

SCIO VOTES TO DO PAINTING SANS AID

Council Decides This Way is More Economical Than by SERA

SCIO, July 12.—Upon report of Councilman N. I. Morrison, chairman of the SERA committee to which the painting of the city hall was referred at a recent meeting of the Scio town council, that body voted to have the work done by contract, without the assist-

ance of the state relief organization. Three bids were submitted for the job of painting the building, Morrison said. A \$75 figure was accepted by the council. It is estimated the work will cost the city about \$150, as the municipality is to furnish the paint. The council decided this method would be more economical than to cooperate with the SERA, as the latter would supply only 68 hours of labor, Morrison said. A committee was instructed to have grass and weeds as a fire hazard removed wherever found necessary. Councilman Roadarmel stated he had been in contact with a prospective purchaser of the city residence property formerly owned by Fred Sturges. Metal railing around the new

reservoir was authorized upon representation by Council A. L. Plummer of hazards there. The matter of a new sidewalk on each side of the county bridge spanning Thomas creek in the city also came up for consideration, and the committee was instructed to investigate. Enforcement of the city ordinance prohibiting bicycle riding on the streets during the period from April 1 to November 1 was left to the city marshal, with request that the practice be discontinued at once. Owners are to be notified to repair walks, failing in which the council will repair and assess costs against the property. Driving at excessive speed through the streets of Scio was a target, and the city marshal was instructed to use his efforts toward remedying the situation.

RED CROSS GIVES AID TO 5 MILLIONS

"In giving relief to the needy and distressed by distributing clothing made from government cotton, the American National Red Cross aided 5,878,712 families throughout the United States and insular territory," A. L. Schaffer, manager in the Pacific area, has advised Judge George Rossman, chairman of Marion county chapter.

A compilation shows 3,763 distributing agencies placed 103,514,412 yards of cotton cloth, 1,124,366 yards of sheeting, 3,179,941 blankets and comforters; 60,433,424 ready-made garments and 6,290,052 sweaters. More than 100,000 women volunteered their services to operate Red Cross sewing rooms wherein the cotton materials were converted into comfortable clothing for men, women and children.

In the Pacific area, comprising Alaska, Arizona, California, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington, the Red Cross records show 455,002 families requested aid and received it through 404 distributing agencies. Members of the production committee, who greatly increased their sewing output during the intensified relief project, are continuing their activities, Judge Rossman says, as they meet the need for garments among families of veterans or the need where-ever distress of any nature develops.

The issue for the contests will be local translations of the Roosevelt program, with Senator Hiram Johnson of California, Senator Robert LaFollette of Wisconsin and Senator Tom Connally of Texas figuring in the chief fights.

SCHOOL MEN TALK SHOP AT CONCLAVE

Addresses by Charles A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction, and H. C. Seymour, state club leader, featured the first day's program of the annual convention of the Oregon County School Superintendents' association yesterday. Virtually every county in Oregon was represented.

The "Everchanging Duties of the County School Superintendent," was discussed by T. Frank Brumbaugh, president of the association. Other speakers today included Dr. Nelson L. Bessing of the University of Oregon and Mrs. William Kietzer of Portland, president of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers. Mrs. Kietzer discussed "The Crisis in Education," while Dr. Bessing spoke on the "Problems of Teacher Placement."

Mrs. Kietzer said the educational emergency was far from over. "We not only see no indication of a decrease in tax delinquency, but are becoming increasingly aware of new complications," she declared. "Old age pensions are straining local resources to the limit. Needed social legislation is thinning our present revenues. 'If the schools must give vocational training and guidance, must train for leisure, substitute for employment, prepare for citizenship, and be the great factor in combating juvenile delinquency, then the schools must face the problem of legitimate increased costs.'"

Mrs. Kietzer said America now has an income of \$56,400,000, a sum only 32 per cent less than in 1929. "We are still buying a million automobiles and a million radios annually," she continued.

Round-table discussions centered on the "Improved program of county supervision and testing," and "elementary pupil permanent record card."

The convention will continue until tomorrow night.

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Rev. and Mrs. Virgil L. 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SALAD FOR FIRST COURSE SPLENDID

Have you tried this fashionable custom of serving the salad as the first course? What could be a more logical way to begin a meal than with a jellied tomato salad served with mayonnaise?

Of course, in addition to being a tempting food, the salad is a health-giver. It supplies vitamins, minerals, and roughage—all essentials to one's well-being. Try a salad a meal and see if it doesn't help you to ward off attack of summer lethargy. Here are a few salad recipes especially recommended for stimulating appetites:

Jellied Tomato Salad
4 teaspoons gelatin
2 tablespoons cold water
2 cups cooked tomatoes
1 teaspoon scraped onion
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons sugar
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

Parsley Mayonnaise
Soak gelatin in cold water. Cook tomatoes and seasonings 10 minutes and strain off liquid. Dissolve gelatin in hot liquid. Pour into individual molds. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce. Garnish with sprigs of parsley. Serve with mayonnaise. Serves 4 to 6.

Fruit Appetizer Salad
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 teaspoon horseradish mustard

1 tablespoon cream, whipped
1 cup orange sections, free from membrane
2 cups grapefruit sections, free from membrane
Green pepper
Fold mayonnaise and horseradish mustard into whipped cream, until thoroughly blended. Place one section of orange between two sections of grapefruit on crisp lettuce for each salad. Serve with mayonnaise and cream mixture. Divide sections with very thin strips of green pepper. Serves 8.

Shrimp and Cucumber Salad
2 1/2 cups cooked shrimps
1 1/2 cups cucumber, diced
1-3 cup mayonnaise
Cut shrimps in 1/2-inch pieces, leaving a few whole for garnish. Add chilled cucumber and mayonnaise and blend. Serve on crisp watercress. Garnish with whole shrimps. Serves 8 to 10.

Spring Salad
2 tomatoes
1/2 cup sliced cucumber
French dressing
1 small bunch red radishes
1/2 cup mayonnaise
Cut each tomato lengthwise into eight even sections. Marinate tomato sections and cucumber slices in French dressing in ice box. Drain. Place crisp lettuce on individual plates. Arrange tomato sections on lettuce. Pile cucumber slices in center of each salad. Garnish with radish roses. Serve with mayonnaise. Serves 4.
