HAUSER SAYS MORE MOTOR FUNDS NEED

The state emergency board has been requested to appropriate \$30,000 to carry out the provisions of the motor transportation act under the public utilities commissioner for the remainder of 1934, Herbert Hauser, chief of that division, has announced.

The request for the fund was sent to Dean H. Walker of Indianapolis, secretary of the board. Walker will notify Fred R. Kiddle, chairman of the board at La Grande, and the latter this summer to consider the request.

Hauser said that the work under the act was greater than anticipated and that the mass of the detail required a greater personnel than originally provided.

The Ore. legislature appropriated \$66,000 for the year 1934, of which \$42,000 was expended the first six months, Hauser reported. The department for the month has collected \$542,273 fees, not counting June receipts, which was turned over to the highway fund. The \$66,000 was appropriated out of this fund.

JUDGE EDDY SAYS HE MAY BRING SUIT

Circuit Judge B. L. Eddy of Roseburg was here investigating the steps necessary for the filing of a mandamus action to compel the secretary of state to place his name on the ballot as a nominee for one of three positions on the circuit bench from the second judicial district.

Eddy was attempting to learn whether or not the supreme court would take jurisdiction of the case instead of submitting the matter to the courts first, and

whether or not the court could dispose of the matter before its annual vacation during the month of August. Late Thursday he had not yet filed a mandamus action. Attorney General L. H. Van Winkle last week ruled off the ballot, holding the other three running for the three positions had received majorities over their competitors in the field at large and therefore their names should appear on the ballot without opposition. Eddy ran fourth against G. F. Skipworth of Eugene, James T. Brand of Marshfield, and Carl E. Wimberley of Roseburg. Skipworth, Brand and Eddy are the present judges, Eddy expected to employ a local attorney in the event he brings mandamus action.

FELLOW CONS HELP FEHL WITH SCHEME

It is possible that E. H. Fehl, now serving a four year term in state prison for ballot theft conspiracy, composed the text of an inflammatory pamphlet in his cell and smuggled it out to his wife, Electa A. Fehl, by means of prisoners from Jackson county, recently released.

The warden's office at the state penitentiary yesterday made this statement in connection with the indictment of Mrs. Fehl Wednesday by the Jackson county grand jury on a criminal libel charge.

"When the prisoners were dressed out, they might have concealed the text and taken it with them," authorities stated.

Mrs. Fehl, together with E. L. Fitch and May Murray, is charged with distribution of a primary campaign pamphlet entitled "Black Criminal Plot Exposed." In which accusations are hurled against the state police, district attorney and the courts.

The following paragraph contains the specific charges: Jackson county \$55,000 in the ballot theft trial, which money was used largely in bribing witnesses and juries, and handling the courts."

Mrs. Fehl is being held in the Medford jail pending the furnishing of \$1000 bonds.
