are inclined to be sweet.

Many recipes for this type of pickle were received last week by the Recipe Round Table editor and a number have been printed already. There are two from those remaining that are interesting and worthy of a permanent place in your recipe files:

Watermelon Sweet Pickles
Peel the watermelon rinds, being sure to pare all the red and green off. Cut in pieces about two inches long and an inch wide. Let stand over night in cold water to which a piece of alum the size of

a hazel nut has been added for each two quarts of rinds. Next morning drain and boil in fresh water until tender but not soft. Drain and add one cup vinegar, two cups sugar, one teaspoon mixed spice and a few pieces of bark cinnamon.

Boil up for a few minutes and seal hot. These pickles keep nicely for quite a long time in an open jar.

Watermelon Pickles
4 lbs. watermelon rind
2 quarts cold water
10 grains or 2 tablespoons lime
2 quarts vinegar
1 pint water
4 1/2 lbs. granulated sugar
2 tablespoons whole allspice

2 tablespoons whole cloves
10 small pieces stick cinnamon
Select rind from a firm, not over-ripe melon and before weighing, trim off the green skin and chalk flesh. Cut in inch cubes and soak for 2 1/2 hours in lime water made with the 2 quarts of water and 2 tablespoons of lime.

Drain, cover with fresh water and cook 1 1/2 hours or until tender. Keep adding water as it boils off. Let stand over night in same water. Drain next morning. Bring to a boiling point the vinegar, water, sugar and spices tied loosely in cheesecloth. Add drained watermelon and boil two hours or until syrup is fairly thick. Remove, and pack pickles in sterilized glass jars, seal tight and store in a cool place.

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MENUS GIVEN FOR BRIDE'S PARTIES

A general plans a campaign with no more interest than does a bride her first party. She is proud of her new home. As she arranges her furniture and puts away trousseau linen, silver, china and glass, her mind is full of plans for teas, suppers, parties of all kinds.

The first few parties especially, should be simple affairs. An afternoon tea is a nice way to entertain either a small or large group of friends.

Unless there is a maid to take care of last-minute preparation, the tea menu should be such that nearly everything can be done earlier in the day.

A delightful and easy-to-prepare menu is the following:
Cream Cheese Sandwich Loaf
Relishes—Carrot and Cucumber Strips
Burr Gherkins, Radishes and Ripe Olives
Bran Spice Cake
Fresh Raspberry Ice
Hot or Iced Caffeine-Free Coffee or Tea

Cream Cheese Sandwich Loaf
Remove crusts from a day-old loaf of white and of whole wheat bread. Cut two lengthwise slices from each. Spread a white slice with mayonnaise, cover with sliced peeled tomatoes, then with a whole wheat slice spread with mayonnaise on side next tomato slice. With a thick layer of minced ham or chicken, then

with the second white slice. Spread this with mayonnaise, cover with crisp lettuce leaves, then with the second whole wheat slice spread with mayonnaise.

Softened 3 packages of cream cheese with milk and spread all over the loaf. Place on serving board or platter. Place in refrigerator for an hour before serving. Garnish with parsley or watercress and cut in crosswise slices.

Bran Spice Cake
1 cup sugar
3 egg yolks (well beaten)
1/2 cup bran (rolled)
1/2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoons cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup sour cream (thick)
Add sugar gradually to egg yolks. Add bran. Sift dry ingredients, add alternately with sour cream. Beat well. Pour into greased tin. Bake about 45 minutes in a moderate oven (400 degrees Fahrenheit). Yield: 16 servings (1 cake 8 by 8 inches).

Butter Icing
1/2 cup butter
2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 tablespoon cream, or more
Cream butter until soft and fluffy. Add sugar gradually, beating well. Add flavoring. Add cream as needed to make a spreading consistency.
